November was a rather exceptional month for firsts at Hever. During the District Quarter Peal week Tony Yates rang his first ever quarter after about 20 years of ringing – a great achievement!

Our other 'first' came about from a conversation with Tiffy earlier in the year that it might be a nice idea for a peal to be rung at Hever with some first-time pealers as part of 'First Peal 2015'. This seemed a really good idea (at first, although not quite as much half-way through the peal!). With plans to get four of us through our first peal and after a couple of mishaps with arrangements (as well as a 2520 Plain Bob Doubles conducted by Alex Staff) it was booked in for Saturday 14th November.

Thankfully the weather was kind to us on the day – no blinding sunlight streaming through the window and a pleasantly cool temperature to compensate for our lack of air-conditioning in the ringing chamber. Arriving at the tower that morning it is fair to say that we were somewhat daunted by the prospect of ringing for a solid two-and-a-half hours and despite having read pretty much every article on the internet with guidance for peals I still wasn't sure I was fully prepared for the challenge!

About 15 minutes in we had a fire-up which was slightly frustrating but turned out to be a blessing in disguise as a few minutes later our lights were switched



off by an electrician who was in the church re-wiring the lighting for our recently refurbished artwork!

Once the lighting was restored we decided to give it another attempt and starting with Grandsire we quickly settled into a rhythm and nerves began to subside. Fourteen extents of Grandsire complete we moved into Reverse Canterbury PP and as we approached the halfway point I felt a wave of relief that we were halfway through... until I realised that meant we had to ring the same amount all over again which, at that point, seemed impossible! We ploughed on and finally made it in to the final third of the peal and plain Bob doubles. It was at this point I started to believe we really did stand a chance of getting the peal and began to count down as we completed each extent – it was difficult to keep a steady pace and not race off with excitement! I cannot put into words how pleased I was when Tiffy shouted 'Bob' for the last time and I was just waiting for 'this is all'. We were incredibly jubilant, and could think of no better way to celebrate than to head over to the Henry VIII inn for a well-deserved lunch and lots of water!

As we left the tower we were in general agreement that whilst it is great we've rung a peal we are in no rush to do another... I don't know if it was the post-peal adrenalin or the ale but we seem to have pencilled another one in for next year! ❖ **Louise Nightingale**

ANNUAL DISTRICT MEETING

THE ANNUAL DISTRICT MEETING OF 2015 was held at St Margaret, Tonbridge on 3rd October.

The vote of thanks was given by Stan Jenner to the Vicar and PCC of Tonbridge SS Peter & Paul for the use of the church and bells; a special thank you to the Revd Simon Couper for taking the service and his inspiring homily on Harvest; sincere thanks to David Fullman for playing the organ and lastly to Angela Clark and Hamilton Woods and their team for a splendid tea served in the lower lounge.

Thirty-five members attended and Angela Clark chaired the meeting, with Tessa Worthington as acting secretary.

§ THE MEETING OPENED with a warm welcome from Angela and the meeting stood in memory of Frank Lewis who had worked tirelessly for the District in a variety of roles, likewise for the KCACR, and would be sorely missed.

§ MINUTES OF THE QUARTERLY MEETING held on 4th July at Brenchley had been circulated in advance by email; there were no comments so these were signed as a true copy and there were no matters arising.

§ NEW MEMBERS

Paul Burgess (Chevening) was elected on a show of hands. As he was not present, his certificate and welcome pack were passed on to him separately.

§ CHAIRMAN'S REPORT (*see the Handbook for 2016 for a fuller version*)

Having completed four years Angela announced she was standing down. She mentioned the Trivia Evening as a highlight of every year, which raises £1,000 plus for the Bell Restoration Fund. Next year, having won, Shipbourne will be setting the questions. The training days (which lately Mike Worthington has organised) included raising and lowering. We had not won the 8-bell competition but rang well. Eric Roughley had celebrated his 80th birthday and is leaving the committee. Angela finished by thanking the committee members she had worked with over the last four years, and stated she had enjoyed working with them.

