Chelsfield back to winning ways

A lovely sunny September morning greeted the teams as they gathered at Farnborough for the striking competition on Saturday 24th September. Judges Paul Flavell and Linda Foddering arrived in good time, and found a nice seat in the sunshine just far enough away from the church so as not to see who was ringing when!



The draw took place at 9.45am for the 5 bands that were complete, the Maidstone District and Kent Young Ringers teams having to be placed 7th and 6th respectively whilst they waited for the rest of their team members to arrive. Competition ringing got underway promptly by 10am and all the bands had done everything they could shortly before midday, all the while being kept refreshed with tea, coffee and goodies in the church which most enjoyed basking in the sun in the churchyard.

When the judges were ready Doug Davis, Hon. General Secretary welcomed everything and thanked them for taking part. Before handing over to the judges, Alexander and Jamie from the Kent Young Ringers made a point of thanking everyone for allowing them to be part of the competition, and said that they had all learned something from the experience. Striking Competitions are a daunting prospect for many, so it was very brave of the younger ringers to grab the chance to take part - well done!

Linda started by thanking Nick Wilkins for asking her to be a judge, and then thanked Paul for agreeing to judge with her. She also thanked Farnborough and the Lewisham District for hosting and providing the refreshments.

Paul & Linda then delivered the results as follows, noting that the standard of ringing was extremely high throughout:

The Kent Young Ringers team (who rang 6th) unfortunately didn't complete their test piece which was stood up at the 2nd attempt, so also weren't placed.

It is not often that we have any news to contribute to the Lewisham Newsletter so it is with excitement that we report that we have been out of our tower!

We started our day at Colemans Hatch. One of those places that you drive through, but rarely stop

at. The church was a really pretty country church and the ringing chamber had a carpet that once seen will never be forgotten. The 8 bells were light and rang nicely.

We followed this up by some serious ringing chamber envy at Hartfield. They have recently spent a lot of money doing up their bells and it was a real pleasure to ring there. Their clock has an

enormous pendulum which swings behind the ringers in a dedicated space of its own. Their sound proofing was magnificent, but as we Cudham ringers are used to being deafened by our bells, meant that they sounded a bit too quiet for us!!

Withyham was next on our list, the heaviest bells of the day with a 15cwt tenor. They sounded magnificent, were a pleasure to ring, and the church had some stunning tombs. Withyham had particular significance to one of our ringers, whose sons were married in this church. To be able to ring the bells there had been a long held ambition and it was nice to play our part in making this happen.

We followed this up with a plentiful lunch at The Fountain in Cowden. Cowden itself is a really pretty village and the Fountain was well worth the visit. Jolly good food, generous portions and reasonably priced. The beer (Harveys) was well kept and much enjoyed.

Ringing at Cowden was a good way to burn off the calories. They have very long ropes, and are very lightly set, which made for some entertaining starts and finishes to our ringing. We did manage Bob minor and some good Grandsire while we were there so we left on a high.

Our last tower was Chevening. Fresh flowers in the ringing room, beautiful views and 8 very nice bells made this the perfect ending to our day. on the Tuesday evening of their trip to see the bells and Linda had a crash course in bell handling. She was an exceptionally quick learner and well co-ordinated and within an



hour she was successfully putting both strokes together correctly. We didn't really want her to go back to America, we wanted to keep her! Crayford were kind enough to allow us to visit their practice later that same evening so that Linda could see and hear some change ringing and she rang a few backstrokes in rounds. She has gone home with much food for thought, an assortment of web links and a desire to know more.



District Outing to London

This year the annual joint Tonbridge/Lewisham District outing to London was organised by the Lewisham District to a variety of towers including St Botolph without Bishopsgate, Christ Church Spitalfields, St Botolph without Aldgate, St

Katherine Cree and St Olaves. Street. Hart Around 44 people attended event with variety of ringing taking place catering for all abilities.

Bishopsgate appeared more challenging as there was a substantial amount of tower

movement, the rate of which felt quite unnerving at times. The bells themselves also took a bit of getting used to and they sounded very loud in the ringing room. The ringing settled down however throughout the duration, with some nicely struck Bob Triples and Stedman Triples sounding particularly good.

Spitalfields was personally my favourite tower; the back bells having gorgeous hum notes and the bells themselves handled very well. Upon getting them down from backstroke a well struck plain course of Stedman Triples was rung followed by a mixture of plain hunt, Bob Triples and rounds and call changes. A superbly struck 3 leads of Bristol was rung, which

prompted a big round of applause at the end - the hum and tuning of the bells was quite something! Surprisingly most of us managed to fit into the relatively large

space in the ringing room with some counting around 44 people overall.

The bells at Aldgate were the heaviest of the day, with a tenor of 25cwt. They sounded very nice

though there was noticeable tower movement and some odd handling difficulties times, though something quite when rung well; some Stedman and Grandsire was particularly rung nicely. However, it was to everyone's areat amusement that it took me a few rounds to finally pull

tenor off after a little assistance, followed by a round of applause when I managed to set it again!! Jamie Austin also lowered the tenor with Mark Backhouse's assistance, unfortunately Jamie's hands took a painful turn for the worst!



