If your tower is short of ringers to ring a particular method (and who isn't these days?), why not pool resources with another tower and have a joint effort. ## REAL RINGERS -TEN FACTS

1. Real ringers don't eat quiche. Real ringers eat sandwiches, cheesy sticks, vol-au-vents, sausage rolls and, especially, cakes. A real ringer is quite adept at balancing a large pile of cakes on a small paper plate.
2. Real ringers don't ring Kent. For a real ringer Kent, the method, is rather like Kent, the county, to a French tourist - something you go through on the way to London.
3. Real ringers don't grab hold when a band is called for; they wait and see who else is ringing.
4. Real ringers don't ring tenors. There are two reasons for this: firstly, a Real ringer sees no value in hoiking a heavy bell around trying to avoid Thrashers who have no idea about striking and, secondly, it is usually grabbed by a Keen ringer who rates himself as a tenor ringer.

As I've said on the front page it would be nice if towers would volunteer to hold some of next years events rather than the deathly silence that normally occurs when we get to that item on the agenda. Those towers that haven't held one for a while.... you know who you are!

5. Real ringers don't use ropesight. A Real ringer will stare fixedly at the floor to avoid catching sight of any Twitchers, Mumblers, or other ringing peculiarities who might cause a severe case of "corpsing". On occasions a Real ringer may deliberately look at a Hacker when the Hacker is following them; this often causes the Hacker to believe they are following the wrong bell and consequently leads to a trip or fire out.
6. Real ringers don't put things right, they stand it up at the slightest sign of trouble. There are, of course, exceptions to this - primarily the chance to cause acute embarrassment to a hapless Keenie or Hacker by drawing attention to their mistake. This is especially the case if it becomes apparent that they don't have a clue about the method as this affords the opportunity for some extensive character assassination.
7. Real ringers don't hold postmortems, they know who went wrong. Hackers hold postmortems to try and work out who went wrong first and knocked the others off their lines.
8. Real ringers don't ring peals. Few things can be more boring that spending three hours locked up in a tower when the weather is so cold that fingers and feet feel like blocks of ice after 20 minutes or it is a perfect summer's day when all right-minded people are sitting outside a pub supping ajar of ale.
9. Real ringers don't do tower grabs. Tower grabs are for the Keen ringer and the Ringing Bore (those who know the weight, key, foundry of every ring in the country and keep meticulous records of which bells they have rung in each tower).
10. Real ringers don't join (allegedly) elitist organisations; you only have to know a few of those who are members to understand why. Coincidentally "knowing a few members" appears to be one of the few prerequisites for joining.

# Dartion at Dartion for Dartion 

Many of you will know that I learned to ring at Dartford over 20 years ago (1979 to be precise) and that, whatever difficulties the bells do or do not present, the sound of them holds a special place for me when they are rung well. I remember (in my early teens) discovering there was a method called Dartford Surprise Major, and drew out the 'Blue Line'. At the time the method was way beyond my ringing capabilities, but I always hoped that one day (having been born just up the hill from Holy Trinity) I would get to ring a quarter peal of it on the bells I had grown to love, turning in the tenor, and conducting it.

Some research shows that the method has not been rung much. It was first pealed (and named) at Benington (Hertfordshire) in 1963, first rung by the KCACR at Lydd in 1973, and more recently rung for the Lancashire Association at Walkden in 1994, and at Sunderland for the Durham and Newcastle Association in 1997. However, no record appears to exist of it ever having been rung at its home tower. Dartford Little Bob Major was pealed on the bells in 1925, but that's a different method!

The method itself is related to Pudsey (being Pudsey above the treble), and the line does not look too difficult compared to many other Surprise Major methods. However, tricky little spiky manoeuvres (below the treble) add to the spice and challenges of ringing it. (e.g. Sixths, one blow in 4ths, dodge in 5-6). Interesting combinations of the back bells (in the plain course) add to the musical aspects of ringing the method.

