The bride looked beautiful in a full-length lace gown with short train, no veil but a tiara and an angora shrug, a necessity for a February wedding. The groom was likewise very handsome in his suit. After the service, the guests assembled for photographs while we returned to the chamber for more ringing, some lovely Grandsire Triples and firing on all 10 bells, a favourite with our ringers and obligatory for weddings at St Alfege. Then the photographer requested that we come down for a photograph. As we were all wearing our usual, casual ringing attire, (except Graham who had thoughtfully brought a change of clothing), we were initially reluctant, but eventually descended to form a huddle behind the bride and groom. ## Eynsford Musicathon

We had the idea to do a Musicathon to raise money for a hospital I know in Zimbabwe. Our plan was to bring people together to make music for 24 hours non-stop.


I thought we might do some bell ringing in the morning of the second day and discussed this with David and others. A number of ideas were floated including a Zimbabwe themed peal (doesn't exist), creating a new method (don't be ridiculous) , and just getting people together to have a ring (now you are talking). Eventually we settled on the last idea with Rupert Cheeseman and Nick Wilkins agreeing to arrange two bands to
come and visit.

We had started the Musicathon at 7:30 the previous evening with a concert of light opera. This ran into a nice folk session featuring works of the occasionally risqué, Jake Thackeray. The last major event of the Friday evening was a cabaret around midnight. Through the night local musical youths did 1 hour slots and I spent a pleasant hour from 2:30 to 3:30 am playing euphonium duets with a young friend.

I returned to the church at 08:30 to the "strains" of recorder

playing under the lych gate (the local running and cycling event had been cancelled because of freezing weather but the youngest section of the wind band managed playing outdoors very well).

We had planned to ring from 9 but the Eynsford ringers had largely dispersed so we put together a scratch jazz band from 9-10. It was excellent - and hopefully something we can develop for the future.

The ringers appeared at 10 and spirits were high, if not to say euphoric. Lots of fun was had and sleeplessness had removed any of my remaining brain cells. At 10:30 we tried to ring a quarter peal of St Martin's triples. It coughed and spluttered for a while before finally collapsing in a heap. Not

quite sure what I was ringing but it was rarely St Martin's. Nick and his crew of youngsters appeared at 11 and showed their usual vim and vigour. The tower was packed and there was much jollity.

After ringing we went onto a singing master class, a concert by the primary school choir, a concert of the youth band, rehearsals and a performance of Messiah, finally finishing up on the Sunday evening at 7:30.

For Hannah and I, the Musicathon was an epic event. I was waking with cold sweats of anxiety for three nights afterwards. We raised over $£ 5,000$ with some extremely generous contributions. Even more important than the money raised was the support we got from all quarters. I'd really like to thank Nick and Rupert for their enthusiasm and flexibility. Thanks also to the ringers of the district who came to help. I hope you enjoyed it - we did!

Pamberought fit Cile Ball Dedication Semice

An hour before the Service was due to start, almost all of the St Giles ringers gathered in the ringing chamber to ring the new bells in celebration of the fact that for the first time in its history, and despite previous good intentions which for various reasons never came to fruition, St Giles at last had a peal of bells.

We were joined by other ringers, some of whom were staying for the Service and post Service celebration in the village hall, and others who were simply passing by to 'grab' the tower; one ringer had travelled from St Albans to ring at a new tower for them.
Prior to the Service there was last minute discussion on precisely what would happen when the Rt Revd Dr Brian Castle, Bishop of Tonbridge, visited the ringing chamber during the Service to dedicate the bells. Having sorted this out, we rang the bells up to the start time of the Service and then went to our various pews. The church was full and included many people involved with the bell installation; various invited guests, dignitaries and donors as well as the three previous Rectors.

At the point in the Service when the Dedication was to take place, the Bishop's party went to the base of the tower and then up to the ringing chamber and Dedicated the six new bells as well as, specifically, the number two bell which bears the inscriptions recording the names of Tess Molyneux and Ian Matheson and also the 1951 Gillet and Johnston bell was rededicated.
On descending the tower and returning into the church the Service continued and, a little later the offertory hymn which was the Bell Ringers hymn, Unchanging God, was sung with great gusto, particularly by the many bell ringers present.
After the Service there was a little more ringing as many of the congregation proceeded to the village hall for celebratory drinks and nibbles. The village hall gathering was a wonderful opportunity for everyone to mingle and meet various people involved with the bell installation project. May I here thank those who contributed in whatever way. There was physical work, financial contributions and donations and much planning and organisation and if any one element of the important sequence of events had not happened then the project would never have come to fruition. Additionally there was the training of ringers over the previous 12 months, mainly at Chelsfield. So thank you everyone.
I was humbled to be thanked by Matthew for my part in the project but it has been a team effort and, frankly, I have been doing something I enjoy so it has been a great pleasure.