The lighter bells of the day were at St Katherine Cree and St Olaves, both with pleasant rings of 6 and 8 bells. There were some onlookers at St Katherine Cree, from the tower door, who watched and

seemed to take a small interest in the ringing taking place. The treble at St Olaves also proved quite a challenge, with the stay taking quite a bashing at times, though they were a delightful light 8.

Overall, everyone enjoyed the day and we all learned a lot and gained valuable experiences from the bells and other people. Many thanks to all who partook and organised the outing!

Eltham and Chislehurst Tower Outing

Last year, we were lucky enough to be joined for several months at the Eltham Tuesday night practice by David Chesson, tower captain at St John the Baptist, Wittersham, in the Ashford District. When his time in London came to an end, we agreed that it would be an excellent idea for us to visit his part of Kent on our next outing. He kindly offered to make use of his local knowledge and contacts to secure us a range of local towers, as well as appropriate venues

for lunch and tea - very important elements in a successful day out.

All too soon the agreed date of Saturday 3 September arrived. An early start of 9:00 am at Biddenden was somewhat alleviated by the provision of coffee and biscuits before the ringing started. Even so, the part closure of the M20 (caused by a collapsed footbridge earlier in the week) meant that not everyone made it in time to ring on this fine 22 -cwt eight.

A short distance down the road was our next tower, Tenterden, even heavier at 27-cwt. Here we managed methods up to

Stedman Triples and Plain Bob Major, along with rounds and call changes for the less experienced. Some of the band also stayed on to ring for the start of a wedding in the church, while the rest went on ahead to open up at the next tower.

Fortunately, the bride arrived promptly at 11:30, enabling us to arrive in good time at Rolvenden, the last tower before lunch. Here, we managed the unusual feat of locking ourselves into the ringing room, when a ringer who shall remain nameless slammed the door a little too hard, allowing a wooden latch on the outside to drop into place, effectively trapping us. Fortunately, some deft work with a coathanger enabled the latch to be raised, freeing us

just in time for lunch.

Lunch had been pre-booked at the Star in Rolvenden, just down the road from the church. Excellently prompt service by the pub staff enabled everyone to be fed and watered in plenty of time, with good portions of food and local beer. There was even time for pudding for those who had room.

After lunch, we moved on to Wittersham, our host's home tower. Here, we stretched ourselves to attempt Double Norwich and Cambridge Major; neither of which was entirely successful, it must be admitted. However, Plain Bob and Grandsire were more satisfactory.

The final tower, Rye, was actually over the border in East Sussex. Careful planning meant that we had time to park and get to the church in time to ring. Even at the end of a busy day we didn't disgrace ourselves, and managed some good ringing on another fairly heavy set of bells. We finished the day in traditional style with

tea, scones and cake, at the historic Fletcher House tearoom right next to the church.

Particular thanks should go to David Chesson, for his exemplary organisation, and also to Ruth Corney and Sam Cave from Kensington, who joined us for the day and helped us to ring a wider range of methods than we'd otherwise have managed, as well as adding some useful extra ballast on some of the heavier bells!

Sylvia has had to retire from ringing due to Alzheimer's with which she has been coping for several years. Many in the District will know Sylvia. She has been a keen and loyal local ringer, always ready to contribute in teaching sessions and in preparing District meeting teas - she has been a keen cook. Sylvia has a very



neat ringing style, providing a great example to learners. When the band held cycle outings, it was Sylvia who took all the rucksacks, wet gear and extra clothing in her car so that the rest of the band could cycle unladen.



Sylvia started ringing aged 9 and was taught by her father who was a local farmer at Ash in Surrey. Two of her older Brian brothers, and Peter, were also ringers (and sadly they too both have suffered from



Alzheimer's). Sylvia moved to the area in 1961 soon after she married George who was a local GP until 1993. Sylvia kept up ringing whenever she was on holiday including visits to Canada and Australia. The ringing list of towers in UK and abroad was always near at hand. Son, Dr Duncan, is also a ringer and although he doesn't have a tower near to his Yorkshire home, he always likes to ring at Eynsford or Farningham when he visits parents George and Sylvia.

5. KCACR report on the meeting held on 23rd April 2016

- The accounts for 2013, 2014 and 2015 are all complete and are still with the auditor
- The domain name for the KCACR website has been moved to an alternative (cheaper) hosting company as it came up for renewal
- The handbooks were printed & distributed on time at the AGM at the end of March, and next year we plan to provide an extra copy to each tower to place in church
- An award of £150 was made from the Training Fund to Higham to help them install a simulator to allow them to increase their practice time whilst restricted under a Noise Abatement Order from the local council
- It was agreed that, going forward, awards from the Training Fund up to £250 would be agreed by the Training Officer and one of the trustees (Chairman, Secretary or Treasurer) rather than the Training Officer alone
- The Publicity Officer is going to work to create some 'ready-to-go' publicity material that can be used within the County when events occur with media involvement
- An Association consent form for young ringers will be produced with the help of Nigel Spencer
