DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING

THE FIRST DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING OF 2019 was held on Saturday 5th January at SS Peter and Paul, Tonbridge at 1pm.

• Welcome

Louise Nightingale as Chairman welcomed District members to the meeting.

Vote of thanks

The Chairman thanked Helen Longley for leading the morning prayer before the ringing as well as David Fullman, the organist, and David Robins from the choir, who led the singing. She also thanked Gillie Bone and team for putting together the lunch spread.

• Minute's silence

Louise asked for a minute's silence to remember the lives of Dot Twiner from Sevenoaks, and John Westacott from Chevening, who had both passed away recently.

• Minutes of the ADM, 6th October, St Mary, Goudhurst and matters arising

The meeting agreed the minutes to be an accurate record of the ADM held at Goudhurst and they were formally accepted after being proposed and seconded by Stan Jenner and Mike Bullett.

Proposed new members

There were seven new members proposed at the meeting. Their nominations were accepted en bloc:

Daniel Weaver (Penshurst) - proposed by Janice Byrne, seconded by Steve Newlands.

• Annual District Financial Statement
Hamilton Woods presented the 2018 Annual
Statement, for information (not approval)
which had been circulated ahead of the
meeting. He noted the District's contribution to
the Spliced Fund (over £900); Hever's
contribution arrived after New Year so will be
included in the 2019 accounts.

The Trivia Evening also generating a healthy contribution from the surplus (£550). Tony Cresswell queried the apparent discrepancy between Mike Bullett's Chairman's report presented at the October ADM and the figure in the accounts for the Trivia Evening contribution (MB quoted the wrong figure).

KCACR matters

The following points were highlighted:

- The proposal to change membership subs (as covered at the District ADM in October) will be discussed at the AGM on Monday 22nd April at Chilham, in the Canterbury District. If members wish to influence the discussion and vote then they need to attend the AGM.
- Louise noted, for information only, that a proposal to review the AGM date for 2020 onwards will be discussed at the General Committee in February, to consider moving it to the 2nd Saturday in May from Easter Monday. Views should be forwarded to District Secretary who will pass on comments to the Association Secretary ahead of the General Committee meeting.
- The KCACR Treasurer is stepping down, so nominations for new Treasurer are invited ahead of the AGM in April; please contact the District Secretary (Tondist@gmail.com).
- For Health & Safety considerations, tower risk assessments are necessary and appropriate measures should be taken as required. Towers must conduct regular risk assessments as well as being aware of risks from visiting ringers who may be unfamiliar with the tower and bells. There is also a need to protect individuals, which encompasses understanding who's ringing, whether there are vulnerable individuals; any special measures that are required; but trying to encourage ringing of all standards
- Tower handbook: A reminder that if members want their own print copy they should order it on the website. Towers get 1 copy free; they can buy a second copy. Angela Clark noted that at the 2018 AGM the arrangements for picking up pre-ordered handbooks was a bit chaotic and asked that a message for better organisation is passed on to the Association. Phil Jarvis noted that when placing orders a Thank You message appeared but there was no email confirmation (2 actions for District Secretary to take to the Handbook editor).
- The Association is reviewing the insurer currently used for liability, specifically to see if a different insurer might raise the age limit (currently set at 75 years)

DISTRICT QUARTERLY MEETING

- Catherine Lewis shared an update on the Mobile Ring, providing some background. There have been questions over its usage, eg in place of hiring the Charmborough Ring; might it be used to encourage youngsters, as a teaching aid; might a simulator be added. Importantly, it needs to pay for itself, eg renting it out for weddings in non-church venues. There remain questions over storage – where, how – it is currently in Catherine's garage; and its design – ease of build / dismantling is important, which will also inform the answer to storage.

• Forthcoming events

- Surprise Major Practice (methods confirmed C N Y S, plain courses and spliced), Edenbridge (8, 14-0-7) Saturday 16th February, 7pm to 9pm
- District Training Day, Saturday 2nd March.
- 10 Bell Practice, Staplehurst (10, 19-2-7), Saturday 16th March, 10am to 12 noon.
- DQM, Chevening (8, 10-1-13) Saturday 6th April, 4pm 8pm (finishing with Compline). Jen Thomas added that the SEECON youth striking contest also takes place on 6th April, which the Kent Association is hosting at Horton Kirby in the morning. Towers for general ringing open after 2pm. Jen asked for help with stewarding etc and noted that she hoped some of the ringers would manage to make the DQM later in the day. Eric Roughley asked for a definition of a 'young ringer'!

