Call change comp victory for Crayford

On Saturday 15th November, 5 bands met at West Wickham for the annual Call Change Competition. Ben Kipling and Cathy Cheeseman had come to judge and once they were seated in the church yard the draw was made and the competition began.

All 5 bands safely negotiated 120 changes with at least 10 call changes. The judges then returned and gave their verdict.

Cathy gave some general comments. Overall they were 5 good pieces of ringing that everyone should be proud of. They felt that the tenor was the bell that gave the most problems. Some teams were quick and others slow but maybe it was not oddstuck at all. All teams rang enough changes with enough calls. The general start signal

seemed to be 1,2 1,2 2 2 2..... so the 2 must have been hard to set!

Team 1: Felt the tenor was dropping a bit. Was good until the last part and not sure what happened there. Cartwheeled a little bit in Kings.

Team 2: This time tenor compensating the other way. The handstrokes were good. One small section picked up faults but overall was nice piece of ringing.

Team 3: Started off really nicely. The faults were gathered in sections, mainly where the calls were called, but otherwise good.



Team 4: Different sort of faults in this one as there were little things. There were gaps rather than clips.

Team 5: Opening was really good but a few crunches in the middle part. Overall an ok piece of ringing.

They then gave the results in the traditional reverse order. Crayford won again but half the band was different to last year.

Thank you to everyone who took part (hopefully more bands will enter next year!), to the judges who gave up their time and to the West Wickham ringers for hosting and keeping everyone supplied with tea and biscuits.

ITTS in Kent

An ITTS Module 1 course will be starting at Headcorn on 28th March 2015. The poster and application form are available in this newsletter, or they can be downloaded from the Training pages on the KCACR website or Training group on Facebook.

The programme for the day at Headcorn includes presentations on modern coaching theory as well as practical sessions in the tower. However, anyone thinking about applying to join the course should be aware that this is only the beginning.

Follow-up group sessions to consolidate the ITTS approach will take place shortly after the day event. The Teacher, guided by their Mentor, can then begin training an absolute beginner up to Level 1 of the Learning the Ropes scheme.

By attending the day course trainee Teachers and their Mentors will be granted access to ITTS on-line resources. These including an on-line multiple-choice quiz that needs to be answered satisfactorily to complete the course.

Applicants should have sufficiently good bell control to inspire confidence in their learners, their mentors, the tower captain (if appropriate), and other members of the learner's band. They should not have handling problems themselves.

Erith, Christ Church Centenary

June 2015 has been identified at Christchurch Erith for a long time as an important date as it marks the centenary of the first peal on the bells. Not only is it the 100th anniversary of the bells, but also of the tower and spire, built 40 years after the rest of the church and paid for by Canon Boulden, the vicar of the day (at a cost of £5,776/4s/0d, which we believe to equate to around £1.5million today).

With this in mind the local band had been making plans to celebrate the centenary year and had come up with a variety of ideas. Last May Mark and Rachel had been out walking for the day and coming home through Bexleyheath decided to pop into the Local Studies Centre in Central Library to see the church archives and glean further information. Two hours later we were still there! The documents that particularly caught our attention were the original drawing submitted to the local council and the daily and weekly diaries of the Clerk of Works covering the 13 months of the build. We thought that these would make an ideal basis for a little exhibition and so we asked if the parish could borrow them back.

The Local Studies Manager thought it all sounded very interesting but he wasn't keen on lending them out on the grounds of security and environment (ie. temperature and humidity). What he did suggest though was that we digitise the documents and apply to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant for a proper display.

While the Sharing Heritage stream, covering projects requesting £3,000-10,000, might be one of the easier grants to apply for there was still a lot of work involved in putting forward a proposal: identifying activities we intended to do; the

materials we would need; how we could involve the local community; budget costs; and filling in multiple pages of forms selling the idea to the HLF. An outline proposal was put forward in July for which HLF provided feedback and then with help from Simon Mckeon at Local Studies a full application was submitted in September. In early November Rachel received a phone call to tell her that the application had been successful and that we had been awarded the £7,000 we asked for. The wheels turn slowly and it was nearly a month before we received the funds but the money is now in, all we have to do is deliver the project!!

Plans include: a once a month tower open day from March to September where we will have four display banners about the tower, clock and bells; a detailed booklet; a laptop with a copy of the Clerk of Works journal (also be accessible through the parish website); CCTV links to the ringing chamber and bells; a short film about ringing at Erith; and a children's leaflet. The local primary school have booked two days for a whole school visit and the displays are going out to Erith library and one of the local care homes. There will be a peal attempt, a parish lunch and a celebratory Sunday service over the anniversary weekend. Hopefully the winners of a bell themed art competition will be announced then as well.

We will be hosting the July district meeting which is the closest date to the dedication (June 5th 1915) so please come then and see what we have managed to achieve. We look forward to seeing you (we note from our belfry book that we had 55 names for tea in January 2001 so there's a challenge for you!).




In memory of those members of the Society of Bromley Youths (est 1773) who perished in the First World War

Three members of the Society were killed in this war. They were remembered at the Bromley Youths' AGM on 18th November 2014, one hundred years after the start. The Secretary (Isaac Emery) recorded the following in the minute books at the time.

