On the ropes with...

Mike Worthington Speldhurst

What was your line of work outside ringing?

I worked in the oil industry, mainly doing Seismic exploration. I lived and worked in deserts, jungles, swamps, mountains and capital cities around the world in a couple of dozen countries managing projects with up to 6,000 men scattered around the countryside. It was usually great fun, though occasionally pretty fraught and sometimes dangerous. For 6 years I was a Telecomms and IT manager but I felt a bit of a fraud and reverted to my exploration roots. One thought—three places I've lived—Libya, Syria and Christchurch- have since been reduced to rubble. If you live in Tunbridge Wells or Sevenoaks and are thinking of moving......

What attracted you to ringing and how did you get started?

I was starting the D of E award and needed a hobby. A friend said "why don't you try bell ringing?" to which my response was "you must be joking". The rest, as they say.....

Who taught you, and where did you start to ring?

Two ringers at Knebworth near Stevenage taught me to handle a bell but most of my early progress was due to Brenda Harris, tower captain of Benington. She went to district practices in local associations every Saturday night and took me along. We must have rung at most towers in Essex, Herts, Cambs and Bedfordshire within an hours drive. Whether this would have



happened if modern safeguarding rules had been in place we will never know.

When working there, did you find ringing in Australia and New Zealand very different in any respects to ringing in England?

Yes. Because towers are so far apart ringers are much more hospitable than at home, often offering to put up visitors who might not be able to come if they had to find hotel rooms as well as expensive fares. It's up to 9 hours flight from one side of the ANZAB territory to the other, so attending an AGM can be costly.

When Christchurch augmented from 10 to 12 the NZ ringers offered rooms to visitors. When I was told I'd be staying with a local social worker I imagined an elderly tweedy lady. What I got was Tessa!

What was the most memorable experience of ringing in Australia and New Zealand? Tessa.

What has been your funniest or most memorable ringing moment to date?

You get plenty of humour in ringing but most of it is apres-ring. You need to know the characters.

Most satisfying ringing achievement so far?

Probably two things. I rang in London for a couple of years and managed one touch of 11 spliced surprise royal towards the end of that time. In Adelaide ringing the 41cwt tenor at the Cathedral to a peal was very satisfying.

Any unusual ringing moments?

Ringing at Christchurch cathedral with a Japanese TV crew writhing about on the floor trying to get unusual camera angles, despite being told to stay outside the circle. We managed not to hang them!

Do you have any current ringing ambition(s)?

As my Parkinsons creeps relentlessly on my only ambition is to try to maintain my ringing to a standard where my striking does not spoil the ringing for others.

Any favourite ring of bells?

Abergavenny—a magnificent ring of 10.

THE THIRD DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING OF 2018 was held on Saturday 7th July at St Mary the Virgin, Speldhurst at 6.10pm.

• Welcome

The meeting stood for 1 minute in silence in memory of Nicholas Butcher.

• Vote of thanks

The Chairman thanked Eric Roughley, Speldhurst Tower Captain, the Speldhurst ringers, and Rector Douglas Wren for the use of the bells and the church for the District Quarterly Meeting. He also thanked Anthony Leeves and Penny Gerrard for serving and preparing a lovely tea on behalf of the Speldhurst ringers. Thanks were also given to Mike Worthington for leading the ringing in the absence of the Ringing Masters, who were both at the Ringing World National Youth Contest (RWNYC).

At this point in the meeting, Chairman Mike Bullett chose to remind the meeting of the changes proposed to the rules of The KCACR raised at the AGM in April 2018. In particular he referred to the proposed change of Chairman' to 'Master' both at Association and District level, in order to more closely focus the main business of the Association on ringing. Although this change was not accepted at the AGM, the Chairman informed District members that the Tonbridge District Committee was nevertheless, continuing to make ringing the principal focus of the District and Committee business. The Chairman stated that at a recent meeting chaired by Philip Barnes, KCACR Chairman, it was still the intention of the Association to continue to focus business more directly on ringing.

The Chairman informed ringers that he would be stepping down as Chairman at the October Annual District Meeting (ADM). In addition Jen Thomas would also be stepping down as District Ringing Master and Catherine Heathcote would be stepping down as District Secretary.

