Remembering the sacrifice of Bromley's bellringers in the First World War

At least six ringers from Bromley parish church saw active service during the First World War, of whom three lost their lives. For the current band of Bromley bellringers, therefore, marking the centenary of the First World War took on a special significance.

The 'Ringing Remembers' campaign to recruit new bellringers to ring for the centenary of the end of the First World War was a huge success, with over 2600 new ringers joining groups across the country. Here in Bromley, four new recruits joined our rapidly growing band to learn for the centenary. Lots of teaching at our practice nights (7-9pm every Tuesday) meant that, by 11th November, they were ready to ring with the rest of the band. Thanks to our recent teaching programme, we had fourteen ringers in the tower on Remembrance Sunday, only five of whom were ringing before 2016. We also held a short act of remembrance in the tower for the three Bromley bellringers who died during the war and later laid a wreath in their memory during the act of remembrance at the war memorial.



The three were clearly a significant loss to Bromley tower, judging from the records at the time. The first to be killed was Alfred James Snr., who died in France on 8th April 1917, aged 40. The then Secretary of the Bromley ringers, Isaac Emery, wrote "his place in the belfry will be hard to fill, for he was a good ringer, and very dependable, his main qualities being punctuality, a bright and cheerful disposition and a readiness always to oblige others". He left a wife and seven children, one of whom (Alfred Jnr.) was also serving in France. Archie Mansfield died in France on 8th August 1917, aged 22;

the Secretary wrote "he was a good lad, and a very promising ringer", who doubtless would have gone on to achieve great things. Eric Filtness, the last of the Bromley bellringers to die in the conflict, was killed in Palestine on 13th July 1918, aged 23. The

Secretary wrote that Eric was killed "much to the regret of us all and of everyone who knew him. I saw his young wife and tendered her our deepest sympathy, we also rang the bells half-muffled, which was unfortunately all we could do in such sad circumstances." The ringers also placed framed photographs of all three fallen bellringers in the tower. These photographs were sadly lost in the bombing of the church during the Second World War.





The centenary of Alfred James' death was marked with a quarter peal of Plain Bob Major in April 2017, and Eric Filtness' with a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples in July 2018. The Bromley bellringers of 1917 rang a half-muffled quarter peal in memory of Alfred James shortly after his death.

Three other ringers at the church returned safely from the war; in April 1919 Isaac Emery wrote "we are very glad to welcome back safely Alfred James Jnr. after a long spell in France and also Mr Spice after his 8 months service in the RAF. We also hope to have ere long our probationer T Knight home for good with us."

We were proud to be able to commemorate the contributions of Alfred James, Archie Mansfield and Eric Filtness, and hope that the work we have done to secure the future of bellringing at Bromley through our recent recruitment and teaching efforts can stand as a lasting tribute to their memory.

First World War Commemoration. In memory of Lance Corporal Herbert Edward White, a ringer at this church, who died 11th October 1918, age 41. Military Police Corps Military Foot Police. Commemorated at Deptford (Brockley) Cemetery. He rang his first peal on 31/12/1907, ringing the 4th to Grandsire Triples at St John's, Deptford, conducted by William J. Jeffries. He rang further peals at Deptford on 31/12/1908, 31/12/1909, 19/02/1910 and 20/05/1910; he rang the 4th to all of the peals, all conducted by William J. Jeffries. During the war he rang quarter peals of Grandsire Triples at Deptford on 03/06/1916 and 01/01/1918.

A band from Derby visited Greenwich on Trafalgar Day and rang a peal of Cape Trafalgar Royal (a new method). Another band from the Maidstone and Tonbridge areas made a visit to Deptford to ring a quarter of Plain Bob Royal in November.

Unfortunately, several people were away over Christmas so we were unable to have any ringing for the Christmas Services although we did celebrate The New Year with our usual Welcome the New Year Ringing at 12 noon on New Year's Day.

Crayford Outing

We hadn't had an outing at Crayford for a number of years until April 2018 and following the success of that event, we vowed to have a second outing before the year was over. Having taken a poll, the date that best suited the majority was Saturday 10th November and after all, there was no other ringing which needed to be done that weekend, was there?!

So, despite our plans for "Ringing Remembers" the following day, we headed off to East Kent, telling ourselves it would be good practice for three of our new recruits who were ringing the following day and for the more experienced to practice some of the sixteen methods we had planned for our 1918 date touch. We set off towards Bekesbourne



on a very damp and overcast autumnal morning with the forecast threatening heavy rain later.

