FRANK LEWIS 1936-2015

Frank learned to ring at Chichester Cathedral and rang his first peal in 1951. In 1952 the family moved to Reading and he lived close to the church of St Mary's which had a very good band and in the same year Frank rang his first peal of Cambridge Surprise. He lived in Reading until 1980 and took an active interest in the Oxford Diocesan Guild. He was also a member of the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths.


Frank rang 523 peals of which 121 were on 10 or more bells and considered the highlights to be participation in the third and fourth

peals of Bristol Surprise Maximus and the peal of Stedman Cinques he took part in at Liverpool Cathedral which was rung in 4hrs 8mins.

In 1980 he moved to Kent and lived for a while in Kemsing. He moved to Sevenoaks in 1982 and is recorded as a member of the Sevenoaks band in that year. In 1983 Catherine and Frank were married.

Frank soon became involved in Tonbridge District activities and it can certainly be said that he enjoyed his ringing. As many of us know he was not very tolerant of poor striking and although he didn't say much it was clear what he was thinking. He gave his time to many towers in helping with maintenance tasks and his Strikeometer became renowned for improving the striking of many bells. It was a bit of a mystery, a bit like a divining rod, you were never quite sure how it worked but the results were good.

He was also a regular participant in the District Training days and it was always interesting to see him accepting Catherine's directions and then sort of complying by doing his own thing. Behind his



sometimes dour appearance there was a wonderful sense of humour which helped to liven up these occasions.

Frank's work for the KCACR was phenomenal.

For the Tonbridge District:
Ringing Master 1984–6, Chairman 1987–94, 2001–2, Committee member 2003. In addition he and Catherine provided the mulled wine for the Carol Service, helped with the Trivia evening and other *ad hoc* events.

For the Association: Handbook Editor 1986–97, Chairman 2001–3, Publicity 2002–3

Webmaster 2005–15, Central Council Rep. 1987–2006, 2013–5, Maintenance Team 1991–2015. In addition he managed the advertising for the Handbook for many years, chaired the Rules Revision committee (which to his great satisfaction produced the rules adopted in 2014), provided refreshments for General Committee meetings, etc.

Frank got a lot out of ringing but he certainly put a lot more into it.

Finally a personal note. I met Frank in 1982 and we got on very well, had lots of fun and never a cross word. I helped him with the Rules Revision, which was a bit of a dry task, but we always managed to have a joke. It was during these activities that went on for some years that I found Frank to be a master of time management and so he was to the end. Frank wanted to die at home but it became impossible for Catherine to tend him so it was arranged to transfer him to the Hospice. As they came to transfer him, he died.



DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING

THE THIRD DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING OF 2015 was held at All Saints Brenchley, on Saturday 4th July.

- § ANGELA CLARK opened the meeting with a warm welcome to everyone.
- § A vote of thanks was proposed by Howard Rogers to the Revd Peter Hungerford-Welch and the PCC of All Saints for leading the service and the use of the bells. Dan Sharman was thanked for playing for us and the Brenchley bellringers and families were thanked for providing a wonderful tea and making all the arrangements.
- § Minutes of the District Meeting on 22nd March were circulated in advance and approved without change; there were no matters arising.
- § There were no new members.

S MATTERS TO REPORT:

- ➤ Training Days, 11th April, 16th May, 6th June: There were 7 sessions altogether including raising and lowering in peal, leading raising and lowering in peal, calling Plain Bob Doubles as well as the usual fare; all went extremely well. Angela thanked Mike for the great effort he is putting into training.
 ➤ 6-Bell Striking Competition Hever, 9th May: This was well attended with a good standard of ringing from a pleasingly large number of teams. Sevenoaks won the methods section and Chevening the call changes. The Hever and Cowden bands did very well.
- ➤ Surprise Practice, Hadlow, 13th June: This was well attended and there was some good ringing.
 ➤ County 8-bell Competition, Headcorn (Ashford District), 4th July: Mike W. arranged the band and called the test piece and was allowed to ring second before several members of the band rushed back to participate in the DQM. The ringing went well and Mike and his band were pleased with the standard of ringing. [Subsequently we were informed they came 5th out of 6.]

