

#### DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING

THE FIRST DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING OF 2017 was held on Saturday 7th January at St Mary the Virgin, Speldhurst

#### • PRESENT:

Mike Bullett (chairman), Hamilton Woods (Secretary) and 29 others

- The Chairman thanked the Rector Douglas Wren and the PCC of St Mary the Virgin, Speldhurst for hosting the Service and for the use of the bells. He thanked Karol Leeves for leading the Ringers' Service, Rebekah Leeves for her beautiful organ playing and also the Speldhurst ringers for their delicious tea.
- The minutes from the District Quarterly Meeting at Chiddingstone were signed and accepted as correct. There were no matters arising.
- CO-OPTED COMMITTEE MEMBERS: Daniel Jarvis and Catherine Heathcote have been co-opted on to the District Committee. The Chairman asked that the membership agree this action. Both were elected to the District Committee by the Membership
- APPOINTMENT OF SECRETARY: Catherine Heathcote, proposed by Mike Bullett and seconded by Louise Nightingale, was elected District Secretary by the Membership.
- THE FOLLOWING NEW MEMBERS WERE ELECTED:

Lesley Ann Smith (Speldhurst), Roberta Weatherley (Penshurst) and Russell Edwards (Otford)

• ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

It was agreed in April 2016 that accounts would not be presented at the Annual District Meeting. District Treasurer, Hamilton Woods, has produced a statement of accounts for the calendar year 2016 (and 2015 for comparison) for information only. In talking through the accounts, Hamilton pointed out that a larger than normal donation has been made to the County Training Fund this year. Catherine Lewis explained that Brasted Tower had requested that half of their Spliced Fund contribution be donated to the County Training Fund. The Spliced Fund is a fund consisting of contributions made by District Towers of a proportion of their annual wedding fees. Historically this money has been donated to the County Bell Restoration Fund but the Chairman said that he saw no reason why all or part of that could not be donated to the Training Fund should any tower want all or any part of its Spliced Fund donation to be sent instead to

the Training Fund and invited other towers to consider this.

Hamilton concluded by stating that no money is held beneficially by the District, but rather on behalf of the county and was controlled by the KCACR Treasurer, Margaret Funnell.

#### • TRIVIA EVENING:

Arrangements are slightly different this year as it was found that it was becoming increasingly difficult to find people to run and help in the kitchen, including preparing the meal and washing up afterwards. As a result those attending the Trivia evening are asked to bring plates, glasses, cutlery, serving spoons, etc for all members of their team. Food will be purchased from Cook and prepared and served during the evening.

Tickets may be obtained from Hamilton Woods. Catherine Lewis enquired whether the District still has its own cutlery. Hamilton Woods confirmed that he has the stored cutlery.

• COUNTY AGM AT CRANBROOK 17 APRIL: The Chairman reminded Members that each District hosts the KCACR AGM in rotation. It is the turn of the Tonbridge District in 2017. The AGM will take place at Cranbrook on Easter Monday 17th April 2017 and is being organised principally by David and Janet Beeken of Cranbrook, St Dunstan, assisted by District Members. (St Dunstan has a lovely 21cwt ring of 8).

Jen Thomas and Mike Worthington have drawn up a list of towers 'en route' to the AGM that will also be open for ringing on that day. Towers will be notified shortly. Towers will be requested to provide stewards/ringers to augment any visiting ringers to enable the bells to be rung.

Members will be notified shortly about how to obtain tickets for the meal prior to the AGM.

#### • ANY OTHER BUSINESS:

Jen Thomas reminded Members of the District Striking Competition (6th May, Lamberhurst). Members were urged to begin preparing a team. Anthony Leeves invited people to contribute to the bell-in-a-bottle BRF

Tessa Worthington congratulated Carol, a member of the Seal band, who received the OBE in the New Year's Honours List. She reminded members that ringing takes place on the 4th Sunday of every month from 10am to 10:30am at St Peter's, Tunbridge Wells. Ringers are invited to join the ringing as Ian Cochrane is now the only Tunbridge Wells ringer.

#### The Last 6 months - and a bit beyond!

A lot has happened in the District in that period, most of which has been reported already in either this edition of Look To or the previous one. However I should like to remind you of a few things.