§ TREASURER'S REPORT (*accounts were circulated to the meeting*)

Ham highlighted that Doris Colgate's ringing books had been sold, a portion of the proceeds resulting in a donation of £250, the spliced fund raised £708 and The Trivia Evening £1,332 while the 120 Club donated £690 of the total of £4,200 transferred to the BRF. This also included some money held over from last year and as a result there is a smaller balance on the books for next year.

§ 120 CLUB REPORT

Ray Taylor stated that, although 124 numbers have been allocated, not everyone has paid (and so the forthcoming draw has only three prizes). He also explained that unlike other lotteries which donate 20p in the £1, ours gives 40% as prize money with almost 60% going to the BRF as there are virtually no expenses.

§ MATTERS TO REPORT

✧ **Evening meeting at East Peckham** two visitors helped make up the band which rang rounds, call changes and Cambridge. East Peckham is not often open for ringing and the neighbours appreciate the sound of the bells, so please support the next occasion.

✧ **Joint District Outing** Tiffy Lynch reported there were only eight people at the start but two joined in time to ring at the ten-bell tower. It was a lovely day, based on public transport and hopefully there will be better support for next year's event.

✧ **10/12 Bell practice, Benenden** Tiffy reported this was not hugely well attended but there were enough to ring call changes on 12. The Ringing Masters will be revisiting the date and going back to the ten-bell towers instead. Comments please to your tower steward.

✧ **Training days** Mike Worthington reported three sessions, on 5th September with three towers and 30 people involved (Bob Doubles, Treble Bobbing and Call Changes) and, on a separate day, a Call Changes session for Seal, whose band is making good progress. Two ITTS sessions were cancelled due to lack of numbers and the bell maintenance course had been well attended.

✧ **Six-bell competition** Sevenoaks came 4th with Lewisham taking the day with excellent striking.

§ The accounts for 2013–4 are just about ready to be audited thanks to the work of the Treasurer with help from Caroline Stockmann.

§ Guidelines for the use of the Training Fund were finalised and agreed.

TRAINING MATTERS

NOW THAT THE LAST QUARTERLY TRAINING DAY has been held district members may be interested in the following summary of training activities in 2015.

- 18 training sessions were held over 8 dates
- 122 helpers gave their time (41 individuals)
- 67 students attended
- 9 towers used

Call Changes at Seal

SS Peter & Paul Seal ringers had the benefit of two separate Saturday training sessions on the 4th and 19th September, organised and run by Mike Worthington.

There have been six new ringers in Seal over the last 6 years, and while bell handling was reasonably competent, it had become clear that to make further real progress some more concentrated instruction would be needed. Whilst call changes were rung they were not in the normally called way!

There were three Seal ringers at each of the sessions, and after the 40 minute theory session, which included a challenging listening section, we moved into the practical side. Helpers came from as far as Houston, Texas to experience the Seal bells, which have been greatly improved by the addition of an extra ringing frame and some new guides so that it is now actually a ring rather than a hexagon. Notwithstanding this there were some exciting moments, particularly when a helper let go of rope's end to rescue his glasses!

The practical sections grew in complexity, and after the welcome coffee and cake break (which included musical accompaniments from people practising for a musical event in the church) we moved onto the more challenging stuff.

At the end of each practice session all the Seal ringers felt a lot more comfortable with call changes, despite some eclectic calling from the Tower Captain! Now the challenge is to practice what we have learnt!

Particular thanks to Mike for his time and patience, and to Angela who came to help at both sessions – a real glutton for punishment!

Three novice ringers

Three novice ringers, (or three wise men) Tim from Edenbridge, Linda from Sevenoaks and myself from Otford, took part in the Training Day of Rounds and Call Changes at SS Peter & Paul, Edenbridge on 5th December. Many thanks Richard (Tower Captain) for letting us loose on your bells.

The morning started with a brief introduction of who's who by Mike Worthington, our trainer, then on with the theory in which Mike patiently and precisely explained how we should effectively and correctly ring a church bell followed with the theory on ringing call changes, including places, listening, faults, terminology and changing position, all at this point a nervous, totally unclear conception for me. The theory was and is very useful to refer to when needed before practise.