Around last Christmas, I realised it was about time we rang

Listening to a tape recording that was made, I hear again the good ringing - proof that Dartford's bells can sound majestic when rung well! On a personal level the quarter meant a great deal to me. Having been seriously ill only a year previously (under strict medical instruction not to ring at all due to a heart problem), it was immensely satisfying to have come this far - not only to ring this quarter, but also to have turned this 18 cwt tenor in (not an easy task for the fittest of ringers), and to be 21345685

ready for more afterwards!
Thank you to all who made this quarter peal possible, not least of which to those who took part.

## News from the Archives

A CRAYFORD man retired as captain of St. Paulinus Church bellringers at Christmas after a lifetime of ringing bells at the church.

Mr. Edwin A. Barnett, 59, who lived at Iron Mill Lane was the fourth generation of his family to become a bellringer at St. Paulinus.

He is shortly to retire from the Civil Service and moved to Wiltshire just before Christmas.

The family's campanology tradition started in 1889 when the first Edwin Barnett came to Crayford and became a member and ultimately captain of the ringing team.

The tradition continued with Mr. Barnett's grandfather and father and he started ringing as a schoolboy.

He took over from his father, Edwin J. Barnett, as captain in 1955 and earned himself a reputation as one of Kent's leading bellringers

He is a past president of the central council of Church Bellringers and chairman of the Kent County Association of Change Ringers.

In 1958 he took charge of ringing at the church of St. Clement Dane in the London's Strand.

Mr. Barnett met his wife Olive through bellringing.
She was a member of the central council and formerly president of the Ladies Guild of Change Ringers.

The new captain of St. Paulinus' bells is Mr. William Bond, of Manor Road, Crayford, who started bellringing with Mr. Barnett when they were both schoolboys.

This year, Saturday $14^{\text {th }}$ September was to be the date for the annual outing for the bellringers of St Nicholas, Chislehurst and St John the Baptist, Eltham. Despite fears that we would be short of numbers due to other towers picking the same day for theirs, this was not a problem. So, at 8:00, twenty willing ringers, closely followed by some more slightly less willing ringers, set off towards Essex and Suffolk.

After setting off, I quickly discovered that getting home at 4:00am and having three hours sleep is not suitable for me to successfully navigate someone through the Essex and Suffolk countryside, but we eventually arrived at Stoke by Nayland (8, 22-00-12) with some time to spare. It was nice to find that the bells were already up, and we quickly proceeded with Stedman, Grandsire, Plain Bob and some Rounds. Everyone then moved on to Polstead (6, 9-01-22), and after missing the turning twice we finally descended on the church, which was hidden very well from the main road (that's my excuse anyway!) The bells were very nice to ring and we successfully managed some Cambridge and London Minor, as well as Plain Bob Minor and Stedman Doubles. After failing to escape from the obligatory group photo at the back of the church, we moved on our third stop of the day. After making our way to the church, I realised that the initial crunch was not to be a general sign of what to expect, because we attempted a half-course of Superlative and managed to get it round, due to several very experienced people guiding certain others through it (thanks Colin!)

After a short stop in the pub for a welcome break of tea and biscuits we made our way to the last tower of the day at Feering (8, 18-00-00) which was on the way home. At the pub, several people (including me) had been told to learn one lead of Bristol and just keep ringing it for a three-lead touch while those who knew the method did the difficult work. This was successfully rung, as was half a course of Cambridge and we finished our outing feeling very satisfied.

It was widely agreed that we had experienced the best ringing for a long time on the outing and I would like to reinforce everyones gratitude and appreciation of the hard work of Len and Roger in arranging the towers, the meals and the dry weather for the day.

# Anyone for Oxóro? <br> Call Change Striking Competition Rules 

On Saturday 14th September we set off to Oxford, with many ringing friends in support, for our long awaited ringing outing. It has been long awaited because it was necessary to book the circuit over a year in advance. Our contacts in Oxford, David and Katie Lane, took on all the hassle of arranging the ringing times and access details and it is the first ringing outing I have organised where I didn't have to make one phone call or send one letter! It was all done by email with one point of contact. Many thanks to David and Katie for this as well as Steven Ivin and Bernard Stone who let us in the various towers.