Bekesbourne turned out to be a beautiful, though isolated, 12th century church, with a nice ground floor ring of six (7-2-16) which had been augmented from two bells in the late 19th century and restored in 2003, with the plain bearings being replaced. Our learners coped very well with ringing these bells and they rang some respectable rounds and call changes. It was when practising for our date touch here that I realised I really should have done a bit more homework and hoped that by the end of the day, I would feel a bit more confident about the challenge we had set ourselves for the following day.

Waltham followed next, another ground floor ring of six (8-2-2), strangely hung in the arched chancel crossing. These were not easy bells to ring and I think it would be fair to say that some of the less experienced ringers struggled here. Nevertheless, everybody had a go and did as much as they were comfortable doing. The bells here were augmented from four to six for the millennium and the fifth is the oldest Joseph Hatch bell in Kent, dating from 1602. The church itself is Norman in origin but is quite plain inside and its most notable feature is probably its Georgian gallery.

After Waltham we headed to Selling, the first eight bell tower of the day, where Eddie and Brenda Coode joined us to fortify our numbers after the excitement of having their vaccinations earlier flu that morning. The access to the ringing room was up but straight steep а staircase from outside so



we didn't get to see the inside of the church but having arrived upstairs, we smiled when we saw that a shelf all around the ringing room was full of empty alcohol bottles! Being so light (5-3-26) we thought these might be challenging but our learners rang really well and we also managed some Grandsire and Stedman triples.

Lunch beckoned after this tower so off we went just down the road to the White Lion in Selling where we had pre-ordered food. On entering the pub, our eyes were

immediately drawn to the huge inglenook fireplace and more specifically to the toybox inside. Opening the lid we spied a pack a Uno cards amongst other pastimes and several competitive games were enjoyed before and after eating.

After lunch the first tower of the afternoon was a short drive away in Boughton-under-Blean (11-0-6)

but unfortunately, the ringing here was a little compromised to start with as one car in our group went to the church in the village which incidentally has no bells, whereas the church of St Peter & St Paul we were due to ring at, was located a little way from the village itself. This gave us plenty of time to ring some rounds and call changes and as these bells were probably the closest in feel to those at Crayford, they

were the easiest of the day to ring.

Halfway through the session our geographically-challenged ringers arrived and we were able to move on to ringing some triples and continue the practice for the Sunday's date touch.



By the time we started on the drive to the last tower, the sky was already gloomy and darkness had fallen by the time we reached Sheldwich where we

almost drove straight past with the church hidden among many trees. St James' is a grade II* listed church dating from 1070 with a very nice ring of eight bells (7-0-26) although the front two bells in particular were very flighty. The ringing room was full of peal boards and certificates and was located on a curtained off gallery overlooking the body of the church. We managed a good selection of rounds and call changes, doubles and

triples and it was here that we took our group photo before leaving.

Our itinerary had a local pub listed for a drink before heading home but as our timings had drifted, it was already getting late and the weather had started to take a definite turn for the worse, so we said our goodbyes and left for home, knowing that we would all be back for Ringing Remembers the next morning.

Sixty years ago...

Sixty years ago, on the 3rd January 1959, a peal was rung at St John the Baptist Eltham, dedicated to the memory of Geoff Hurrell, a ringer at that tower. Both his grandfather (Jim) and father (Frederick) were also members of the band, and his death at a tragically early age was regretted by all who knew him.

It was also significant in being the first peal for two of the ringers: Edward Coode and Brenda Slark (who would later that same year become Mrs Coode). Brenda herself conducted the peal, joining the select company of ringers who have called their own first peal. Even more impressively, she called the famously complicated "Original" one-part composition by John Holt, whose 150 seemingly random calls have defeated many experienced conductors. Brenda remembers being coached in this challenging feat of memory by another Eltham ringer, Ernest Crowder, who had himself called the composition several times in the 1950s.

It seemed appropriate to mark this significant anniversary with a quarter-peal: of Grandsire Triples, of course, although on this occasion Brenda delegated the conducting duties to Ian Mills. A sparkling quarter was rung at Eltham, sixty years to the day since the original peal, with a band made of a few of Eddie and Brenda's many friends from the District.

A warm welcome was given to Pete and Liz who were present at the meeting.