Dan Jarvis has expressed an interest in standing for the post of District Ringing Master and Catherine Heathcote has also expressed an interest in standing for the post of Assistant Ringing Master at the October ADM.

DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING

The Chairman reminded the meeting that all positions on the Tonbridge District Committee will be up for election at the ADM in October 2018

- MINUTES OF THE DQM, 7TH APRIL,ST MARY THE BLESSED VIRGIN LAMBERHURST AND MATTERS ARISING. The meeting agreed the minutes to be an accurate record of the DQM held at Lamberhurst on 7th April 2018 and the Chairman signed these accordingly.
- PROPOSED NEW MEMBERS There were no new members proposed at this meeting.
- NEWS AND UPDATES FROM THE KCACR GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETING Richard Dyson (Tonbridge District Representative on the General Committee of the KCACR) brought news of the KCACR General Committee Meeting.
- -At his first meeting since becoming Chairman of the KCACR, Philip Barnes has made clear the direction in which he would like to take the Association.
- -No guidance on the 100th Anniversary of the Armistice was given at the meeting but it is expected that the CCCBR will issue guidance soon.
- -In 2017 the Association was given a set of bells to convert into a mobile ring. Catherine Lewis is Chair of the mobile ring committee. Work is continuing on the best way forward with this proposed mini mobile ring.

COUNTY GENERAL COMMITTEE

Points from the General Committee Meeting held on 28th July 2018

Reproposed rule changes. A number of rule changes for decision at the 2019 AGM on Easter Monday 22nd April are envisaged. Details will be circulated to District Secretaries by September 2018 for consideration at Annual District Meetings in October.

Real fee review. Decision deferred to 23rd February 2019 General Committee but it is understood that any excess peal fees would be used for the Training Fund.

Role descriptions. The Chairman is developing a list of essential tasks that need to be undertaken at District Level with a suggested division of such tasks amongst the officers in a typical district..

& General Data Protection Regulations. To ensure the Association is fully compliant with the GDPR an annual check for consents would be undertaken at the same time as Membership Subscription renewals.

Reinvigorating ringing in Kent. Association Chairman Phil Barnes has met with District Officers to review and share information and ideas about what is happening in each district. Common issues emerged; importance of maintaining interest amongst ringers at every level of experience, training structures, activities across-district boundaries, improving basic ringing training, group teaching hubs, co-ordination of teaching and development of trainers. A second meeting focussed on recruitment, effective teaching of bell-handling with the aim of one ringer per rope in the Association by the AGM 2021, proactive approach to training events, advanced practices and improved communication. Please contact Phil Barnes to support and engage with reinvigorating ringing

& Midweek 10 bell practices on Association—wide basis. Dates will be circulated shortly for bi -monthly 10-bell practices with an initial focus on Stedman and simple surprise.

Remark Treasurer notice. Margaret Funnell reminds members that she would be standing down as Association Treasurer at the 2019 AGM. Please speak with Margaret if you wish to know more or to offer yourself for nomination to this important role.

Training Officer. David Grimwood hopes to help increase the number of accredited Mentors in Kent to support those undertaking ARTS training courses. Course fee funding is available from the Association. A Leadership Skills Course is envisaged on 17th November 2018, location to be confirmed.

& Safeguarding. Dioceses are providing online Safeguarding training for all ringers through courses C0 and C1 and a half-day course C2 for those who are required to have a clear DBS check. Dates and venues for District C2 courses will be circulated shortly. The Rochester Diocese is organising C2 Safeguarding courses on Monday 1st October and Saturday 1st December (venues to be confirmed).

& Kent Young Ringers have been extremely busy over the past three months. A Young Ringers' Programme for 2019 is being drawn up. Work to create a Youth Competition Trophy is progressing. A practice band to take part in the County 6-bell competition is yet to be confirmed. A change in the competition rules may be needed in future for them to compete in their own right.

& Bell restoration. A grant of £490 was approved for the repair of the Lydd tenor clapper.