Now to the nitty gritty – the simulated ringing – putting theory to practice. We met our eight experienced helpers, Ray (Leigh), Jane (Edenbridge), Jane (Hever), Fraser (Kemsing), Caroline (Cowden), and Richard (Edenbridge) all looking cool, calm, collected and ready to ring – quite the opposite to my feeling which was very nervous (just have to watch my knee caps jumping around it's a new trick I've acquired when ringing!) but feeling reassured by the confidence of my fellow ringers. As a novice ringer, half of the job for me is to watch carefully how experienced ringers control the rope and in turn, the bell. It is good to watch others and pick up on good ringing styles, most of all, how relaxed people are whilst ringing as being relaxed promotes a better pull – how do they manage to do that? What is more, I learn that Richard had come to the training session straight from the swimming pool having completed a 'swim the channel' challenge over several weeks. Well done Richard, that's stamina.

Mike stood by the three of us trainees in turn as we rang on the fourth bell, sandwiched securely between our very able helpers ready for a challenge. He coached us in the course of call changes in various forms of calling up and calling down. One day this will become clear to me, but I will say that as I sit typing this article, I feel I understand much more than I did this time last week (also grateful thanks to Bobbie Fairclough for taking time out in my practice session on Tuesday to further explain a few muddy areas) I just have to ring changes live now. Tim and Linda seemed to understand really clearly the object of the exercise and rang well in a controlled and relaxed style and we complemented and supported each other as we took turns. We had, to my surprise, 'fun' whilst ringing and Mike was so good, explaining what, where and when to check, hold up and don't bash the stay (whoops, sorry!). I did get into a muddle checking and not

checking, so dear Fraser and I ended up in a duet – he on bell three and me on bell four, we checked and held up at some speed until I got the hang then ending to applause from the audience.

We had a mid-morning tea break which was most welcome and Mike produced a simply stunningly, delicious homemade Victoria sponge by Tessa – that alone was worth being on the course for. Thank you Tessa. All this deliciousness was accompanied with ringing chat from the marvellous helpers and my fellow novices, a great bunch of like-minded people who I really hope to come across again in my ringing experiences.

To end our half-day training we swapped bell positions and rang a number of rounds, stood the bells then Mike and helpers lowered all the bells ready for next use. A great morning.

What have I learnt from my morning's training?

- Edenbridge are beautiful bells to ring (ropes to pull) – another rope to my collection of rings so far.
- That ringing call changes is slightly less terrifying than I first thought – I hope my two trainee friends feel the same.
- That I can listen to Mike and still catch the rope as it falls rapidly in front of my face. Then swap places with another bell.
- After an hour or two practicing that my knee caps will possibly stop jumping up and down.
- I am inspired to continue ringing and hopefully in other towers sharing experiences with Alexander and Stephanie my two, more experienced than me, junior ringers.

Listening Skills

On the 14th November (a very wet Saturday morning) seventeen students met at St Bartholomew's Church in Otford for our day of 'Listening'.

Arriving, we were greeted with coffee, tea and a variety of biscuits, but already the consensus was, the anticipation of what lay ahead had the nerves already in full flow.

At 10.15 with all students seated, Mike introduced our trainers for the day, Catherine Lewis, Jen Thomas and Lucy Hopkins-Till from Basingstoke.

Mike explained the itinerary and that we were to be placed in three separate groups for different activities; and then handed over to our trainer Lucy. Along with a projector Lucy explained that listening was so critical to all our ringing and how, with practice it could be learnt.

We were then split into our groups, for the first session. Group one was with our striking tutors Catherine and Jen for simulator and striking practice.

This session was extremely hard. Each of us in turn had to ring a silenced bell. The first being the tenor, ringing at a steady pace and then introducing the simulator. Not easy, listening to our bell, trying to eradicate our errors whilst working out whether it was too slow or too quick, and then the same exercise on the treble. With Catherine and Jen to guide us, it certainly helped, but listening and not hearing is one of the hardest things to achieve; each one of us found this a challenge. Thank you Catherine and Jen; you are both so encouraging.