S FORTHCOMING EVENTS:

- **Evening Practice**, East Peckham, 18th July: A rare opportunity and the locals are very keen to hear their bells being rung.
- * Joint District Outing with Lewisham District, 8th August: Tiffy has planning well in hand; it will be a 'travel-card' day out in north and northeast London
- * 10/12-bell Practice, Benenden, 22nd August: This was deliberately moved to be in the summer so as to attract greater attendance, whatever standard; rounds and call changes will be rung.

- * Training Day 5th September: Mike W. is hoping to provide all the usual sessions and is planning more advanced training for later in the year.
- **County 6-bell Competition** Godmersham (Canterbury District) 26th September; Sevenoaks will field a team.
- ➤ Annual District Meeting Tonbridge 3rd October: Angela reminded of the need to nominate candidates for election to the District Secretary, District Representatives and Committee positions, and sought volunteers.
- * The Trivia Evening Ham Woods reported that the final reckoning showed a profit of £899 on ticket sales and £443 on the raffle, a grand total of £1342 which is £190 up on the previous year.

The 'electronic' raffle draw with prearranged prizes (rather than self-selection by the winners) was appreciated for speed but it was felt that it lost something in not giving sufficient recognition to individual winners. Agreed next time to call out the winners one at a time but to retain the 'electronic' draw and the prearranged prizes. Someone is needed to volunteer to be the kitchen/food organiser.

NOTES FROM KCACR MEETINGS:

* The District Reps have been asked to make the point again, at the KCACR General Committee August meeting, and more forcefully, that moving the County 8-Bell Striking Competition to the afternoon of our July DQM (in order to avoid a clash with the National 12-Bell Competition) is unhelpful and to press for the County competition to be held in the morning (as it was last year) or at an alternative date. If that is not possible, we will give consideration to rescheduling the DQM.

§ ANY OTHER BUSINESS:

- * The Bookstall is being temporarily run by Tessa Worthington but needs a volunteer to take it over from Catherine Lewis.
- * Heritage Open Days this year are 10th to 13th September. Mike W. explained what a good opportunity this is for raising the profile of ringing and perhaps recruiting new ringers. The idea is to provide free access to a heritage area not normally open to the public, eg ringing rooms and belfries; there is a lot of support available via their website to publicise any planned events. Points from the August meeting

THE FOLLOWING IS AN ABBREVIATED SUMMARY of the salient points of the meeting held on 1st August:

- § A minutes' silence was held to remember Frank Lewis who recently passed away.
- § Work on the accounts is well underway and the outstanding grants for Wrotham and Broomfield have now been paid.
- Doug Davis is looking after the KCACR website for the time being in the absence of an official webmaster.
- § Due to lack of interest, it is likely that the ITTS Module 1 course scheduled for 31st August and the ITTS Module 2 course scheduled for 19th September will be cancelled.
- § The grant application for Hollingbourne was reviewed but not increased, however an offer of a short-term loan will be made.
- § Following updated figures and information from St Peter in Thanet, a maximum grant of £10,000 was agreed.
- § It was agreed that we should retain a separate training fund, and final details around usage and process would be decided at the next meeting.
- § It was agreed that we would investigate the possibility of reprinting the bell-handling posters available at the Central Council meeting in Hull.
- § The Youth Striking Competition this year will be call changes only and will be held on 24th October at Chalk.
- § It was agreed that a county mailing list would be setup to help communication across the Association (see next column).
- § A membership database has been established and is in the early stages of being updated; membership cards will also be looked at for the coming year.
- § It was agreed that a County Surprise Major practice would be set up and trialled.
- § The 2015 County 6-bell Striking Competition would be held on 26th September at Godmersham, 2.45pm draw.
- § The dates of the final General Committee meeting in 2015 was confirmed as 28th November

Coffee and Dot's lovely fruit loaf could not arrive too soon!