& Association support was requested to secure Heritage Lottery Funding (HLF) to develop Milton Regis into a ringing centre. The Association has provided a grant for the rehanging project which is now well under way. Additional works are envisaged to provide social/teaching space with a kitchen and other facilities for wider community use. A letter from the Association would encourage HLF support for the Ringing Centre.

& Mobile ring project. Design work would continue and a full report was requested for the November General Committee to include detailed design and implementation proposals, confirmation that it was fit for purpose, storage and operation proposals to conform to the original agreed outline.

Ringing for the Centenary of the Armistice, 11th November 2018. Ringers should liaise with their local churches and communities in order to participate fully and appropriately.

Ringing Competitions. A Kent band would take part in the Essex Trophy on 8th September at Horsham. The County 6-bell competition is on 22nd September 2018 at Upchurch, 9.45am draw. Kent Young Ringers will take part in an inter-District Youth competition on 3rd November 2018 at Kingsnorth, 1.45pm draw. Kent ringers up to the age of 25 would be eligible to take part.

RON BANGAY 1924—2018

Ron was one of the founder members of the Kemsing band, when the bells were installed in 1991. He died on 22nd April at the grand age of 93. The quarter peal was rung prior to his cremation on 21st May, which was followed by a Celebration of his Life on 23rd June, at St Mary's, Kemsing. As the footnote to the quarter says, five of the original band rang in the quarter, and Bobbie (who took the photograph) was a good friend from Scouting days.

I can do no better than use some of the words I wrote in 'Look to' (Winter 2014) on the occasion of his 90th birthday.

Ron had to give up ringing in his mid-eighties, and although we still saw him occasionally, we missed his regular attendance on Sundays and at practice. He had not only been an important member of our band, and our 'heavy metal man' (tenor 4-1-5), but our elder statesman as well.

He put his longevity down to a quiet life - he was big in village life, the Church, Scouting, The Royal British Legion, The Saint John Ambulance Brigade, and probably a lot of other things I didn't know about! Outside his leisure activities, his whole working life was spent with Seeboard (previously The County of London Electricity Supply Company). He was there a smidgen short of 50 years having started work at 13 - he was in the Church choir at the time, and he got the job because the then Vicar, the Revd. Vincent Macreth, knew the General Manager of the Company.

Ron stayed on as an Associate of KCACR after hanging up his bellrope, because, as he said, it had given him so much.

He was a lovely man, a great friend of Kemsing bells, and he always had a twinkle in his eye.

Check your Nuts-before they Bolt

I was ringing the treble at Seal Chart on Sunday 12th August, for Sunday Service, when something fell on my shoulder, bounced on the floor, and then hit Annette MacKellar's foot - she was on the second. No, it wasn't a chip, but a five inch bolt, with two washers on the shank. There didn't appear to be anything wrong with the treble, so we rang the bells down, with a view to investigating the mystery later in the week.

Phil Jones and I did this the following Saturday, and Phil quickly found that one of the two bolts connecting the two halves of the wheel was missing (the halving or wheel bolts connect the two long rails of each half wheel), and the nut was in the pit. The photo shows the errant bits, placed either side of the hole where they should have been. Since the bells had been thoroughly checked only eight weeks before, on 12th June, we reckoned the prolonged hot spell had caused the wood to shrink, allowing the nut to work loose. Why there were two washers on the shank when it fell, and no washers, as far as we could see, in the pit, has not been satisfactorily answered. The odds of the washer at the nut end of the bolt both falling down two floors and ending up on the shank is highly improbable. But, then, if two washers had been put together at the other end when the bells were rehung ...?!



As a result of this incident, and a very minor one at Sevenoaks a week later, where a nut was found to be slightly loose on the third's wheel, Stella Wooldridge and I decided to check Chiddingstone's bells. They had been inspected very carefully on 28th April 2018, and we have found that a six-monthly rigorous check is normally sufficient to catch problems before they become large ones.

Stella and I looked on 7th September, and the situation was not as good as we would have expected. Quite a few of the wheel nuts were slightly loose (we would normally expect no more than one or two to be so), and most of the stays had one nut a little bit loose. More worryingly, on the sixth, where the headstock is attached to the wheel, one of the nuts was missing (see photo).



