On Saturday 17th November, 5 bands gathered at Horton Kirby for the annual Call Change Competition. It was especially good this year to see the 2 newest bands in the district, Farnborough and Lewisham, taking part. Ben Meyer and Rosemary Hill from the University of London had agreed to come along and judge. Once they'd had a ring and found a place to listen, the draw was made, tweaked a bit and then the competition began.

All the bands completed their practice and test pieces and then it was over to Ben and Rosemary to give their comments and the results. Ben started by saying that it was good to be able to 'grab' a new county as a judge. He felt that some of the bands may have struggled because the bells would have been lighter than they were probably used too but all of the bands had a nice beat to them which he'd have felt comfortable ringing a quarter to. He also thought it was great for learners to enter striking competitions because it's one of the things that experienced ringers dread so it was good to get used to it.

On the retirement of Canon Michael Insley in September, the Diocese has decided not to replace him. A process is underway to lease the St Luke's Church building to the Hope Church, which will mean that when complete, C of E worship will be restricted to 8 am communion and some form of evening service to be decided, most probably at 6 pm . There will be no further $C$ of $E$ services at $10 a \mathrm{~m}$. It is unlikely that the Hope Church will require bells to preface their services, so the future and timing of Sunday ringing at St Luke's is at present uncertain. Once this leasing process is complete and the Hope Church is in residence, we shall advise the district of the state of affairs. The Tower and its bells are not part of the leasing process: C of E weddings and funerals will be conducted at St Luke's as before

The Ringing Foundation was formed in 2007 to support the development of the skills, practice and art of change ringing.

We soon realised the need for a structured programme of training and brought together a group of people to help us develop a curriculum 'Learning The Ropes' and a scheme to get more people teaching bell-handling and change ringing 'The Integrated Teacher Training Scheme' (ITTS). One of our immediate goals is to ensure that an additional five hundred new ringers are trained up to at least Plain Bob Minor level each year, in order to re-place those ringers that are likely to retire over the next 20 years.

## The North Bucks Branch



The North Bucks Branch of the Oxford Diocesan Guild, had become concerned about the future of ringing in its area. In response it organised a recruitment campaign, The Big Ring Pull, with an exhibition in Milton Keynes Shopping Centre. Taster sessions and a follow up pro-gramme of training have resulted in 39 new ringers sprin-kled around the Branch. New teachers were taught using ITTS. The Ringing Foundation supported this project with a grant of £1,000.

## The ITTS Course Goes from Strength to Strength

The ITTS Course consists of two one day theoretical modules, plus a period where each new teacher is mentored by an existing experienced teacher whilst they teach their first new pupils. We have now held over 40 Module 1 courses and there are over 300 new teachers working their way through the system, mentored by over 160 experienced teachers. We would very much like to extend coverage of the scheme and if you have a group of people who are interested in working their way through the scheme, please contact Pip Penney of the Association of Ringing Teachers. The course is sponsored by the Ringing Foundation