1. First the excellent work done by on the training front, primarily by Mike Worthington and his many helpers. If you are interested in training then do contact him for one of the sessions in the programme booklet or, if there's something you want that isn't in the programme, also ask as ad hoc special sessions can be arranged to suit particular needs

- 2. We had a successful Carol Service at Tonbridge in December where we were joined by members of the East Grinstead and District Guild of Church Bellringers. The ringing went well, there was hearty singing and afterwards we enjoyed mince pies and mulled wine.
- 3. At the last quarterly meeting held at Speldhurst, the co-option of 2 committee members, Dan Jarvis from Hadlow and Catherine Heathcote from Lamberhurst, was confirmed. I am grateful that Catherine has taken on the District Secretary role which Hamilton Woods has held alongside his role as District Treasurer since Tony Cresswell resigned last year, and we welcome her.
- 4. As reported elsewhere the Trivia evening went well. Again a large sum was raised, primarily for the County Bell Restoration Fund. It's a fun evening and people enjoyed it. We have already booked the hall for next year so do try to come along and have fun and help to raise money for this very worthy cause. While the tables are for 6, it isn't necessary to come with a complete team and we welcome those who come separately as we can almost certainly fit them in and make up a table. In the next quarter there is an event that I particularly urge you to support, the District 6 bell striking competition at Lamberhurst on Saturday morning 6th May where the draw will take place at 9.45. It is an enjoyable occasion and there are 2 competitions that run side by side, a method ringing one and a call changes one. This means that most towers are able to enter at least one of the sections. so do try to raise a team of 6. You can borrow people from other towers if your team is a bit short but there are limits.

Check the rules which can be downloaded from the website, or can be obtained from our District Secretary, Catherine.

As may well be apparent from the front page of this edition, our Look To editor Paul Burgess has unfortunately had to stand down but we are pleased to announce Steve Newlands from Cowden has agreed to take his place as editor. So in future, all contributions in electronic format please to Steve at steve.newlands@orange.net but this will change shortly as the orange email service is finishing at the end of May so watch out on the website for Steve's new address. Our thanks to Paul for his edition and also to Steve for taking this on going forward.

We are experimenting with the format of some of our meetings and the first one is the next quarterly meeting at Penshurst on 8 July where we shall start at 4.00 rather than 3.00, and we shall have a short service at the end of ringing at around 8.00 rather than before tea. Then the evening practice at Sandhurst on 22nd July will start at 5.30 and run for 21/2 hours rather than the usual 2 hours, the intention being to have a short refreshment break in the middle. The Annual District Meeting, to be held this year between Sundridge and Brasted churches, will have the usual format but with slightly different timings, and instead of an afternoon or evening practice, on 4 November we are having a morning practice at 10.00 for 2 hours at Kemsing. However the next major experiment will be at the Quarterly meeting in March 2018 at Otford. It will be a morning meeting with coffee at 9.45 followed by the service at 10.00. Ringing will then be from around 10.20 to 12.15 when lunch will be served and the business meeting will be held: after that there will be more ringing until 2.00. Do let us know what you think of these changes and also if you have other ideas that we might look at.

#### Points from the February meeting

- § All ringers in the Association using social media should be asked to be mindful what they post online, as even private comments could be taken & picked up by the media
- § The new website is being actively updated by some of the Districts, and the membership database is also being well used
- § The Handbook is on track bar a couple of outstanding items due before 12th March 2017
- § The meeting was reminded we all need to ensure we follow the good practice of there being more than 1 person in the tower when work is being done
- § The Kent Young Ringers are putting in their request enter the RWNYC in Birmingham this year, entry fee has been paid. Jen Thomas is also organising a band for the SE Youth Competition.
- § All plans are in hand for the AGM at Cranbrook on Easter Monday, details are now on the website. The Handbook Editor is not seeking re-election.
- § 33 responses were received from the Mobile Ring survey. In general, those who responded felt it was a good idea to have a mobile ring. Following discussion, it was decided the project will go ahead and further details will be presented at the AGM.
- § Following a request for consideration, it was decided that the Association would not contribute towards the St. Paul's Cathedral fundraising effort

In the end, with a significant contribution from the joker rounds, a tremendous charge to the line saw Hadlow Hopefuls secure first place and the honour of preparing and delivering next year's quiz.