So, on a regular basis, and particularly after extreme hot or wet spells


Post Script A few weeks later it was found that one of the two clapper nuts on the fourth at Leigh was missing, and worse still, the top bolt on the third had disappeared, and the second was in imminent danger of coming off. These bells were checked by Alan Hughes of Whitechapel in October 2017, and have had visual checks since then. Unlike the other examples recorded above, these can ony be explained by the metal expanding in the extreme heat, leaving the nuts loose when the temperature dropped. Stella tells me that they have never experienced anything like this before.

FRASER'S BOOK CORNER

Sally-Ho


I was asked recently, by Eric R, if I knew the derivation of the word sally, as in the 'fluffy bit' on our bell ropes, for the benefit of non-ringers who might come across this piece. I had to admit I hadn't really got a clue, although both of us felt it was likely to be related to the modern meanings of the word. I promised to go forth in an effort to answer him.

Two of my bell/ringing books seemed obvious starting points. The first was David Struckett's (DS) 'A Dictionary of Campanology', published by the author in 1985. This explained that the word probably came from the military term meaning to sally forth or go first, and his source for this was the Oxford English Dictionary (OED).



My second reference was H. Earle Bulwer's 'Glossary of Bell Ringing Terms', produced for the CCCBR, and published in 1901, with a reprint in 1904. Being a glossary, not a dictionary, it wasn't much help, but it did come up with some interesting words. Following the usual definition of sally, the worsted tuft woven into the bell-rope a short distance from its lower end to assist the grasp of the hands, it tells us that, in Yorkshire, tufts are also woven in at the rope's end for the same purpose ('Yorkshire tails' - it's quite difficult, initially, to ring with them, having

effectively a double thickness sally to contend with on the handstroke). It then gives some local synonyms - Tuffing, Solid, Frasers, Frasel! Being a Lancashire lad, I hope Frasers is not a Yorkshire term, and, as for the last, I often feel frazzled when I'm ringing!



Finally, bearing in mind the DS OED reference, I checked my copy of the Shorter OED, which had belonged to my father, and dates from 1933. Here I found a rather more detailed explanation, not only regarding derivation, but also giving other ringing meanings. The illustration shows two of the OED entries, the second referring to bell-ringing. This suggests that originally the word related to the movement of the rope. The date given, 1668, is the publication date of Fabian Stedman's 'Tintinnalogia', the first book on change-ringing.

However, I can find only one reference in that book to sally, in the following part paragraph. 'Before I treat of the method and diversity of Peals, I think it not impertinent to speak something of the Properties wherewith a Young Ringer ought to be qualified, and then proceed to Peals. First then, before he is entred into a Company, it is presupposed, that he is able to set a Bell Fore-stroke and Back-stroke, as the terms are: next that he know how to Ring Round, or Under-sally:'. I'm not sure where that takes us!

The words '[Perh. an application of prec. 7]' in the second 'ringing' entry refer to the first OED entry - '7. A leaping movement' (nautical and dialectic)'. As DS suggests the word came from a military expression, perhaps we should also be looking at the first three definitions in that entry, namely 'a sortie', 'a setting out', or 'a sudden start into activity'. These, and the first part of the OED ringing definition, suggest that the original meaning indicates sally was the hand-stroke, and this is confirmed in 'Clavis Campanalogia' by Jones, Reeves, and Blakemore (1788), which refers to 'the sally (ie hand stroke) and at back stroke'.

The second part of the OED ringing entry is clearly what we refer to as a sally these days, and the date of 1809 suggests that this usage came well after the original meaning. The date 1809 puzzles me, because I cannot trace any bell or ringing book published in that year. The earliest reference to a sally I have found is in Troyte's 'Change Ringing' (1869), where he states that 'The "hand stroke" blow will be the one on which he pulls the "sallie", or tuffing on the rope; the "back stroke," that on which he pulls the end of the rope'. Is it just possible that the OED has given 1809 instead of 1869?!

So, there we have it. The original meaning was the movement of the bell on what we now call the hand stroke, and it was not until sometime in the late 1700s or the first half of the 19th century that the term sally was used for the 'fluffy bit'. * Fraser Clift, Kemsing