5. Officer Reports

Ringing Master, Nick Wilkins. Practices have been held monthly and I am still trying to ensure that all the towers in the district are visited. I am keen to reach out to more ringers across the District as although the practices are generally well attended I was disappointed that only 6 ringers attended the practice at The Annunciation, Chislehurst. However, 20+ attended Farningham. Ringing is tailored to who attends so should be inclusive. The Chelsfield Surprise Major practice has recently been re-branded as a District practice but has more or less remained with the same ringers attending. If you'd like to ring Surprise Major come along on the 2^{nd} Wednesday of the month 8 – 9.30pm where you will be made very welcome.

The Lewisham District entered the County 6 bell, 8 bell striking Competitions, and the Essex 10 bell trophy. The district call change competition was won by Crayford last November. Eltham won the district striking competition in Downe in March. I would encourage as many towers as possible to enter the district call-change competition in November and the striking competition in the New Year.

Nineteen quarter peals in 16 different towers were rung in Quarter Peal week 9th – 18th March.

I have concerns are the silent towers (5) identified in the County survey from November 2017. Some could just be that a return wasn't sent but how can we help our neighbouring towers?

The County young ringers are very active and as the district young persons' rep I encourage you to muster your young ringers to get involved. Jen Thomas is arranging lots of County wide activities.

Training Officer, Lesley Barclay. My main focus has been on basic bell handling and those starting out in ringing. I've visited towers and taught learners at my home tower, Horton Kirby. I will continue this focus even though I am standing down from the role.

The Chair formally thanked Lesley for all her hard work during her time in the role.

Newsletter Editor, Rupert Cheeseman. Thank you for all who contribute to the content of the newsletter, it is appreciated. The newsletter is what you make it, the more items submitted make a better newsletter. Rupert was thanked for continuing to compile it for us.

120 Club, Liz Brett. Liz informed the meeting that 103 of the 120 shares were sold this year and she will start selling the shares for 2019 from the January meeting. Despite the challenges set before her by Bromley and Sevenoaks Licencing, she eventually got there and is formally registered to administer the club.

6. KCACR Report from 28th July 2018 & Proposed rule changes

- <u>Proposed Rule Changes</u> A number of rule changes for decision at the AGM 2019 Easter Monday 22nd April are envisaged. Details will be circulated to District Secretaries by 1st September 2018 for consideration at Annual District Meetings this October. To date the proposed rule changes relate to:-
- Quorum of General Committee to be reduced from 8 to 6 to reflect the reduced size of the committee agreed at last year's AGM.
- To ensure that at least two of the three BRF Trustees be present when grant decisions are made.
- Subscription category changes in order to generate sufficient funds to balance income against expenditure.