We started off at the newly augmented 7cwt ten at Mary Mag. which were very good. When the tower was originally placed on the itinerary it was an eight but during August the Peter Border bells were added and the bells were great fun and easy to ring. Following that we rang on the superb 11cwt ten of St. Thos. and then the only eight of the day,
 Lincoln College (7cwt).

After suitable lunch time refreshment at the Turf Tavern we rang on the 19 cwt ten at Magdalene College which are housed in a spectacularly large tower and then the 31cwt twelve at Christ College, otherwise known as the Cathedral. Opposite the Cathedral was our penultimate tower, the 11cwt six, St. Aldate, and we finished at that well known Oxford landmark, Carfax, a loud and demanding 15 cwt six.

Once in Oxford all the towers were reached on foot and we were delighted to enjoy the company of a number of ringing friends from other Kent towers to increase our resources, particularly for ringing on higher numbers. 1.The Competition may be held annually for Sunday Service Bands within the Lewisham District.
2.Each tower shall normally be 'in union' with the Association. However, at the discretion of the District Officers, new bands may be allowed to enter for the first time only without being in union.
3.No band shall have more than three people in it who have previously rung a peal.
4.A tower shall be allowed to enter any number of bands but no ringer may ring for more than one band. If a ringer rings for Sunday Service at more than one tower then the home tower takes precedence.
5.Any tower wishing to enter, finding itself short of one ringer, can notify the District Ringing Master or Deputy Ringing Master, who can supply the extra member. The extra member must not have already entered the Competition.
6.The conductor shall call the changes from memory. No visual aids will be allowed.
7.Each team must ring call changes. No method will be permitted.
8. Call changes are to be made, on average, every fifth handstroke with the change made at the following handstroke.
9.Each team will be allowed two minutes practice rounds and call changes, (this will not be judged) standing the bells at the end of the rounds.
10.Each team will be judged on 120 rows, a handstroke and backstroke counting as two rows. A maximum of 12 whole pulls of rounds will be allowed for "settling down" before the start of the call changes. A steward in the tower will count the rows and inform the conductor when the required number has been reached. The conductor should then call 'stand' as soon as possible, having first - if necessary brought the bells back into rounds. The opening rounds, up to 12 whole pulls, and the changes after 120 rows will not be judged. Failure to stand will not be faulted, but will be noted and taken into account in the event of a tie.
11.All ringing must be carried out with open handstroke leads. Faults will be awarded for closed handstroke leading.
12.The entry forms for the Competition must be received by the District Secretary at least seven clear days before the date of the Competition. Neither late nor telephone entries will be accepted.
13.The ringing will be judged by a competent judge from outside the District.
14.Any dispute or difficulty should be referred to the District Officers before the end of the Competition.
15.If a tower enters and subsequently has to withdraw, their entry fee will not be refunded.
16.The names of those taking part (up to nine in all) must be given on the entry form.
17.A representative of each tower shall be available for the draw and the order adhered to, unless the band has a prior commitment for service ringing at their own church.

Charles, who died on $5^{\text {th }}$ August, had been a ringer at St Martins, Chelsfield. He must have started in about 19511952, as a peal was rung here in January 1973 "in 21 methods to mark Charles's 21 years as a ringer at St Martins, Chelsfield". He did not ring any peals himself but rang about 37 quarter peals, the first being on $4^{\text {th }}$ May 1958, and always ringing the Tenor behind to Doubles which he much enjoyed doing. He rang his last quarter I think on $23^{\text {rd }}$ August 1975 but was still ringing for a few years after I came to Chelsfield in 1979. He certainly qualified for free membership of the Kent County Association after 25 years continuous membership, during my time as secretary of the Chelsfield ringers.

Charles was for many years People's Warden at Chelsfield and on his retirement from that position was created Churchwarden Emeritus.

A half-muffled quarter peal was rung in his memory on Sunday $11^{\text {th }}$ August by past and present members of the Chelsfield band, and the bells were also rung half-muffled for his funeral on $20^{\text {th }}$ August, again by past and present members of the band.