• Any other business

- Steph Rueff explained her role leading the social media presence, in particular the Facebook group.
- Eric Roughley asked about the balance of the Trivia Evening profits, after the contribution to KCACR and where it goes. Hamilton Woods explained that the cost of Look to is over £480. Various comments were made on the appeal and demand for Look to in its print form, whether it is necessary and viable (action Secretary to canvas views to inform a discussion at the next Committee meeting). Catherine Lewis suggested that members might

like their own copies, paying a sub. Steph Rueff noted that it is available online, via the KCACR website.

- Answering a query on District funds, Hamilton explained that he retains cash and forwards the balance to the County Treasurer at end of year; the Committee had made the decision to provide flexibility.

The meeting closed at 13:30.

TRAINING MATTERS

Plain Bob and Grandsire Doubles at Edenbridge - Saturday 2nd March

I arrived at the delightful church of SS Peter and Paul at Edenbridge on a chilly March morning, not quite knowing what to expect. This was my first training day, even though I have been ringing for about 4 years. Signing up for the emails earlier in my bell ringing life might have helped!

We had three learners, six helpers and our trainer was Janice Byrne.

The first half hour ish was a theory session which was held in the church itself. The theory is always useful and even though it doesn't make much sense to me at the time, I know that it will do once I have made the mistakes in my ringing, which for me unlocks the key to the theory. A good trainer will always try to find different ways of helping learners to retain, and to understand the significance of what they are being taught. Janice certainly did that with an exciting demonstation of Grandsire, which she paced out with stickers on her boots to indicate the handstrokes and backstrokes.

We then ascended the stairs to the light and airy ringing chamber. This is a lovely surprise. The bells are arranged around a square balcony, (a bit like a Minstrels' gallery) so that you can look down to the floor below. The bells are a joy to ring too. Most of the ringing session concentrated on Grandsire.

Plain Hunt at Speldhurst - Sat 2nd March

I was rather reluctant to attend the training day as I had become rather disenchanted with ringing. Whist my bell handling and call changes were fine I felt I had come to a standstill; I just could not progress with rope sight, I found it quite impossible. However the training day was a game changer.

Ray Taylor was incredibly enthusiastic and patient as were the whole team of helpers; Howard Rogers, Anthony Leeves, Caroline Levy Cooper, Emma Tamkin, Alexander Runting and Anne Rueff - my thanks to all of them for their time and encouragement. I now feel much more capable ringing Plain Hunt and with my rope sight, thus happier with my ringing.

PENSHURST TOWER NEWS

About 6 years ago there was talk about installing a ringing floor at Penshurst. It has been suggested by several experienced bell hangers that it would make the bells easier to ring. Indeed at the time there was a donor who was prepared to pay for this project. We asked three firms of bell hangers to take a look at the bells and give their opinion on the condition of them, and whether a ringing platform would make it easier to handle the bells. We were told by all three firms that the bells needed rehanging fairly urgently – regardless of whether or not a ringing floor was installed.

Penshurst Church has been affecting a series of works over the past few years. The first phase was to install a toilet and a kitchen in the church and to upgrade the boiler and the lighting in the nave. Some of the pews were removed and the nave was redecorated. This work was completed for Christmas 2014. The second phase of the work will be to the chancel. The plan is to remove the rood screen and some of the pews to allow the church to be used for concerts and other functions. The lighting will be upgraded and the chancel redecorated. Once this work is complete, the next item to be addressed will be the bells.

We are rather fortunate that since Carl Nightingale – one of the Cowden ringers - has been on a bell maintenance course, he has been helping us out with the maintenance of Penshurst bells; I can only assume he wanted a challenge. Back in November Carl noticed a crack in the wooden headstock of the 6th. He marked the extent of the crack with a pen. A few weeks later when he checked the bell again it was clear that the crack was getting bigger. We contacted Whites – one of the firms who inspected the bells in 2013 - and they have advised us not to the ring the bell until it has been repaired. Whites have said that the crack could have been caused by the hot dry summer. They said that they have come across similar issues elsewhere.

