The County 8 Bell Competition took place at Speldhurst in the Tonbridge District on $22^{\text {nd }}$ June, with four Districts taking part. It was felt that the other two Districts would have shown a little more in the way of social graces had they actually told the organisers they weren't coming, but this is 2002 after all, so what more can one expect? However . . .

A splendid tea was provided by the locals, the weather was not too hot and not too cold - ideal in fact for standing round the churchyard listening to the ringing and gossiping with old friends - and it's fair to say that a good time was had by all (at least until the results were given out).

The question of the draw was a bit of a puzzler for County Hon Gen Sec Peter Dale. We'd heard on the grapevine that one of the Districts was not coming so we were able to narrow the draw numbers down to 5 , but no one knew anything about the other District, so it was decided that we'd draw for 4 and tell the missing 5th band they'd have to ring last anyway. So far so good, but it then transpired that one of the 4 teams was not yet complete. After some discussion it was agreed that another draw be made, which was done, and the new ringing sequence duly posted on the noticeboard outside the tower. Then . . . you've guessed it - the missing ringers turned up so it was back to plan B. Or do I mean A?


The judges were Ken Davenport from Wokingham and David Struckett from Finchampsted, both in what used to be called Berkshire. Ken started the results ball rolling by telling us that he was doing just what his son told him he did best - telling other ringers what to do, whilst not getting involved himself! They had attempted to keep records of peal speeds, but somehow they'd managed to forget after the first couple of entries, so we had to be content with straight comments and results. [Actually teams 1 and 2 rang quite slowly, while teams 3 and 4 rang much faster. Hope this helps. Webmaster] Ken noted that all teams had had problems with the oddstruckness of some of the middle bells and that all had varied their speeds from lead to lead. David then came to centre stage and announced the results as under:

We also wish to dedicate this quarter to the memory of Princess Margaret, and to mark the interring of both in the tomb of the late King George VI this evening. A half-muffled peal of Yorkshire was also rung on Saturday $6^{\text {th }}$ April by a visiting band. (Alex Britton)

There was a peal of Love Bug Surprise Major on $6{ }^{\text {th }}$ April at Bromley Parish Church, rung open in thanksgiving for the life of the Queen Mother. (Dickon Love)


At Biggin Hill on $9^{\text {th }}$ April, we rang halfmuffled rounds and call changes from 11am to 11.25 am , just prior to the Queen Mother's funeral and then tolled the tenor 101 times. Two of the ringers (Alex Hallinan and Marc Hanscombe) were released from school for the occasion. (Nancy Gay)

The band at Hayes met as usual for practice night on $9^{\text {th }}$ April and rang half-muffled call changes and plain hunt. Then, with the arrival of a visitor from Bromley Common, we were able to ring a touch of Bob Doubles with one of our ringers unaffected. Also 11-year-old Zachary Burrows, who has recently learned to handle a bell, rang half-muffled rounds on three for the first time. (Sue Fisher)

We fitted the muffles for the Tuesday of the funeral, when we rang about 40 mins of call changes half-muffled with the tenor open. At Eltham, we rang with the bells half-muffled between Sunday $31^{\text {st }}$ March and Tuesday $9^{\text {th }}$ April, for Sundays, the AGM and a Tuesday practice. "So who's good at maths then?" I found myself asking a group of 7-11 year olds. Nearly all of them put up their hands. Plenty of time yet to become disillusioned I thought! Nevertheless, it was encouraging that they all enjoyed numbers because I was just about to explain the intricacies of Plain Hunt.


No, I was not running some recruitment campaign to 'catch 'em young'; I had in fact been coerced into taking my daughters Brownie evening. Several weeks earlier, Brown Owl had waylaid me on behalf of a couple of girls who would be leaving in July. These Brownies had earned nearly every badge availableexcept for the bellringing one-and she wanted to know whether I could help.

Having checked out what was required it soon became obvious that tower bells were out, partly because of the age of the girls and partly as the requirements were obviously set by someone who had not the faintest idea about ringing!

The handbell section looked more promising though- the only difficulty being that Crayford does not possess a set of handbells. Having enlisted the help of Rupert, Cathy and Andrew, we quickly discovered that St Mary Cray had a large set, which they were prepared to lend. Over the next $4 / 5$ weeks, Andrew and myself tried to master ringing two bells at once-not easy when we often struggle to ring one in the right place!