Lunch! A wonderful buffet lunch was provided by Tessa and Zoë Worthington and Jane Neilson. It was delicious and the cakes were something to die for, so from all us students a big thank you for looking after our tummies so well.

After such a wonderful lunch, it was time for our next session, which for group one was with Mike.

This objective was to listen to the simulator. In theory, we had to work out how many bells were ringing, and try to point out any errors if appropriate. Mike would then ask questions such as what would be the method of action if perhaps a bell was ringing too slow, too fast, or clipping the bell in front. All things that we should know but now have had explained in detail. We all found this exercise hard. At times, it was difficult to identify which bells that were causing the problems, if any. The whole sessions was so useful and constructive having points of interest explained and understanding how to put things right, if not all the time, but perhaps some of it; let's hope we can put some of our new found knowledge into practice. After this session we were all flagging somewhat, our ears and brains were not quite connected but certainly working overtime.

Another cup of tea and yes, more delicious cakes. This gave us time to discuss with our fellow students how they had found the day and the consensus was certainly positive.

Last session. This group session was with Lucy, tucked away in a small office. We found her busy with a tape recorder. We were given a pad and pencil and panic set in, 'oh no not a test!' Lucy explained that it certainly was not a test but just a piece of fun, trying to identify and answer questions put to us by Lucy after playing pieces of ringing. The first was trying to identify how many bells were ringing and was there a tenor at the back – it got progressively harder with eight, ten and twelve bells being rung. Finally, Lucy played several pieces to which we should all have known the answers but unfortunately we only came up with one that we recognised and that was Queens.

Our final session was a joint one; Lucy gave us a summary on what we had learnt during the day and how we could all improve by practice and listening. The floor was then opened for questions, but with all that had been achieved during the day, everybody was shattered and far too tired for any further information.

Finally, thank you from us all for such an informative training day. Mike for organising such an event, for all the trainers, and not forgetting the wonderful food.

One final thought. Perhaps it is time for us all to stand back and listen. How many times do we speak to somebody, and yes, we hear what is said, but do we always listen?

They take place on the first Saturdays in March, June, September and December and arranged by Mike Worthington, Deputy District Ringing Master. The standard courses offered are:

- Rounds and call changes
- Plain hunt
- Plain Bob Doubles
- Grandsire Doubles

Please remember to check the course requirements below (Getting the most from your training day) and get back to me if you have any queries or need help meeting the requirements.

Courses will be arranged subject to demand and availability of helpers. Please assist by making requests as soon as possible after announcements are sent out, as last minute requests are unlikely to be met. Please send requests for places to Mike at tondist.training@hotmail.co.uk

Bespoke training days

It may also be possible to offer bespoke sessions for individual towers in cases where several local ringers have the same need and the tower captain does not feel able to find suitable tutor and helpers themselves.

Additional Training Days

Following on from last year's programme it is planned to offer some additional non-standard courses. These will be notified to tower contacts about 2 - 3 months in advance. On the agenda for the second Quarter will be

- Stedman Doubles
- Raising and Lowering in Peal.

Anthony Leeves Speldhurst writes:

With Eric Roughley not seeking re-election to the Tonbridge District Committee, Angela Clark rightly acknowledged in the Autumn *Look to* his contribution to the District as our representative on the Association Committee. That, of course, is only part of the story. I think Eric arrived in the District in 1978 or 1979 and very soon after that (in 1980) he was serving the District as Ringing Master. His service to the District then continued unbroken for 35 years with totals of eight years as Ringing Master, 14 years as a District Rep. on the Association Committee, three years as Assistant Ringing Master, four years as Chairman, and six years as an 'additional' committee member.

For 21 of those 35 years he also served on the Association Committee – 14 as already mentioned as our District Representative, four as Association Chairman, and three as one of the directly elected Association Committee members.

Angela herself has not just served the District as Chairman for the past four years. She was District Press Representative for 12 years – a role which then included the District bookstall and for six or seven of those years also included editing and producing *Look to*. Partly overlapping with her term as Press Representative, she also served five years as District Secretary.

To Eric and Angela – a big thank you from the Tonbridge District.