The Thursday evening Penshurst practise has been moved to Speldhurst for the time being. We are practising on the simulator. Thank you to Eric Roughly and Anthony Leeves for allowing us to use their bells. Up until recently we have still been ringing Penshurst bells on Sunday mornings for the 10am service but leaving the 6th out.

The tune is not sounding great! It is a shame this has happened as we have recently recruited several new ringers who are progressing well and coping admirably with the challenge of Penshurst bells. Until the recent discovery we had been able to ring all 8 bells regularly for Services.

It is unlikely that the bells will be rehung within the next two years as the work on the chancel is planned to commence first. In the meantime we are looking into the possibility of getting just the 6th rehung. We are currently waiting for a quote for this work.

Catherine Lewis Brasted

What was your line of work outside ringing? First job was delivering Christmas mail – and it delivered my only non-ringing boyfriend ever! Careerwise it was all programming and computers one way and another.

What attracted you to ringing and how did you get started?

I went (briefly) to a Sunday school at Stoke d'Abernon (Surrey), where a new light 5 just happened to be going in. They recruited 11 and 12 year olds.

Who taught you how to handle a bell?

Arthur Holden at Cobham. Think I may have been polished up by the band at Leatherhead though.

Where did you ring in those early days? Stoke d'Abernon and Leatherhead (10).

Which method did you learn first? Plain Bob or Grandsire?

Grandsire - more people did back then.

Do you have any preferred or favourite method(s)?

Not so much that, but I do prefer larger numbers of bells. Just a shame there isn't even a ten in the Tonbridge District.

Have you had any alarming ringing moments?

No, unless you count the ascent to John's Lane, Dublin. Normal stone stairs and then, all of a sudden you're out on an openwork metal spiral staircase MILES above the nave.

What has been your funniest ringing moment to date?

Must've been some – just don't remember.

Do you have any favourite ring(s) of bells?

Not particularly – I don't seem to think like that. Maybe because I'm not very musical – can go to sleep in a concert any time. Any bells and any method is good if the ringing's good.

What would be your key tip or piece of advice for beginners?

I always like to help with handling things if I see something that might be useful (I fear to other people's annoyance sometimes).



It's so vital. The other thing, at a later stage, is about the value of getting out to other towers. A related thought: We all try to help others with their ringing and just some bits of advice have a good lasting effect; I really wish I knew which of the older people who were around when I was beginning were the ones who made the difference. (Not that I don't still take advice!)

What in your opinion is the most logical way to call changes?

Up because the two who change places are mentioned, which I think is a better lead in to change ringing.

Most satisfying ringing achievement so far? Lots. Starting Tonbridge District Training Days, running in Kent the largest CC MTM (Management, Teaching and Maintenance) Course ever, *The New Ringer's Book*, Brasted Bell Restoration Project. None of them are exactly ringing are they?

Do you have any yet to be fulfilled ringing ambitions?

Peal of Maximus.

Daftest ringing thing you've ever done? Ring a 10,000.

What is your opinion of technological ringing aids such as Mobel, Abel, and Methodology? Mobel / Abel etc: Brilliant! So many uses - providing "electronic sound control", ringing alone with one on a real bell or keyboard, sound for dumbells, etc. However I still use squared paper to test myself on methods. Don't use methodology – wrong phone.

Have approaches to teaching beginners and handling changed radically since you started? If so how?

Not much overall, but they should have.

What would be your advice for someone about to attempt their first peal?

Don't wash up without gloves beforehand and remember to move your feet now and then.

What do you find to be the most personally enjoyable aspect of ringing?

There's so many. But perhaps I don't know really - I've never had to exist without it.

DOROTHY ANN TWINER 1943 - 2018

Dot started to ring in 2002 under Mike Worthington's tutelage at Sevenoaks, where she became a member of the band, as the bells at Seal where she lived, were not "learners' bells" at that time. She never lost her connection with Seal, and when ringing started more regularly at Seal Chart, she was also a loyal member supporting their Sunday ringing before heading over to Sevenoaks.