We planned our evening and all too soon it arrived. Nine Brownies turned up (several others were involved in a school production) and we set out a ring of twelve- perfect with Rupert, Andrew and myself joining in to keep some semblance of order. We started out by learning the different parts of the bell and guessing what each was made of. They

were then shown how to ring the handstroke and backstroke, which they discovered was not as easy as it looked. Each had just one bell and, having learnt to ring it as best they could, we then proceeded to ring rounds quite successfully.

The Plain Hunt theory session turned out to be a revelation. Having explained how the bells swap over in the most child friendly way I could think of, the girls were able to predict the

next line of ringing with very little help. One perceptive child even noticed how each bell moved in a diagonal pattern.

Having looked at the theory, we then went on to ring Plain Hunt on twelve in a game that I called 'Musical Brownies'. Everyone had one bell which they held onto all the time. They were then lined up and moved with their bell, up and down the line, until they got back to their original position. We listened carefully for back rounds and I was very pleased when it did come round successfully.

Although an hour and a quarter seemed a long while to fill up, it soon went, leaving no time for tune ringing, the music for which was kindly lent by Dartford. The girls all appeared to enjoy the evening, seeing and doing something they had never experienced before. The vast majority, of course, will never do anything like it again, but you never know. One day you might have someone knocking on your tower door saying "... years ago when I was a Brownie..." and you'll know where that spark of interest came from!

Well, apart from one or two hiccups, healthwise, that's how our 50 years of marriage has been; 1952 to 2002 on the 15 th of July to be precise.

We both learned to ring at St. Luke's Church, Heywood, Lancs, and that is where we were married. The church has a splendid tower topped by a tall, slender spire, housing a superb Gillett and Johnson 8, tenor $213 / 4 \mathrm{cwt}$. and second to none in the area.

Our first quarter peal together, Plain Bob Minor, was rung at Heywood, on the back six. How majestic that sounded (or so we thought at the time).

Peggy's first peal was our first together, Stedman Triples, at our first attempt, unfortunately not at Heywood. Eventually, Peggy did ring a peal of Double Norwich at Heywood, becoming the first lady to ring a peal on the bells of St. Luke's.
Most of our peal ringing was done between 1950 and 1960, at

which point we both started intensive study courses, gaining Technical and Educational Qualifications to further our careers. Can you imagine, two proud Lancastrians having to thank Leeds University for that !

Peggy only rang one peal between 1960 and 1970. I did slightly better with just six.

In 1970 our efforts to attain a career change came to fruition and we moved to Kent: new jobs, new home, new lifestyle, (still happy and glorious). We were welcomed most heartily at Eynsford. We remember ringing at ground level, then, the congregation having to pass between the ropes as they entered the church. Colin Lucas was ringing master, and we have particularly happy memories of those times: outings, practices followed by a short session in the local, ringers parties etc.
At this time we also trained a band of young ringers at Farningham to a standard where the band was self-sufficient.


After 1970 we only rang one peal together, Erin Caters, rung half-muffled at Rochester for the funeral of the Duke of Windsor. I rang one further peal at Farningham, Cambridge Minor, with our eldest son, Ian, his first peal and possibly my last. The late and sadly missed Tony Lewis called it from the treble. Graham John and Keith Brown also rang in it.

We became disillusioned by the Church Commissioners' treatment of Farningham Parish Church in the early 1970's, and as a result of this we gave up ringing. Unfortunately, our new band at Farningham did not survive for long after our departure (who knows, perhaps the feelings of some of the members were as strong as ours). We felt that in standing up for our principles we had let the rest of the team down, but that's another story!

During our period of non-ringing our energies went into designing and physically building a holiday home in France which we still have after 28 years. The project both strengthened and enriched our relationship, with not one moment of regret.

After several years the love of ringing lured us back, much older and finding it rather difficult to remember those methods and principles which we had thought were wellentrenched in our memories. No more peals, just a few quarters and service ringing. Our ringing has deteriorated; our health most certainly has. We rang in 2000, not knowing it probably was Peggy's last ringing experience. In January she suffered an accident which resulted in her being unable to stand long enough to ring.

Eleven years of retirement and two 70th birthdays well passed, but our marriage goes from strength to strength.