An old Tonbridge Tower minute book for 1947 to 1953 has recently come to light. Angela Clark found reading through it amusing as well as enlightening in relation to the times. Here are a few extracts:

Meeting January 1947 *Chaired by the Revd R. B. White*

The meeting then being open for discussion, the following points were raised:

Mr Harding If the Band is called upon to ring on special 'occasions' (eg Skinners Day), will provision be made that the ringers receive the customary payment?

Mr Medhurst Can something be done to improve the condition of the Tower – floor, heating, bell chamber, etc? He suggested that the churchwardens be acquainted of these necessities, which were accentuated by the inclement weather then prevailing.

The Vicar thought that the Steeple Keeper's remuneration, in view of the amount of work entailed, should be raised to £2.2.0. This was agreed to.

With regard to this and all other financial matters raised, no steps were taken pending the decision of the churchwardens.

Mr Harding reminded members of the suppers held annually before the 39-45 war. This was usually paid for, he said, by small periodical subscriptions throughout the year. The idea met with support and was to be considered at a later date.

Mr Collier mentioned the condition of the bells, with particular reference to the 7th and said the bells had not been thoroughly overhauled since 1774 – Mr Medhurst suggested a grant be made to cover the costs which might be £500-£800 and wondered if the Urban District Council might be approached.

They had been found liable for the re-gilding of the church clock £90.

Skinners Day 1947

Commencing at 7am with rounds until 8am. Bob Minor was attempted unsuccessfully, then Grandsire

doubles with tenor covering.

At 10am doubles and rounds were rung, and Bob minor again attempted. It was 'fortunate' that doubles broke down at 11.10 as the service appears to have been brought forward from 11.30!

The day's ringing closed with rounds and at 1pm the bells brought down in peal. The usual £1.1.0 was paid to the ringers and to meet postal expenses etc the odd 1/- was returned by each member to the Hon.Sec.

Sat. 25 Oct 1947

Wedding – 2.15 for approx. an hour (10/-). Grandsire Doubles was rung, calling by Ben, Burt and Jack.

Nov. 20th 1947

On the occasion of the Royal Wedding, the following rang 1260 of Grandsire Doubles: S. A White (treble), J. Harding 2, B. Fagg 3, J. Collier 4, A. H. James 5, J. T. Medhurst (conductor) 6, A. Bridger 7, and L. Duke (tenor). (7, 4, 8 covering). The peal was rung in 40 minutes: all the above are Sunday ringers. Intimation was made to *Ringing World*.

Dec. 21st 1947

We were honoured by the presence of the Vicar who made a small presentation on behalf of the Band to L. Duke and his fiancée, who are to be wed on Boxing Day.

Doubles & Triples followed – this was very successful. The 'usual 5' were present PM. It is noticeable how the numbers are reduced for evening service!

Xmas Day Dec. 25th 1947

Ringing from 10-11, including G. doubles. Bob Doubles not so successful as previous attempt.

A poor turnout in evening – lowered bells. Secretary received and signed for £8.8.0

Heritage Weekend at Tonbridge - an opportunity to recruit!

The annual Heritage Weekend presented another occasion for the Tonbridge tower members, to raise awareness of bellringing and its pleasures as a hobby to the public. Previous years had seen a trickle of visitors to the tower but no one coming forward wishing to learn.

This year we had to do better, so we decided to up the advertising and increase our presence in the town. We used banners outside the church and in the High Street, to attract local passers-by, and had a recruitment stall in the castle grounds to catch the attention of the visitors to the castle and medieval fair, and tell them the church tower was open and giving free tours.

It worked better than we dared to expect. The visitors came in larger numbers than we hoped for. They had seen the banners and called in, and had visited the stall and been guided to the tower. Over the weekend a total of 128 visitors completed the guided tours which lasted half an hour. Tours being groups of up to 12 visitors guided around the tower with demonstrations of ringing, watching the bells being rung, learning the history and viewing Tonbridge from the top of the tower. Of the 128, 15 have expressed an interest in having a go by joining in a hands-on experience 'taster session' of ringing on two open evenings and several have said they want to learn.

It was a tiring and demanding event, but all the preparation of leaflets, posters, banners, stall and then the giving of the tours on the day and chatting to the public gave us our desired result.