From early on Dot made steady progress. In learning call changes she found empty yoghurt pots surprisingly helpful (no one ever found out why). As she learned more methods she became a useful member of the Sevenoaks band, and in later years was also a regular at Otford practice nights.

Never confident in her abilities, she was generally a little nervous when ringing. Quite often she stated her intention to quit ringing (which would have pleased her husband Roy as he hated the bells!) but she still persisted nonetheless and never carried out her threat. In fact after a long absence from a broken wrist she was doubtful of being able to ring again. Phil Jones, the tower captain at Seal Chart, encouragingly said "it's just like riding a bike, you don't forget". Dot's reply was to state that she couldn't ride a bike! She rang several quarter peals, and loved the friendship and challenge ringing gave her.

Had she not persisted we would have been without one of the most friendly, helpful, cheery and ever welcoming members of our band. As well as Dot joining training days and supporting ringers' meetings, she and Roy were very well known across the District because, for more years than could ever have been expected, they would do every bit of washing up for over 150 people at the annual Tonbridge District Trivia Evening. They would turn up early and work hard for hours, with such a smile and efficiency, rarely seen at such a task. So often they would disappear before they were thanked, they made no fuss but their contribution was always valued.

It is only right to also talk about Roy, Dot's husband and much loved other half. Dot was very upset when Roy became ill, and she dedicated herself to caring for and supporting him. She was desperately sad when he died in July 2018. She had hoped to ring in a quarter peal in



his memory, and it was a terrible shock when shortly after this, Dot herself fell ill, and in a very short space of time, she herself died from cancer on 29 December 2018. We hope she has taken comfort from joining Roy, and they leave behind their children Paul and Sarah and much loved grandchildren. Dot won't just be remembered as a loyal ringer, but for the lovely and friendly lady she was. On the day of her funeral Seal church was packed and many members of the district rang the bells in her memory—a fitting send off for a true friend.


The Charmborough Ring is available for hire by ringers who want to promote ringing among the wider public and attract new recruits. It always draws enthusiastic observers and participants.

FELLOWSHIP OF RINGERS QUIZ

Following Nick's article about his global travels and opportunities to visit towers around the world, he has prepared a follow up quiz, with a few landmarks from over the last year:



1. Where is this bell, and why might Galileo have heard it ringing? Construction of the cathedral it's attached to commenced before the technology existed to build the unsupported dome for which it is now famous.



2. This bell has a very special significance, commemorating a deeply harrowing event that took place in 1945. Its accessible by Shinkansen train in about four hours on the Nozomi

express from Tokyo. The bell can be rung by members of the public, who are invited to contemplate its meaning, as its sombre deep resonance slowly dies away.



3. This unusual ring of eight is in a city founded in 1296. Its name means "New City" and it's not far from a city with a similar name that became famous as a result of the rescue of a boys football team last year.



4. This cathedral has 12 bells cast in Moscow, the largest of which weighs 12 tonnes and can be heard 20km away. The smallest weighs only 10 kg. Until recently they were rung by 78 year old Maria Zabova three times a day, rain or shine. The cathedral is named after Alexander Nevsky.

CARRY ON CLANGING!

Thanks to our spotters this issue for the following contributions: -

- Lamberhurst one February morning. A large working party made up of congregation, PCC members, and ringers convenes to erect a scaffolding tower in the ringing chamber in order to help screw a very loose rope guide back to the ceiling. Just as it gets repositioned in place around the rope an advisory shout from a lady ringer goes up "make sure it comes through nice and centrally, we don't want any chafing!"
- Tonbridge practice, and a visitor new to treble ringing expresses misgivings when placed to treble for Bob doubles, on the grounds that unlike in plain hunt "the bells will change positions." To which the swift retort comes "Nonsense you'll be fine, you're known as a positions man aren't you?"




6. Finally, coming full circle, some of you will have rung the bell attached to the rope these three gentlemen are pictured with. While the bell is inscribed with the names of two of their fathers, and the mother of the third, the ringers pictured are from both Kent and Texas. A living example of the global fellowship of bellringers! Where is it, and, to make it a little more challenging, what number bell is it? All answers will be published in the next issue.