Alfred James (killed in France 8th Apr 1917) "I must now touch upon the saddest thing that has happened to our Society in living memory, I of course refer to the death of our friend and fellow member, Mr A James, Sen. who made the great sacrifice in France on Easter Monday. He was badly wounded in the shoulder, and bled to death in a dugout. His place in the belfry will be hard to fill, for he was a good ringer, and very dependable, his main qualities being punctuality, a bright and cheerful disposition, and a readiness always to oblige others. He leaves a wife and a family of 7 (including a son who is one of us, but, who is also in France with H.M. Forces) and 4 young children of tender age. We attempted a half-muffled peal in his memory, but were not successful, but we rang a $\frac{1}{4}$ peal of Stedman Triples [band names given]. We also rang

the bells halfmuffled on the following Sunday April 29th, which under the sad circumstances seems all that we could do (may he rest in Peace). I trust that ere another annual meeting comes round we shall have rung some peals for peace, and that the other absent ones will be safe home with us again."



Archie Mansfield (of the Machine Gun Corps, killed in France Aug 1917) "He was a good lad, and a very promising ringer, and although he was not a member of the Kent County Association, I trust that his name may be inserted on the proposed Roll of Honour to be

placed in the



Association belfries." [In fact his name doesn't appear on the KCACR Roll of Honour.]

Eric G Feltness (killed in Palestine July 1918)
Eric was killed "much to the regret of us all and of everyone who knew him. I saw his young wife and tendered her our deepest sympathy, we also rang the bells half-muffled, which was unfortunately all we could do in such sad circumstances. We have however had his photo enlarged and framed, and placed in the belfry, with that of the late Alfred James and also Archie Mansfield."

Post Script

In April 1919, the Secretary wrote "we are very glad to welcome back safely A James Jun. [Son of Alfred James, mentioned earlier] After a long spell in France and also Mr Spice after his 8 months service in the RAF. We also hope to have ere long our Probationer T Knight home for good with us." The Youths rang for the Signing of the Armistice and the Secretary said he hoped they would soon be ringing for peace." T Knight was elected a full member 2 months later.







Alan and Graham went along recently to help out with ringing for a programme to be broadcast on BBC Click. A few weeks ago a crew from BBC's click programme went to Christchurch, Isle of Dogs to find out more about how The Docklands Ringers are using the latest release of the Abel simulator software to teach people to ring. This has moving video images of real ringers, so our new ringers can practice ringing in time with an electronic band of ringers, rather than real ringers.

The producers have not yet scheduled the Television version of the programme, which will be shown on various BBC channels and will be available on the BBC iPlayer.

Keymer Outing in Sussex

Once again we had been invited by the Keymer band to accompany them on their Autumn outing. So after an early breakfast, we set off and assembled at SS Cosmas and Damian, Keymer, to wait for the tour bus which would be taking us; this year, however, due to there being so many keen ringers taking up the offer of a fun-filled outing (15 in all plus Simon driving), three of us were going by car. This turned out to be us, Chris, Shelagh and our good friend Dawn, the advance party as we arrived first at All Saints, Laughton before the coach. This is a lovely 'spacious' church, where we were warmly welcomed. Here we started off gently with rounds and call changes before launching into Stedman (for those who could). We also had time for a 'selfie'. Well, we oldies have to keep up with the times!



Next we moved another All Saints Heathfield. α modern chamber - a bit dark, but lovely red carpet! This 8 bell ring also sounded good, although the number 3 rope was pronounced to 'wobbly'. There was an interesting addition outside the church, as they'd made a clever replica trench in the lych gate in honour of the centenary W W 1

celebrations. Moving swiftly on to All Saints and S Bartholomew at Waldron where we were ringing after a baptism. The lucky guests were to have some impromptu ringing that they hadn't planned for! So, after some call changes and plain bob doubles to warm up, they were treated to some Cambridge, which they seemed to appreciate, especially as the bright summer weather had suddenly turned to autumn rain and we had a heavy downpour, forcing us to run and splash back to the car.

By now we were ready for a break and a well-earned lunch; off to the King's Head at Horsbridge where

we were offered a staggering array of choices on the menu. After this delicious break we proceeded to SS Peter & Paul, Hellingly. These bells were quite flighty with a longish draft and a very light-set tenor - lots of money in fines went into the pot by several people not able to stand the tenor!

Our penultimate tower was 5 Mary, Hailsham. We had a bit of trouble finding this one, due to an errant sat nav sending us the wrong way. Once there, we had a much better ring and on signing the visitors' book found a few familiar signatures of ringers from Lewisham District who had visited in the early 90s (not all on the same day - you know who you are!)

Finally we reached the last tower of the day, 5 Andrew, Alfriston. This provided a really daunting prospect - a long draft in the middle of the aisle, which luckily was fenced off from the congregation - by piece of rope What a surprise for those of us who were initially reluctant to have a go, the bells were lovely and easier to ring than they appeared to be! By now, our party were gasping for a cuppa, so we were even happier when we were offered tea, coffee and biscuits by members of the local band - for a small donation. On exploring the church we found a window



with a representation of St Alphege, but with a different spelling to Lewisham's Greenwich church!




