Canterbury Canter to 8 Bell Victory

The competition this year took place at Hoo St Werburgh in the Rochester District on 23rd June. A touch of 280 Oxford Bob Triples was the test piece and five of the six Districts competed. The judges were Jason Hughes and David Bath from St John's, Croydon. The draw took place promptly at 3.45 and the first team went into changes 15 minutes later. The Hoo ringers provided teas throughout the afternoon.

By the time the judges were ready to announce the results, the final team to compete had taken their tea and a few touches of general ringing had taken place. Frank Lewis, Chairman of the KCACR, welcomed everyone to Hoo, and Jason began by thanking the Association for inviting David and himself to judge the competition. He explained briefly how the judging had been carried out and then asked David to comment upon the performances.

David's remarks were constructive and helpful; he didn't single out particular failings but offered general advice where he felt that improvements could have been made. Peal times had varied from 2hr 56min to 3hr 10min and in the event it was the three teams that avoided these extremes who had benefited in the final analysis. Jason then returned to centre stage and announced the results as under:

Philip Larter received the trophy on behalf of the Canterbury District and Frank Lewis concluded the proceedings by thanking the judges, the local ringers for their excellent arrangements, the Rev'd David Low for the use of the bells, and all the participants and team organisers. It had been a very successful afternoon, blessed by lovely weather.

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



The 2001 "Not the Hereford" Ringing Course

Thursday 19th-Saturday 21st April

As news that the out-break of Foot and Mouth had claimed yet another victim - the Hereford Ringing Course - reached me, I was very disappointed. Having been ringing for three years, and having heard all the stories that accompany this event, I would miss the first one that I was eligible to attend. I was not the only one who felt this way; veterans of this excursion from my tower were also shaking their heads in disbelief. Following a call from Jo Moreton (co-founder of the Hereford Ringing Course), Margaret "you Maycey some improvement" Macey and James Hardy put their thinking caps on and came up with a solution: a three day ringing course to be held in the district. The itinerary hinted at a very intensive few days and we soon found out that this was to be the case.

Starting on Thursday 19th April at Beckenham, the six

students were split into two groups: one focusing on Plain Hunt, and the other on Plain Bob Doubles/ Minor. And so the course began. After respective theoretical sessions, and a practical at Beckenham, we proceeded to Eltham, and discovered that the selected pub for lunch put on very good food, but was distinctly lacking on the Real Ale front. After time had been allowed for meals to go down, the next practical session

began in earnest, with progress being made in both groups. On our return to Beckenham for tea at 5.15pm, it soon dawned upon us students, and in particular, the helpers, that there were still two and a quarter hours before the day's ringing would be over, as Thursday is Beckenham's practice night. The second practical session at Beckenham that day was not as productive as the first two, as brains were beginning to switch off by this stage. We adjourned to the fish shop for a welcomed meal, and then returned for the practice night, leaving most of the ringing to the other members of the Beckenham band and the regular attending visitors not on the course. The sighs of relief were distinctly audible as the fifteen or so of us wandered to the Jolly Woodman, to discuss the day's activities, and examine hands for any signs of blisters.

Friday morning came and another theory session got us back in the groove for ringing, with enthusiasm fully restored after the hard day experienced previously. While waiting to be let in at Bermondsey, we engaged in an unplanned, pre-ring "team building exercise" (Don't ask but it involved untying

human knots!). A much needed lunch was enjoyed in The Mayflower, Rotherhithe. Beer and food was consumed, with one particular member being very fussy about the amount of cream that should be given out with helpings of fudge cake. Once the dust had settled from this dispute, we walked the hundred yards down the road to the church. The ringing commenced in a very nice room, complete with chandelier. Although the bells were a bit "clangy", to use the offered technical term, it was plain to see (no pun intended) that the theory taken in earlier was beginning to pay off. The "plain hunters'" rope-sight began to improve, and the Bob Doubles group (freshly up-graded to Minor) began to follow the calls of 'bob' and 'single' being hurled at them. As this session ended and people were whisked away in various cars, talk began of the social evening at AMF Lewisham Bowling. But first, thirsts had to be quenched, so the Wetherspoon's in Lewisham, a worthy candidate, was visited, and definitely got my vote. The bowling, after explaining to a few people that the idea was to hit the little white things at the other side of the room with the ball (two of our group managed to get over half way through the first game before hitting anything!), passed very well. It certainly made a change from the more traditional approach of sitting in the pub.