If we manage to grow our band by four learners, as a long-term result we will be delighted. We encourage anyone reading this to GO OUT TO THE PEOPLE rather than wait for them to come to you. The feedback from our visitors was an enthusiastic 'Thank you for such an interesting experience', all going to show that local people are interested but we have to shout a little harder to get their attention.

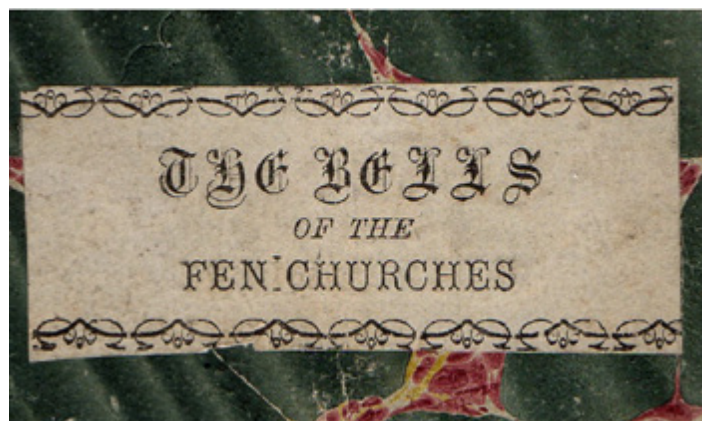


Bells, beer, bees, and books...

...are just some of your esteemed editor's interests. In searching for something to write about for this Christmas edition of *Look to*, I used these subjects as my 'present list' for him. The result is a little book about the bells of the Fens, published in 1873. No beer or bees, but a lot of bells, and a hand-printed book to boot!