Suitably fortified, we advanced to ringing the treble to Kent Treble Bob Minor (the bells don't come at you in the same order as plain hunting!) and finally, as we got that under our belts, several plain and even bob courses of Cambridge (where the other bells seem to come at you in spectacularly unruly patterns!).

Many thanks to all the helpers (Eric, Fraser, Janice, John, Ray and Stella) for their patience and all the pointing, calling 'lead now' and other little words/ gestures with which the 'standers by' nursed us through these experiences. I came away having had a thoroughly enjoyable time and thirsting for another chance to practise, which has got to be a good result for the team.

An elite band tour north London: the Lewisham & Tonbridge outing 8th August 2015

It seems easier to break into a bank than into St Dunstan-in-the-West in Fleet Street. After lunch at The Coronet, a lovely art deco cinema, now a Wetherspoon's it was on to All Hallows, Tottenham. Cub Reporter was glad he had had the 1000-calorie All-day Brunch to sustain him though the trek. On arrival it could have been a disaster – a lock-out loomed. 

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

WEDDING RINGING

IT BEHOVES US TO RING FOR WEDDINGS AND special occasions. At times the organisers are short of ringers and need to scrabble around to find someone to make a band. This is done presently through personal contacts and it isn't always easy to find ringers who can ring to the standards required for a paid public performance.

For example, training days use a considerable amount of experienced ringers and then to find ringers for weddings is problematic. Mike has expanded the extent of training days and we should all support him but it means that the pool of ringers left for weddings reduces. This very day there is request from Richard Dyson for a band to support a fund-raising concert next Saturday (12th September). With a combination of weddings, absences, tower and other outings and the date of the event being Heritage Open Day where, for one, the Tonbridge band is fully occupied and no doubt as will be other towers, then ringers will be hard to find.

I'll wager that on Mike's training days and even on Heritage Open Day with lots of activities consuming ringers there are still ringers spare who, if asked, would make up a band for a wedding or event.

But how are they found? Would it not be possible to collect a list of ringers willing to help out at weddings and the like to include phone/email, availability weekdays/weekends only, distance they would travel, transport requirements and what ever else. Then where should it go? KCACR/Tonbridge District website? Is that a possibility?

So does the membership think this is desirable? Is a public 'list' the right thing to do? Should it go on the website? Or what would be a better way?

Getting a band to ring for occasions is a problem. How do we resolve this?

The January quarterly meeting is our best attended. Could bands please consider this issue for discussion at that meeting? Maybe then we could come to a decision in time for the wedding season of 2016.

FRASER'S BOOK CORNER

'Bits & Bobs'

Bits 'boring-pieces' (*The Chambers Dictionary*) 'Book Corners'?

Bobs 'calls or temporary changes in the structure of a method, called by the conductor, in order to change the coursing order of three bells' (*A Dictionary of Campanology*) David W. Struckett, 1985.

BOOK INSCRIPTIONS

I get a lot of pleasure collecting books (and even, occasionally, reading them!), but I'm even more pleased to find an inscription in a book relating to the author or the content. One of my favourites appears in a booklet, published in 1956, entitled *Ancient Church Bells at Cocking, Heyshott, Graffham & Duncton.* It was written by Frederick T. Barrett of Graffham Common in Sussex, and in it he has penned on the title page 'To John Stanesby, with affectionate good wishes from the author (in memory of pranks in church towers, and hopes of others to come)'. I'd love to know what they got up to!