As a bit of a bell book buff, it's always exciting to come across an item I've never seen, or better still not heard of, before. I guess that's true of all collectors, be they hoarders of buttons, bell books, or even butterflies. With the former the numbers will be ginormous (keep going, Angela!)*, and for the latter much fewer and quite finite, with very few new species to discover, and those probably in remote lands. Bell books are clearly nearer to butterflies (in number!), with a few fairly good bibliographies and library lists to identify them, but neither source exhaustive.

Incidentally, butterfly collecting, unlike in my youth, is virtually extinct, as indeed are some of the butterflies. It is now illegal to catch the rarest ones, and some of the less scarce types cannot be caught for onward sale. None can be captured without the consent of the land owner on whose land they are caught. Mind you, collecting was probably never a major cause of the decline in numbers, but insecticides and changing land use certainly are.


One of my recent acquisitions fills the 'exciting' category, for me. It is a, rather austere, little booklet by William Wooding Starmer (approximately 7" x 5", slightly smaller than A5), with four black and white illustrations. The front cover and title page are shown below.



I know you will be saying that Withyham is out of District and County, but, being so close, many of you will know its lovely ring of eight Taylor bells. And it does have a connection with Tunbridge Wells, this being the home of the author and the location of the printing works.


The content, of eleven pages, is described as ".. an amplification of the writer's 'Notes on the Bells of Withyham Church' contributed to Vol. LI of the Sussex Archaeological Society's Publications".

This was published in 1908, dating the booklet to that year, or shortly afterwards. The Sussex piece runs to only four pages, and this in turn refers to Amherst Daniel-Tyssen's 'The Church Bells of Sussex', published in 1864. This lists the, then, six Withyham bells, and the Starmer booklet shows these bells on the next page.



FRASER'S BOOK CORNER





The 1864 book is the first devoted solely to the church bells of a county. The Rev. W. C. Lukis's volume, 'An Account of Church Bells, with some notices of Wiltshire Bells and Bellfounders', 1857, contains general information on bells, and a listing of some Wiltshire bells.

For reasons of space, I'll tell you a bit about William Wooding Starmer some other time, and maybe a little more about Withyham's bells.

The booklet tells us that the church was largely destroyed by fire - "June ye 16, 1663, was Wytheham (sic) Church burnt down by a tempest of thunder and lightning". At this time there were probably five bells there. Following rebuilding, five bells were cast by Michael Darbie in 1674. He "was an itinerant founder, whose reputation (in founding, and "business morals"!) was not the best". In 1715 the first three bells were recast by John Wylett, who also added a new treble. These four bells were "very bad castings", and when the treble was broken up it was "found to be not more than the thickness of a sixpence (2 1/2p) in several places in the waist". Since a sixpence is about 1.5 mm thick, the bell would have been nearly a sieve, and would have sounded like a bucket, in bell parlance!

The Taylor ring of eight, dedicated in April 1908, must have been very much needed and, indeed, welcomed by the ringers and parishioners of Withyham, and aren't we lucky to have such beautiful bells so near to us. ***** Fraser Clift, Kemsing

JOHN WESTACOTT 1929 — 2018

Born in 1929 at Turvins Farm, John lived the whole of his life on the Chevening Estate on the flank of the North Downs. He married, raised a family, took over the mixed arable and dairy farm from his father and in due time passed the tenancy to his son. A great character and pillar of society, among many other contributions John played his part in the Parish Council, the village cricket team and the county-wide farming community as well as being a life-long worshipper at, and staunch supporter of St Botolph's, Chevening. At just short of 70, John was one of those who came forward to form the new band when the bells were augmented to six and hung for change ringing in 1999. He learned to handle a bell at Hadlow under Peter Romney and Marian Pickard and gave many years devoted service at Chevening as ringer and sometime steeple-keeper. Eventually the years took their toll and climbing or descending the tower was no longer possible - even on his knees! In later years he still enjoyed listening to, and commenting on, the Sunday morning ringing while ensconced in his favourite pew with a not very surreptitious copy of "Farmer's Weekly". John passed away peacefully at The Hospice in the Weald on 4th December 2018 after a long life well lived. We miss you!