- <u>Peal Fee Review</u> Decision deferred to 23rd February 2019 General Committee but understood that any excess peal fees would be used for the Training Fund. Full details from or comments to the Association Chairman Phil Barnes.
- <u>Role Descriptions</u> The Chairman is developing a list of essential tasks that need to be undertaken at District Level with a suggested division of such tasks amongst the officers in a typical district.
- <u>General Data Protection Regulations</u> To ensure the Association is fully compliant with the GDPR an annual check for consents would be undertaken at the same time as Membership Subscription renewals.
- <u>Reinvigorating Ringing in Kent</u> Association Chairman Phil Barnes has met with District Officers to review and share information and ideas about what is happening in each district. Common issues emerged; importance of maintaining interest amongst ringers at every level of experience, training structures, activities across-district boundaries, improving basic ringing training, group teaching hubs, co-ordination of teaching and development of trainers. A second meeting focused on recruitment, effective teaching of bell-handling with the aim of one ringer per rope in the Association by the AGM 2021, proactive approach to training events, advanced practices and improved communication. Please contact Phil Barnes to support and engage with reinvigorating ringing in Kent.
- <u>Mid-week 10 bell practices on Association-wide basis</u> Dates will be circulated shortly for bi-monthly 10-bell practices with an initial focus on Stedman and simple surprise.
- <u>Treasurer Notice</u> Margaret Funnell reminds members that she would be standing down as Association Treasurer at the AGM 2019. Please speak with Margaret if you wish to know more and/or offer yourself for nomination to this important role.
- <u>Training Officer</u> David Grimwood hopes to help increase the number of accredited Mentors in Kent to support those undertaking ARTS training courses. Course fee funding is available from the Association. A Leadership Skills Course is envisaged on 17th November 2018, location to be confirmed. David Grimwood encourages ringers to contact him with requests or ideas for training events and to share experience on recruitment and retention.
- <u>Safeguarding</u> David Grimwood and Nigel Spencer have an impressive grasp of safeguarding issues. Dioceses are
 providing online Safeguarding training for all ringers through courses C0 and C1 and a half-day course C2 for those who are
 required to have a clear DBS check. Dates and venues for District C2 courses will be circulated shortly. The Rochester
 Diocese is organising C2 Safeguarding courses on Monday 1st October and Saturday 1st December (venues to be
 confirmed).
- <u>Youth Activities</u> Kent Young Ringers have been extremely busy over the past three months follow this <u>link</u> to the Kent Youth pages for details. Another quarter peal day is being organised by the young people on 6th August. A Young Ringers' Programme for 2019 is being drawn up. Work to create a Youth Competition Trophy is progressing. A practice band to take part in the County 6-bell competition is yet to be confirmed. A change in the competition rules may be needed in future for them to compete in their own right.
- <u>Bell Restoration</u> Follow the link to the latest Bell Restoration Report by Brian Butcher. A grant of £490 was approved for the repair of the Lydd tenor clapper.
- <u>Milton Regis Ringing Centre</u> Association support was requested to secure Heritage Lottery Funding (HLF) to develop Milton Regis into a ringing centre. The Association has provided a grant for the rehanging project which is now well under way. Additional works are envisaged to provide social/teaching space with a kitchen and other facilities for wider community use. A letter from the Association would encourage HLF support for the Ringing Centre.
- <u>Mobile Ring project</u> Follow this <u>link</u> to the full report on the project to date. Design work would continue and a full report
 was requested for the November General Committee to include detailed design and implementation proposals, confirmation
 that it was fit for purposes, storage and operation proposals to conform to the original agreed outline.
- <u>Ringing for the Centenary of the Armistice 11th November 2018</u> Full details had now been circulated nationwide follow <u>links</u>. Ringers should liaise with their local churches and communities in order to participate fully and appropriately.
- <u>Ringing Competitions</u> A Kent band would take part in the Essex Trophy on 8th September at Horsham. The County 6-bell competition is on 22nd September 2018 at Upchurch, 9.45am draw. Kent Young Ringers will take part in an inter-District Youth competition on 3rd November 2018 at Kingsnorth, 1.45pm draw. Kent ringers up to the age of 25 would be eligible to take part.
- London Ringers' <u>Advent Carol Service 03/12/2018</u> 19:30 at St Giles in the Field, Holborn. Members of the KCACR have been invited to take part in this event. Please contact Margaret Peirce <u>peircemargaret@aol.com</u> direct if you wish to attend.
- <u>Frank Lewis Memorial Board</u> The design of the Peal Board was agreed and the cost had been mainly covered by donations. A full report would be contained in the next Handbook.
- <u>South East England Youth Striking Competition</u> KCACR will be hosting this event on 6th April 2019. Six to eight teams from across the South East could be expected. Volunteers to help run the day will be needed please contact Youth Officer, Jen Thomas to offer your assistance.
- <u>AGM 2020 alternative date</u> It was suggested that the AGM be moved away from Bank Holiday Easter Monday from 2020. Doug Davis offered to write a proposal for the 24th November Committee, so please let him have ideas or views.
- <u>Dates of next General Committee meetings</u> 24th November 2018. General Committee dates for 2019 were agreed as 23/02/2019, 27/04/2019, 27/07/2019 & 30/11/2019.

Points raised on some of the above points :-

- There are places still available for the C2 Safeguarding training taking place on 1st December contact David Grimwood if you are a Tower Captain that still hasn't booked a place or you wish to attend.
- There are transferrable DBS checks, but they are more expensive.
- The only Job description/role requirements that have been received from the county Chair is that which relates to the Youth

officer. Passed to Nick Wilkins our rep.

- The County Chair texted Philippa Rooke and Sue Cameron on Friday evening requesting 3 4 officers from the district make themselves available for a Leadership Training Course being held on 17th November. Unfortunately, this date clashes with our district Call-Change competition. In principle the idea is great, however not so easy in practice especially with this short notice.
- The membership fee changes were discussed. There is a full report in the latest newsletter for your information and the reasoning behind the changes. Insurance does not cover ringers beyond the age of 79. The view of those that spoke was that the price increase was inevitable and at the end of the day it is still a very small price to pay in comparison to subscriptions to other organisations/ hobbies. One question was raised asking if it is recorded anywhere when a member qualifies for free or reduced membership but pays the full price. One tower present has two members who pay by choice. Our membership secretary doesn't mark this up, just that they have paid. The current membership application requests DoB for new members who are claiming one of the discounted fees.