As ever, thanks go to the Quiz team from Chevening as well as Louise and the team that did a sterling job in the kitchen, bringing a new approach to the considerable task and delivering Cook! dishes with aplomb. Considerable thanks too go to everyone who donated prizes for the raffle, as well as all those who bought lots of tickets, to produce a profit of £325. The Trivia evening is a key fund raising event for the District, and was again a major success this year, enabling us to send a total of £957 to the Bell Restoration Fund.

#### Stats from the Quiz Master

Many of those participants who groaned when the title was announced may be surprised to know that Round 1, "Science and Nature" was actually the easiest round. This round attracted 116 correct answers altogether and two questions (leukaemia is cancer of the blood; the number sequence) were correctly answered by all teams. Other questions that were well answered included Round 2, "Art and Books" (Miss Marple's first name is Jane); Round 3, "Food and Drink" (item 10 was a Macadamia nut); and Round 5, "History" (The Emperor Constantine founded Constantinople). By contrast, Round 4, "Sport" was marginally the hardest, resulting in only 76 correct answers out of 170 possible, with only one team, BELLES GALORE knowing that "The Big Loop" is the Tour de France (and they were also the only ones to know that, for the "History" round, the £1 note ceased to be legal tender in 1988).

One item that fooled many, to the surprise of the question setters, was the strawberry leaf, question 2 of "Food and Drink"

However the hardest of the lot was in Round 6: Robyn Fenty is not Robin Williams as many thought, nor even Liberace or Robin Cousins but Rihanna! Despite a universal "nul points" for this one, the widespread use of Jokers meant that "General Knowledge" was the second highest scoring round (137 points in total versus 180 for Round 1) even though there were only 77 correct answers. At the final reckoning the leading team had scored just over two thirds of the possible maximum points and the lowest placed team got one third. As Carole had explained at the start that there was "only one correct answer to each question" there was little difficulty for the scorers in ensuring points were properly awarded in the marking of the right answers, but some interesting and creative wrong answers emerged. Was "The Life of Pi" written by Pythagoras? Was Napoleon crowned by one of the Kings Louis? And was Radio 1's first female DJ called Emma Peel? Perhaps the best (and to our amusement one that we had actually predicted beforehand) was the suggestion that the rusty steel sculpture, The Angel of the North, had been painted by McAlpine! SEVENFORD were early leaders and held on to

SEVENFORD were early leaders and held on to top spot for the whole of the first half before fading in the second half. TOWER OF STRENGTH lay in second for the first two rounds but were driven off by well-played Jokers before rallying, briefly leading and finally nailing that coveted second place at the whistle.

Jokers were indeed responsible for some spectacular rides through the order: EDENBRIDGE ALLSORTS were lying 14th equal after Round 1 but then ascended 11 places to lie 3rd after Round 2; HADLOW HOPEFULS rose 11 places, from 13th after Round 2 to 2nd slot after Round 3 and, even more successfully, THE RHYTHM METH-OD rocketed from last place at the end of Round 3 to 3rd after Round 4.

It is interesting to look further into the effect of the Jokers. On average each Joker netted an additional 6 points but KEN DODD'S DAD'S DOG'S DEAD made 14 extra points from their Jokers, HADLOW HOPEFULS 15 points and TOWER OF STRENGTH made best use of them, putting 16 more points on their final tally. However, if we strip out the effects of all the Jokers, the two teams at the bottom of the order would not have changed at all and, although in slightly different order, the same six teams would have been at the top of the leaderboard and the winners still at the front Towards the end the strong contenders for the title all seemed to falter and one can't help but speculate about the tactics being deployed which left HADLOW HOPEFULS to be declared the surprise winners and Quizmasters 2018. Congratulations to them and many thanks to all who took part in what we found a very enjoyable evening.

On Saturday 18th February Steve Newlands, Steph Runting and I reported in at Brasted at 9:30 for a morning of Bob Triples / Bob Major training. The session was arranged by Mike Worthington with Catherine Lewis and Jen Thomas as our instructors, ably assisted by the other helpers.

Catherine started with some theory which I thought I knew and my mind accordingly began to wander but then she brought me back to Earth by explaining how one always can work out ones first dodge based on the bell one is ringing, something I found really useful. That'll teach me not to pay attention! Then we started ringing, first Bob Triples with Steph, then Steve and finally myself. I had rung a fair amount of Triples but found the extra practice useful. Catherine took the opportunity to stress the benefit of lengthening and shortening the rope as we went out and back whereas Jen was trying to stop me swivelling my head so much. This she found a challenge although I quite took on board the advantage of trying to adhere to this.