We hope this small potted ringing history will be of interest to our KCACR friends, as we celebrate our Golden Wedding and head, hopefully, towards our Diamond Anniversary.

Parish Share - Applicable in Rochester Diocese only. Any income generated for bell restoration boosts the Parish Income for the year and increases the contribution that the Parish has to make towards Diocesan funds. Certain items can be off set so that the Parish Share is unaffected, such as repairs to the organ or the fabric of the Church, bells, unfortunately, are not treated this way. The Secretary had taken this issue up with the Diocese. The view now is that any Parish affected will need to donate their money to the Bell Fund and this will then be taken into account when grants are approved by KCACR. This does not apply to the Southwark Diocese.

Ringing World Diary - A letter had been received asking if KCACR would consider reducing the information published in the diary (Page 10 of this year's diary). After discussion the meeting felt that this would be inappropriate.

Conducting Day - To be held on $24^{\text {th }}-26^{\text {th }}$ October. There was a good response from people wishing to learn how to conduct. There are still some places left and the course will cover a variety of methods from Bob Doubles to almost anything that is asked for (subject to demand).

Publicity - The "Welcome to the Association" leaflet and Tower Certificates for Jubilee Ringing is now available (please contact Len Morley). The County Web Site has now had 9160 hits (now over 10,000-Ed), the post of Web Master will be required in future, if anyone is interested. Please note: children's names will not be entered on the Web.

Bell Restoration - Sub-committee report circulated, grants approved for Lyminge (£3000) and Wingham (£1450). Approval given to the Bell Restoration Committee to purchase a trailer for equipment storage and transporting equipment ( $£ 1575+\mathrm{VAT}$ ). Approval was also given to raise the maximum grant level from $£ 3000$ to $£ 4000$. It was suggested that the old trailer (much smaller and lighter) might be used to transport the jubi peal around when required. A problem has also been experienced with a visiting band at Bicknor where considerable damage has occurred. The visitors rang with permission but it was felt that a future handbook disclaimer would be useful to help safe guard the Association from claims from visiting ringers.

Chatham Dockyard Bells - There is a change of use in respect of the Dockyard Church. However, it has been decided that the tower and the bells will remain. The Restoration Subcommittee has had some input and future ringing will be
limited.

Membership Secretary - Urgently required, apparently we may have a volunteer in the Lewisham District

50 Year Certificates - These are to be presented to Maisie Cooper and Mary Marshall. Arrangements will be held to do this at their home towers.

Review of KCACR Committee - Peter Romney presented the proposed changes to the present structure. This will reduce the number of members from the present 40 to around a dozen. The frequency of the meetings will double and it is hoped to bring the Committee closer to the Districts to enable more decisions to be made at District level. Discussion followed chiefly about the role of administration. It was also felt that at least one Central Council Rep should attend meetings. A long discussion took place about the role of Vice Presidents and their right to attend. This was resolved when the 2 Vice Presidents present advised they were happy with the proposals. It was felt that the Handbook Editor should attend. Peter Romney will revise the document. It will then be circulated to the Districts for discussion at the July Meeting. Any comments are to be fed back by the end of August (Len Morley will collate these). If the Districts are in favour of the proposed changes they will, after amendment, be formally ratified at next years AGM. All members subscribing to the Lewisham District Group email will receive this information before the meeting.
Later in the year the working group will meet to take account of any amendments and any revision of the rules that might be necessary.

Eight Bell Competition - To be held at Speldhurst on $22^{\text {nd }}$ June 2002. The method is a plain course of Yorkshire Surprise Major, draw is at 4.15 pm for a 4.30 pm start. Refreshments will be available in the Church.

Essex Trophy -10 bell competition to be held on $14^{\text {th }}$ September 2002, Dr P.Barnes will seek members for the band, the method is Pudsey Surprise Royal. Judging will be the second half only.

Six Bell Competition - To take place at Bethersden on $28^{\text {th }}$ September 2002.

Future Events - Speldhurst Barn Dance - To be held on $29^{\text {th }}$ June 2002, tickets can be obtained from Frank Lewis. All proceeds go to the Bell Restoration Fund.

The working group must let me have their proposed revisions of the Rules by $1^{\text {st }}$ September so that I can forward them to the Districts in time for the Annual District meetings in October. The group would prefer Districts to consider the attached report and wishes to have members' reactions before they draft their proposed alterations to the Rules.