A SMALL CORRECTION

In the Winter 2014 edition I wrote about the smallest and largest books in my collection. The largest is not in dispute, but the other, I've decided, is not a true book because it is folded stiff paper, and, what is more, I've realised I have even smaller items. These are the 'Criblines' books, programmed by D. J. Marshall and A. M. Popplewell (early 1980s), both of which are shown below, adjacent to the Sherbourne Teaching-aid *Grandsire Doubles* volume. As far as I know, there are only two 'Criblines' volumes – 1) *Regular Surprise Minor Methods* (containing the 41 truly regular ones), and 2) *Regular Surprise Major Methods* (containing 60 of the most popular ones).

ART, SCIENCE, OR BOTH?

Ringing is generally described as an art – 'practical skill, or its application, guided by principles' (*The*

Chambers Dictionary). I've always thought that there is a fair amount of science in it, due to its pure mathematical input in method formation and composing. And indeed, a now obsolete, definition of science is a 'craft or trained skill' (Chambers again). You can imagine how interested I was to find out that Charles Troyte, in the preface to his seminal work Change Ringing (Look to Spring 2014 edition), used 'science' in the manuscript version of the book, but that had been changed to 'art' by the time the printed version appeared.



BUYING USED BOOKS OFF THE INTERNET


We all know it pays to shop around to get the best price for something we want. Used books are no different; there is a copy of Steve Coleman's *Early Companion* on the internet at the moment with a price tag of £165! Other copies are from £65 down to £25, with only one being offered for less than the present new price of £14.95 including p&p.


Booksellers frequently list on multiple sites, and sometimes the same book will be offered at different prices on different sites, due to the different listing charges. I recently bought a book for £22, as against £37 when I first spotted it, and even the p&p was cheaper! I look initially on abebooks.com, which can display in date listed order, and check on addall.com which searches most of the internet sites but cannot list in date listed order. The latter also lists new books.






Happy Anniversary

Most ringers in the Tonbridge District will know or have heard of Stan Jenner. He's that clever bloke that helps us back to our blurry blue line while ringing his own bell and putting in the calls. Composer, conductor and miracle memory man. If you've rung a peal with Stan he can probably tell you when, what, where, and which bell you rang. He might also remind you of what you had for lunch, and a couple of the jokes! As a previous Tower Captain at Tonbridge and Master of The Cumberland Youths he clearly has very high standards. Even so, you may have encountered him as a willing helper on District Training Days. So it is hard to imagine that aged around 12 he reluctantly agreed to give ringing a go to appease his father!

Although living in Edenbridge, Stan learned bell-handling at Tunbridge Wells under the guidance of Ernie Ladd. Stan obviously took to ringing because on 16th July 1955, aged 14, he rang his 1st peal at Seal Chart. His 2nd peal followed swiftly on 14th August that same year at East Peckham. Those bells might dissuade most ringers but not Stan. He would regularly cycle from Judd to arrange ringing at East Peckham.

By 1958 Stan was already composing peals, but his peal ringing really took off when Phil and Lucille Corby moved into the Tonbridge District around 1958/9 and established the 3rd Saturday peal band. A variation of the 3rd Saturday peal band still exists, one of the variations being that they meet on any day of the month that suits them! And so it was that Stan assembled a band at Seal Chart on the sunny 3rd Saturday morning of July to attempt his peal number 1548 to mark the 60th anniversary of his first peal. Success. Congratulations Stan! But that's unlikely to be all...

Some facts about Seal Chart

The foundation stone was laid in October 1867 and the church was consecrated in June 1868. It was built by Mr & Mrs Wilkinson in memory of their daughter who died in 1866 at St Lawrence, Isle of Wight. The original church at Seal Chart was a copy of that of St Lawrence, Isle of Wight and had an



open belfry with 2 bells. In 1888 the tower was added plus a 10cwt six cast by Mears and Stainbank, Whitechapel Foundry. In 1932 the bells were hung on ball bearings and in 1972 the bells underwent a complete overhaul. They were recast and rehung in 2013 as the current 5cwt six.