Then on to Bob Major which I found harder as I hadn't rung this as much and always find the rope sight harder. Phil Jarvis helped me here, stressing how helpful it is to identify ones course and after bells. We each had quite a few goes and I found it easier as we reached the end of the morning. We all enjoyed a much needed coffee and biscuits at half-time!

The morning came to an end and we all felt that we had gained a lot from it. These training sessions are so worthwhile. One pounds away at one thing only, gaining sometimes almost a year's practice in one morning. I know Steve and Steph join with me in saying a big thank you to Catherine, Jen, Fraser, Juliet, Phil, Louise, Ray, Alexander and Nick. Oh, by the way I forgot to say the session was great fun as well!

Jill, Noel and Ken saw an opportunity to go on the Extra Training Day, February 18th, to gain competence to ring Plain Bob Triples and Major. We were very pleased that all three of us were chosen for the training day which turned out to be running

just for the three of us from Horsmonden. It was a new experience for us to ring at Speldhurst and on a simulator. This was absolutely brilliant.



The morning started at 09.30 with a half hour theory session from Mike Worthington. It was really good and helpful to be ringing one at a time with seven experienced ringers and another standing

#### A-PEAL-ing board at Cowden

Until January this year, the most recent (and only)



peal board on display in Cowden church was dated 20th October 1928. Now, following a peal rung by members of the local band on 1st July 2016, there is another! It is hanging on the wall to the left of the West door. We rang our peal to commemorate the 100th anniversary of

the start of the Battle of the Somme and in remembrance of those Cowden residents who lost their lives in that battle. We felt that this was certainly a historical event worthy of a peal board and were extremely fortunate to be given not only one, but two very generous donations towards the cost of the board from two village organisations.

The next step was to decide on the shape, colour, design, style of lettering etc. Frank, our steeple-keeper, made the board and arranged for it to be spray painted by Geoff Coker (Alfred Coker & Sons of Edenbridge). Frank also came up with a clever system for hanging the board so that we did not need to apply for a faculty. It hangs against the wall from two vertical wire cables which are attached to the back of one of the huge oak beams in the ringing area. The sign-writing was done by a sign-writer contact of mine who paints among

other things, names onto canal boats. She was very excited to be painting her first peal board and I believe she might have an advertisement in the next Handbook - but just in case she doesn't, her website

- but just in case she doesn't, her website is www.signwritingbyhannah.com During our outings

we enjoy spotting the

names of ringers who we know on peal boards in churches other than their home tower.

Ernest Ladd, who features on the Cowden peal board of 1928, is a name that crops up on peal boards all around the district, including on three different boards in Edenbridge church. He was born in Cowden in 1906, but became a member of the Tunbridge Wells band. During his life he rang 680 peals - so certainly fits into the category of people who just love ringing peals!

#### **Evening Practice, Seal - 4th February**

#### Julie McDonnell and Mike Wigney meet in Kent

Two of the bravest ringers I have ever met decided to join forces for an outing in Kent on March 11th. Both coincidentally have had articles featured in the Telegraph this year, which you may have seen. Mike was featured telling how he got back to ringing after a mountaineering accident which left him paralysed, and Julie was featured in a piece which talks of how, whilst suffering from a number of cancers, she's been ringing and raising awareness of blood cancers and has raised £7m in six months for Strike Back Against Blood Cancer (SBABC). Many of you will have read previous reports about 'Julie' activity in Kent, and lots of you have been involved. Kent has really taken the campaign seriously - our President, Daniel Brady, as well as Tim Attride from Birchington, have written special Julie methods or variations. All six-bell towers in our District have been 'Julie-ed', thanks to the efforts of Louise Nightingale and friends, and we're working on the 8-bell ones!

In January I introduced Julie to Mike at Sunbury-on-Thames, where we rang with Dennis Brock, the oldest active ringer, at 98 years of age. I'd had the pleasure and fortune of ringing with Dennis for his 98th birthday in November so it seemed a good idea to bring all three together. Julie and Mike then hatched a plan to meet in Kent. Mike could only make the afternoon, but we decided to make a full day of it to clock up some more QPs (Julie, myself and a circle of ringing friends, are challenged to ring 2017 QPs this year!) as well as add to the numbers of people who are ringing 'JMD' for the first time.