Any reactions to the working party's report should be sent to Peter Romney, details in the front of the Handbook.

## Report to the General Committee on the structure of the General Committee and organisation of the Association

The General Committee agreed to set up this working group at their November meeting in 2001. The Lewisham District were proposing a motion leading to greater flexibility and a reduction from three to two in district representation on the General Committee. At the same time the Tonbridge District had produced a discussion document to consider the structures and activities of the Association and was intending at a later date to propose the setting up of such a group.
This report is divided into three sections. The first considers the activities of the Association and how far these meet the stated objectives. Do the objectives need to be modified? Secondly we consider how these objectives might best be achieved and thirdly, we make specific recommendations.
The objectives of the Association are well-known:
to encourage service ringing in the county.
to have ringers recognised as church workers.
to ensure the proper use of bells and belfries.
to encourage the cultivation of the art of change ringing.
If we look at the activities of the Association they can be summarised as follows:
ringing for church services
teaching
practice meetings at tower and district level
quarter peal and peal ringing
bell restoration and maintenance
Certainly we do actively work towards the stated objectives but two important activities (training and bell restoration) in relation to time and effort spent on them, are not mentioned as such in the stated objectives (Although the former is implicit in 1 and 4 of the objectives).
The Association is organised into districts which largely
determine their own structure and have representation at county level through stated officers - district secretary and district representatives - but in addition all districts seem to have a chairman and ringing master(s). We think this is right and that much of the activity of the Association must inevitably occur at district level. At county level, we have a General Committee that we believe to be too large and cumbersome. We see the function of the General Committee as one of co-ordination and help to the districts in organising activities. This, we believe, can be achieved more effectively with a small committee and a group of sub-committees.
In looking at ways of achieving greater efficiency within the Association we do not seek to alter the structure at district level to any great extent but we do suggest a significant alteration at county level.
We consider that it is not necessary for every officer of the Association to be a member of the General Committee. This in no way implies criticism of any of the officers. On the contrary we are full of admiration for the work which they already do. Neither does it mean that we consider some to be more important than others. But some officers - e.g. the Peal Secretary and the Librarian - to a large extent record what has happened and do not need to be full members of the Committee. They would still be elected officers, they should have discretion to follow projects which interest them (e.g. the book of remembrance for members lost in war) but there would be basic tasks which the particular officer would be expected to carry out and, being elected at the AGM, they would remain answerable to the Association. There would also be occasions when it would be appropriate for them to be invited to attend general committee meetings (e.g. in giving an annual report of their activities).
We propose that the General Committee should be made up of:


Sub-committees would have the power to co-opt members.
We anticipate that the smaller General Committee would allow more flexibility within the Association. If they were to meet more frequently - say each quarter - it would be possible to refer matters back to the districts more easily and decisions could be made more quickly.
We would maintain the present sub-committees to cover:
Recruitment and publicity
Training
Bell Restoration and Maintenance
These sub-committees would operate in the same way as they do now.

The Training Sub-committee might well be a forum for the district ringing masters whose involvement could help in developing and implementing the activities of the sub-committee.
We suggest what might be the responsibilities of the various officers in a separate appendix.
We suggest that the person to represent each district committee on the General Committee would normally be the district secretary. However there may well be occasions when that particular person is unable to attend a meeting in which case there should be arrangements for another specified district officer to attend instead (e.g. Chairman or ringing master). We would not wish to dictate to the districts the composition of their committees but would expect to see a chairman, secretary, treasurer and ringing master. (We acknowledge that two or more of these offices could be combined in one person but that is up to the districts to decide)
We think the Association should consider carefully the situation with regard to trustees. A trustee has important and quite heavy responsibilities and it does not necessarily follow that the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer are the right people or give sufficient continuity to the task. There is a strong case for having a separate election for these positions.
In line with these recommendations we propose that the Objects of the Association be modified to read:
"The objects of the Association are the maintenance and encouragement of service ringing in the churches in its area and the recognition of ringers as church workers: the proper care and use of bells and belfries: encouragement of its members in the art of change ringing: assistance to parishes with the maintenance and restoration of bells and the recruitment of ringers."
Lastly, if these proposals are sent to the districts, it will be necessary, after this stage, to prepare proposed alterations to the rules, which would necessarily follow with their implementation. These alterations would be presented as part of any proposal at an AGM.