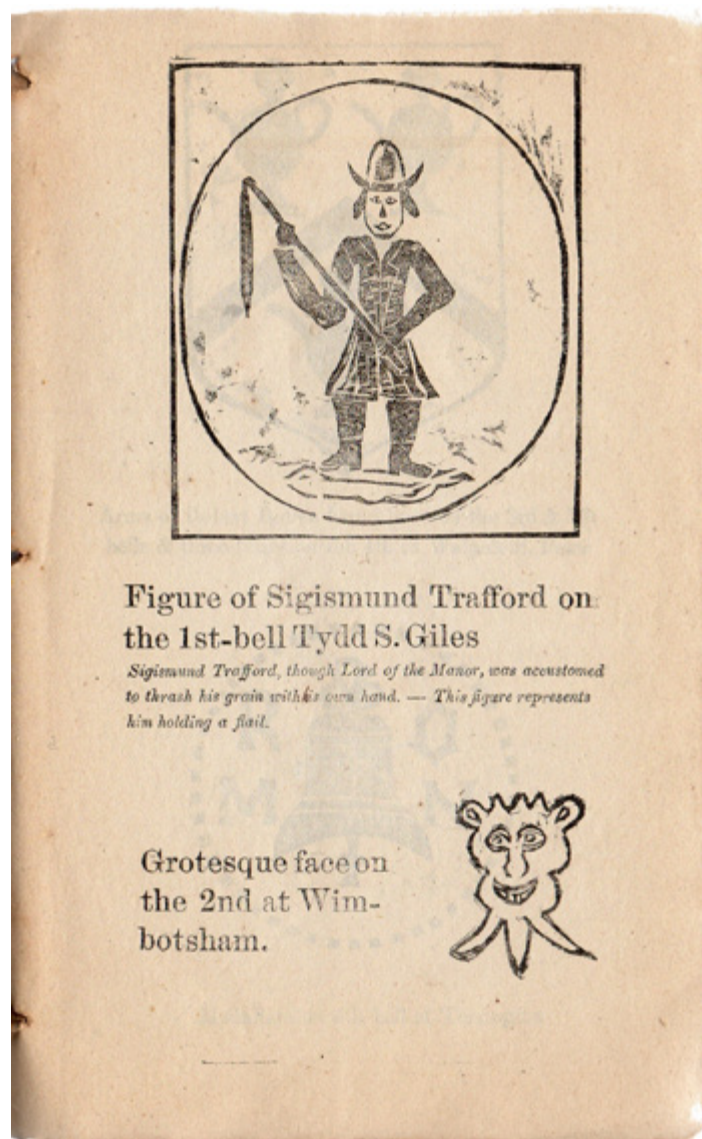
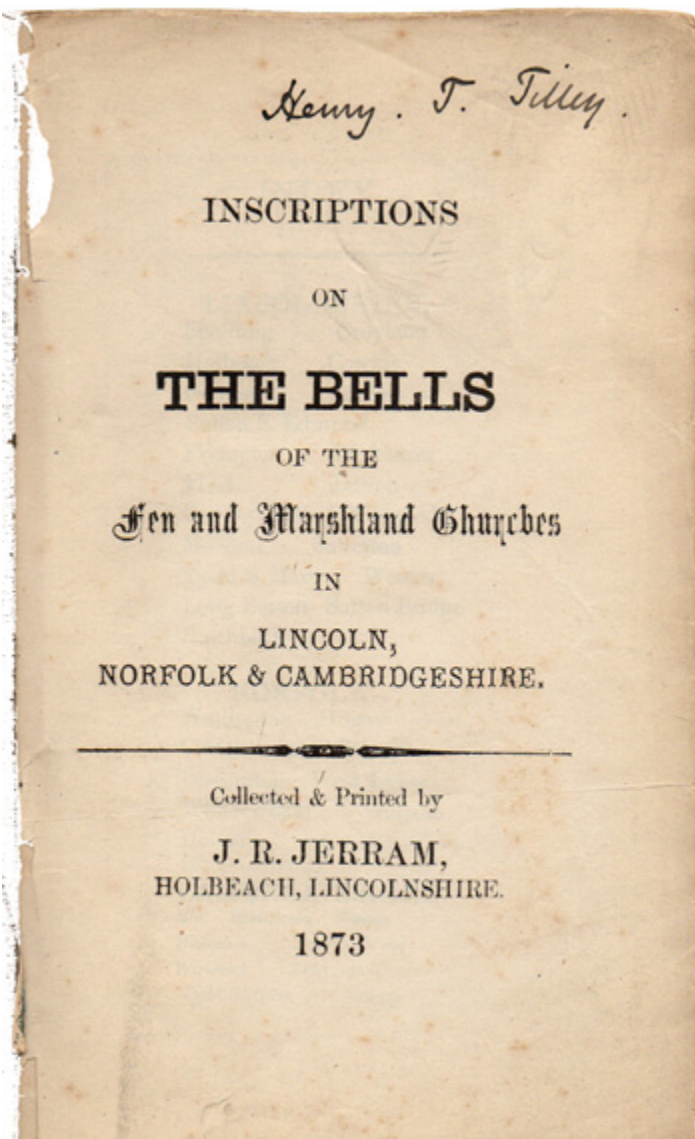
The compiler was James Richard Jerram, the youngest son of a vicar of Fleet, in Lincolnshire. He trained as a marine engineer, but later became a bell-hanger, working initially in Lincolnshire, and subsequently in Salisbury. Outside his work, he was a ringer, a teacher of ringing, and an adviser on bells and bell-hanging, as well as being an antiquary, artist and author.

He became a member of The Ancient Society of College Youths in 1875 (membership number 2718), when he was living in Sutton Bridge in Lincolnshire. In Salisbury he lived in The Close, and he was



instrumental in setting up The Salisbury Diocesan Guild of Ringers. The Guild appointed him Inspector of Belfries, and Instructor in the Art of Change-ringing. Companies of ringers were invited to apply to him for particulars, terms etc. Now, there's a thought!

The book's full title is *Inscriptions on the Bells of the Fen and Marshland Churches in Lincoln, Norfolk and Cambridgeshire*. The content was collected and printed by the author, and he produced the rubbings and plates for the illustrations, and the marbled boards. One of the five pages of plates is reproduced,



together with one of the twenty eight pages of churches and their bell inscriptions.