Julie, Alan and Louise Pink, and myself formed a core team for the day. We started in Chevening, where Tony Cresswell was our 'new ringer' – and did a fine job too! Then we moved on to Sevenoaks where Louise Nightingale joined us (an old hand and great supporter of Julie), as well as David Grimwood – another first ringer with Julie.



My husband Michael Stuttard rang in both – another old hand, who even rang on his birthday, Dec 31st, when Julie called us as she was in too much pain to sit or lie so could we please come to Brede and ring a couple of quarters with her!

Tom and Jacqui Barlow were also stalwarts of the day, Jacqui ringing in 4 of our 5 QPs, and Tom in 2. After lunch at our place, we set off for Shoreham where we were joined by Mike Wigney and Linda Foddering (who first introduced me to Mike, and is a wonderful ringer and person).

Then on to anti-clockwise Brasted, where my lovely husband joined us to help get Mike up the stairs (Mike needs to be carried into the tower, and we take apart his wheelchair to bring it up so he can ring from it). As I could not secure 5 lightweight ground floor rings (Julie's treatment means she can't "go heavy" – though I really appreciated Elaine's back-up offer of Westerham, if needed!)

this all added to the feeling of teamwork, and we completed our 4th Julie McDonnell new bob triples of the day! Fraser Clift rang with us at Shoreham (his first of triples, but already a JMD ringer), and later




opened up Kemsing for a final doubles QP. So, 5 out of 5, all contributing to SBABC, and an honour for those of us involved to ring with these courageous people!

We tried to get 'new' people involved, but inevitably some of those asked could not make the day. If you want to join the cause and ring in a JMD, please let me know – Julie is always keen to involve new people, and get the message even further out there. She is also happy to ring with you when she can, and I know you would all enjoy meeting her. Watch for her on Songs of Praise on Easter Sunday!

#### 'CHIRRUPEE'


Amongst my bell and ringing books lurk a few works of fiction. The most notable is, without doubt, 'The Nine Tailors' by Dorothy L. Sayers ('Look to', Spring 2014). My favourite, however, is a slender volume titled 'Chirrupee'. It was written by E(lizabeth) Boyd Bayly, and published by Hodder and Stoughton of 27 Paternoster Row, in 1897. The delightful illustrations are by Ursula Wood



In brief, or in other words to make a short story of only 31 script pages even shorter, it tells the tale of a ringing family (men only, I'm afraid) in a village called Lammergett. The head of the family is Amram Long, and two of his great grandchildren are Amram aged 14 (known as Ram), and his younger sister, Polly.

The pride of Lammergett is its peal of eight bells, no other church within hearing distance having more than four.

Ram had been allowed occasionally to try his hand at ringing after tied practices, but Polly was not even asked if she would like a go. After one practice, the men left, and Ram and Polly were alone in the church, with the bells still lashed. Here was Polly's chance, and Ram showed her the ropes! This happened quite a few times, but on one occasion they crept into the church after the practice to ring, only to find, on pulling the ropes, that the bells were still up! They fled the church so quickly that no one could discover who had rung the bells. There was much conjecture in the village, but eventually the truth came out, and Polly was allowed to learn to ring.



The tale finishes with the death of Polly's beloved great grandfather, and she rings at his funeral. Following the service "They rang a few changes after the octaves. When the full peal should have come in again, the first note was waited for - the ringer stood sobbing by her rope. The men's hearts failed them: they let go too". "That be 'nough," said Samuel, the children's granddad. "It be ahl Chirrupee now fur he; the tolling's done."



As for 'Chirrupee', the four bells of the local churches could only say "Come ye people! come, ye people! come, ye people!" with the single bell to follow, saying "Come, come, come!"

But Lammergett's bells could ring out the words that Amram's father set to them a hundred years ago, "Cheer up ye, ahl in the mornin'". In the latter half of the 19th Century there were very few lady ringers - bell ringing was generally not considered a suitable pastime for ladies. More significant though was the 'heavy going' of bells with plain bearings and cumbersome fittings, and, in many towers, the poor behaviour of the male ringers! ('Look to', 2012 3rd Quarter). The first tower peal with a lady ringing in it was in 1896 at Basingstoke (Miss Alice White). Perhaps this peal inspired Boyd Bayly to write 'Chirrupee', and the book in turn encouraged many more ladies to take up the art of bell ringing.