As the celebrations started to wind down, six of us returned to St Giles church to ring a full peal of 5040 changes on the bells to mark the Dedication. This involved 2 hrs and 28 mins non-stop ringing. Those participating were those that had been involved in the bell installation project. The details are as follows:-

The last two Wednesdays in January saw visits to the tower from Year 6, St Stephen's School in Welling where Liz Brett is Chair of Governors. The children have a school journey each Autumn to Rippledown House near Deal. One of the activities is to visit the nearby church at Ringwould where they often have a talk about the bells so the Headteacher thought it would be interesting for them to visit a tower in this area. We started with a look at the tower from outside to explain what was on each level and also to tell them that the tower and bells were paid for Canon Boulden at an estimated current day cost of $£ 1.5$ million- that caught their interest! Then we had about 15 minutes in church looking at the paintings and other things that attracted their interest. Ron Armstrong, who is an expert on the wall-paintings, and the Vicar, Julie Conalty, helped out on this part of the visit Finally the children got to come up the tower which was the main purpose of their visits. We had rigged up a camera overlooking the bells so that they could watch the bell ringing from the safety of the ringing chamber. Rachel talked about call changes and method ringing and then with the children (plus the adult helpers!) given a number between 1 and 8 we had them move around to call changes and plain hunting. Rachel had a couple of CDs so that they could listen to change ringing and handbell music. We finished with the handbells and after several turns managed to get something that was beginning to sound like 'Happy Birthday' ; chosen as a tune they would know that was fairly straightforward. The children really enjoyed the visits and we received some nice 'thank-you' letters. They have also produced an excellent display for the school corridor - hopefully it will spark an interest in taking up ringing.

All three teams completed a test piece with varying degrees of excitement. After a short deliberation Peter gave the following comments and result.

Band 1 ( 12 m 40 s ) - Tenor was slow covering and treble turned away from the front too quickly. Recovered well from a bad start. Some parts very good in the second part.

Band $2(8 \mathrm{~m} 15 \mathrm{~s})$ - Rang the least opening rounds. Tenor slow at back throughout. Back bells slowing up in change.
Band 3 ( 8 m 55 s ) - Rows quite good when clean. Leading was slow which caused the tenor to crunch on the row be cause of this. When trip free very good. Recovered quickly from crunches.

## 7. KCACR committee Report

$24^{\text {th }}$ November Margaret Heald and Dominic Meredith attended for the district. Margaret updated the meeting.
Only Lewisham has a dedicated training officer. Other districts delegate training to their Ringing Master. Meeting concluded district activities be included in county training. Sub-committee to be established.

West Peckham to be transferred to Maidstone District at request of Tonbridge.
50 Year Membership Certificates-The county secretary needs to have the names by the end of December, especially important this year as we have a new Archbishop (who needs to sign the certificates).

Northfleet—Some aspects of the accident are still rumbling on. The suggestion has been made that a specialist be consulted. The meeting agreed to up to $£ 1000$ being spent on professional advice.

Gift Aid— Gift Aiding membership subs would be problematic and possibly not worth it. It may be possible to Gift Aid part of the subscription if the old split between General Fund and BRF subs is restored.

Website has moved service provider. The Webmaster appealed for more content (if anything is going to the Ringing World it would be good to see it on the KCACR website first)

The ITTS course which was due to run at Staplehurst was cancelled due to a lack of interest.
A new ring of bells is going in at Strood
The Child Protection Officer will be distributing laminated sheets with child protection guidelines and best practice. The CP officer has been in contact and will attend the April meeting.

Handbook returns will be sent out imminently. They should have a box to request the number of handbooks that a tower wants, rather than one per member.

Bell Restoration-Some interest in a tower maintenance day - including two from Farnborough and one from Bexley Three grants were made from the BRF, to Strood ( $£ 10,000$ ), Monkton ( $£ 2,000$ ) and Bobbing $(£ 8,000)$.

Health and Safety-There have been issues with ringers with underlying health issues. There will be a form put on the website to assess risk.

There have been problems with finding judges for County striking competitions. Districts should find standby judges (from within the District if necessary). Enhanced guidelines for organising competitions are to be issued.

Should the Association adopt the Integrated Teacher Training Scheme ITTS?
Should the Association set up funding to facilitate it?
Would Lewisham district be willing to organise a course?
The ITTS works in conjunction with the 'Association of Ringing Teachers' and has two modules. It is aimed at teaching young people to ring and to 'Teach the Teachers'.
The following concerns were raised. Gabrielle Stook had concerns regarding Insurance cover of those not holding the ITTS certification. Will 'Grandfather Rights' be given to those already teaching?
Ian Mills and Cathy Cheeseman advised that there is quite an amount of comment, in the Ringing World.
Ian was asked, in his capacity of Ringing Master, to circulate an email to the towers for further considered comment. He would collate the responses for onward reply to Mr Dale.
