Training Days

A training day for Rounds and Call Changes and Plain Bob Doubles took place during the first quarter. Alex Staff was a helper with a call-change group:

One of the groups on the training day on Saturday 6th March for *Rounds and Call Changes* and *Plain Bob Doubles*, made its way to Sundridge [6, 13-3-3 in F#] for *Call Changes*. The morning started with Ringing Master Catherine Heathcote discussing some of the relevant theory for call changes, and enthralled both the students and helpers with her array of visual aids, which warranted the picture below!

The students then moved on to the practical, firstly getting a feeling for the ropes. Two of the students at Sundridge came from Seal and the other two from Edenbridge and Otford, so Sundridge presented a contrast to home towers for all concerned. After quickly getting used to the bells and a demonstration ring from the helpers, the students also mixed in some call changes.

The group took a coffee-break mid-morning, and made its way down the hill to the White Horse, before returning to St Mary's for more of the same. In the second session, students were encouraged to also work on their ropesight, by being called on the treble into higher places and the order of the bells being changed below. The students were then asked to comment on who the bell they were following was following, before being called back down to the lead.

It emerged only afterwards, that some students, despite knowing what to look (and listen) for, had never in practice lead. It was impressive how quickly they picked this up. The last task of the day fell to the helpers – leaving the bells stood at backstroke for the following Sunday morning!