The final day began in Foots Cray church hall, where a

Notes from KCACR Meeting held on May 5th 2001

Handbook - All known discrepancies were noted. A request was made for any further problems to be directed to Dickon Love.

Insurance - The Secretary advised the meeting that a list of the most frequently asked questions was being compiled and would be sent out to all districts.

Reports were received in respect of Training, Publicity and Bell Restoration (see next column).

David Sheehey reported that a Membership Secretary is still being sought. He was aware of two people possibly interested.

Golden Jubilee - A Bank Holiday on 4.6.02 will commemorate the occasion. County will produce a certificate to be available to any towers wishing to ring something to mark the occasion, detail to be left to each individual tower.

Sevenoaks Ringing Books - These are ancient books on ringing, some in a state of disrepair. Two books which are duplicated are to be sold to pay for the restoration and secure keeping of the remainder.

St. John's Deptford Ringing Books - Raised by Nick Davies who was concerned that if they were not properly cared for they too might fall into disrepair. It was resolved that Nick, Hazel Catlett (County Librarian) and Jim Rooke (Lewisham District Librarian) will liase with the Vicar, Rev. April Keech to discuss the issue and progress to ensure that all interested parties are satisfied.

New Kent Rail Link - A request has been received from Connex asking if KCACR would like to organise ringing at towers along the route on 28.9.03 when the line is officially opened, this being the newest railway line for over 100 years. The meeting felt that we shouldn't support such an event as the construction of it has blighted the Kent countryside. This was carried by a vote. However, it was subsequently decided to keep our options open to review this decision should the Rail Company wish to provide a suitable donation towards the BRF and also to ask the Districts for their views.

Telecommunication Aerials - Concern was expressed about the increased use of church towers by telephone companies, there are operational and health and safety issues which must be taken into account prior to any agreement being made. A leaflet with this detail is to be compiled and sent to each district. Also Publicity will make recommendations about how to deal with any enquiries.

BRF fund - It was noted that Lewisham District had raised the smallest amount of money towards the fund (published in the handbook) last year. The suggested target for the current year is that each tower should aim for £50.00, with a minimum target of £1000.00 for each district.

Bell Restoration Sub-committee Report for December to April, 2001

The period since the last report in November has been very quiet for Bell Restoration.

Waltham bells have at last been finished. This is now a pleasant-going ring of six that sounds normal! The work has been carried out by Hayward Mills.

The three bells at **West Peckham** have also been rehung with Taylors carrying out the work.

Lyminge have decided to have their bells rehung with new fittings. They have already had the clappers renovated and the rest of the work is likely to be carried out at the end of the year. We shall assist.

We have given advice at **Eastchurch** about the general state of the bells and have offered to carry out the site work when they have raised sufficient funds for the scheme.

Gravesend and Biggin Hill both have Hastings stays and we have given assistance. At Gravesend we have identified problems a n d explained how to get over them. At Biggin Hill, one bell was giving trouble because the stay was a fraction



too long and we have corrected that.

At **Ightham** we have greased the pulley wheels but the clappers need rebushing. At **Elham** we have fitted a new stay and given advice at **High Halden**.

At **Thurnham** they are proposing to install a rope guide and re-rope one of the bells. The work being necessary because a kitchen and toilet have been installed at the base of the tower.

Staple have decided to have their derelict ring of four rehung dead and we have offered to carry out all the site work for them. Two of the bells will also be tuned and one will need welding.

The impending rehang at **Dover** seems to be a little nearer and there is a chance that we shall be taking them out of the tower this summer.

There are no grant applications for this meeting to consider.

County Membership Secretary


Attention was drawn to the fact that this vacancy had not been filled at the A.G.M. Interest in the position was expressed by Mr. Steve Kennett.