I have only ever seen or heard of two copies, the second being an incomplete one in the CCCBR Library. From this I would suspect very few copies were printed. Incidentally, the signature on the title page of mine is that of the Rev. Henry T. Tilley, author, with H. B. Walters, of *The Church Bells of Warwickshire*, published in 1910.

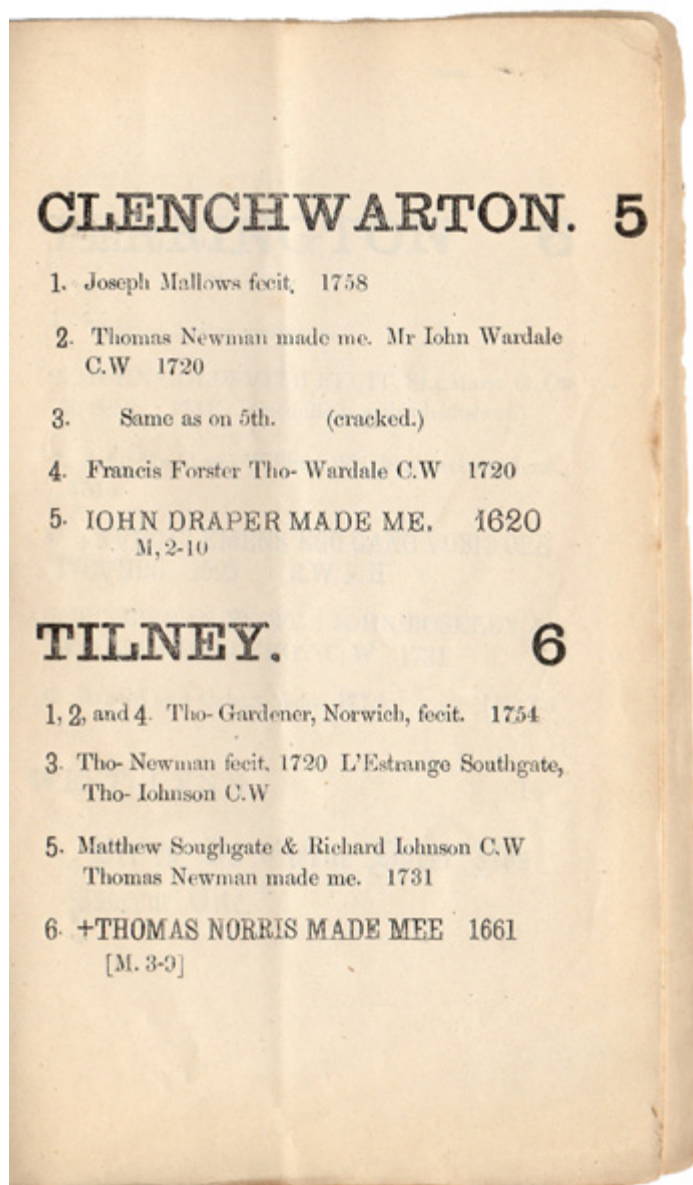

District Quarter Peal Week 24th October to 1st November

THIS YEAR WE AVOIDED the Remembrance Sunday period and so the number of quarters rung (18) was reduced compared with last year. Fifty-nine ringers and 11 towers took part. The leading ringers were again Bobbie Fairclough (6) and Fraser Clift (7), the latter also taking the honours as leading conductor (6) and making an unsuccessful attempt to beat last year's record time (28 minutes) for a quarter on the Kemsing bells; Hever had the most successes (5).

Only one first quarter was rung this year, but it was a notable one and hearty congratulations go to Tony Yate for this achievement after ringing for some 20 years. There were a good number of other firsts, including three of minor (Steve Newlands and Alexander Runting, who both rang their first quarters this time last year, and Jamie Austin, who rang his first quarter only a couple of months ago). Daniel Jarvis scored his first of Surprise minor and there was one conducting first, of two methods, for Louise Nightingale.

As ever, doubles methods predominated with a mere 5 of minor and one each of triples and major. It would be good to see more ringing of triples and major but some ambitious multi-method doubles quarters were brought round. Two deaths were commemorated; one birth and a significant anniversary of an important English victory were celebrated.

Well done to all who took part.
