Crayford take the Chequered Flag

Following on from a successful virtual call change competition in November 2020, the committee decided to go ahead with a virtual 6-bell striking (method) competition, held on the first Saturday in March when our in-person competition would usually take place.

Four bands entered – Chelsfield, Crayford, Eltham and Eynsford – and Nick sourced a judge in Tom Lawrance. Tom is the tower captain at Holborn, St Giles-in-the-Field and a highly experienced ringer, composer of methods and competition judge, although we were a little nervous when we found out on the morning of the competition that he had never used Ringing Room before! Fortunately, our fears were unfounded and Tom delivered probably the most hilarious round up of each ringing performance that any of us had ever heard. This was all based around his observation that this is the LewisHam(ilton) District and was therefore F1 themed.

Band 1 (Crayford – Plain Bob Doubles)

Had engine problems on the 10th lap (lead) and on the 11th lap, the engine seemed to fail completely. They started again and the second time round the circuit the wheels stayed on. A very consistent performance and the last two laps were excellent. A good peal speed of 3hr 21mins.



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Band 2 (Chelsfield – Plain Bob Doubles)

An exciting ride but not the most consistent. A visit to the pits for maybe a cup of tea three quarters of the way through slowed the ringing down, but there were plenty of overtaking manoeuvres in the final course. A peal speed of 4hr 7mins.

Band 3 (Eltham – Plain Bob Minor)

Started very purposefully but spun off on the second lap. They started again but it took a while for the tyres to warm up but by the 8th lap it was very good, although it tailed off after this. Peal speed of 4hr 6mins.

Band 4 (Eynsford – Plain Bob Doubles)

An interesting technique with this band for coping with virtual ringing, overtaking wasn't an issue but a determination to avoid crashes seemed to be the tactic. Half way through the first run they ran out of petrol, the second attempt failed to make it off the grid but the third attempt was completed despite hitting a patch of oil on lap 9 and they stately and competently passed the finishing line, only to crash into the flag bearers' box at the end. Peal speed of 4hr 8mins.

The results were then announced in reverse order:

- 1st Band 1 – Crayford 76%
- 2nd Band 4 – Eynsford 68%
- 3rd Band 3 – Eltham 66%
- 4th Band 2 – Chelsfield 58%

That makes a clean sweep of virtual competitions for Crayford, the same band having also been victorious in the call change competition last November. We would just like to say though that these wins undoubtedly reflect the fact that we have held weekly virtual practices since the beginning of April 2020.

As we return to in-person quarterly meetings, I've been wondering whether this is a good opportunity to review the timing, and possibly the format of future meetings.

You are probably aware that we have been holding virtual meetings at 10am, mainly because the internet seemed more stable at that time rather than the afternoon slot we always had in person. However, several people have suggested that they would prefer the morning meetings to continue once we can meet again, with the main benefit of leaving the rest of the day free.

A very valid point has also been made about the advantage of having the January meeting in particular in the morning, which would avoid travelling in the dark when the days are short. Morning meetings also leave the afternoon free for ringing at weddings but conversely, some members have commitments on Saturday mornings and would rather the meetings stay in the afternoon.

Then there is the question of whether we should keep the service element and the tea, which could easily be adapted to lunch should the decision be made to hold morning meetings instead. Personally, I'm in favour of

The last year has been dominated by Covid restrictions which has meant very little real tower bell ringing until recently.

Consequently until the last couple of months, practices have generally been held online using Ringling Room in conjunction with Zoom. Ringling Room is a clever platform and this enabled us to maintain some form of contact with each other although, I think it true to say, a number of us, me included, found it more difficult ringing methods online than on proper tower bells. That said, it has been a way of learning and some ringers have made excellent progress on Ringling Room.

I recall we quite often managed Stedman and Grandsire Triples and did very occasionally try Surprise Major. We also had some fun ringing things such as plain hunt on eleven. I'm particularly grateful to Rupert who enthusiastically and capably looked after some of the online ringing.

Most recently there have been 'in person' practices on the reasonably well ventilated ground floor rings at Chislehurst (St Nicholas) and Shoreham.

In November we held an online call change striking competition on Ringling Room judged by Caroline Stockmann. The results were close with Eltham and Crayford scoring the same but Crayford being deemed the winners by virtue of their ringing speed - if peal length, the Crayford band would have been in the pub a full hour before the Eltham ringers!

In March we held a method competition ringing 120 changes also on Ringling Room. Tom Lawrance amusingly announced the results using motor racing analogies and Crayford were again the winners.

Having served as Ringling Master for six years it was probably about time for me to stand down and give someone else a chance in any event and, I'm afraid, the very limited normal ringing over the last year has reinforced my view on this. Additionally, I've had additional family responsibilities which some of you will be aware of.

I'm therefore not seeking re-election but would like to thank everyone in the District for their support and wish my successor the very best of luck moving forwards.

Hopefully they will get as much satisfaction and pleasure out of the role as I did up until the last year and push standards upwards at the monthly practices, both 'normal' and 'advanced' as well as the ten bell practices.

Finally, I apologise that I'm not personally at the ADM but I'm spending a few weeks in Spain trying to relax after a demanding year so far which has included the death of my aunt on Easter Sunday and sorting out Probate and the sale of her property.

Fast Tolling - The fifth bell was rung to remind the parish that the church was open for Private Prayers. Also, rung to wish Tom Hinks and Helena Mattingley all the best for their wedding on Friday 18th December.

Wednesday, 11 November 2020
92 Tolling - The tenor bell was tolled 92 times before and 92 times after the Funeral Service in church today of Patricia Maud Miles (23 July 1928 to 13 October 2020).
The tenor was also tolled 92 times at 1140am to mark what would have been the ringer's father-in-law's 92nd birthday, William Oliver (11 November 1928 to 28 May 2020).

Sunday, 8 November 2020
Tolling - The tenor was tolled at 11am during the 1030am online service. Service at The War Memorial with laying of wreaths at 12 noon - 12 strikes on the tenor, then tenor tolled and rung down after the service.

Thursday, 5 November 2020
76 Tolling - Rung in Memory of Thomas Milner Barlow, on the day of his funeral at St. Michael's, Maidstone. There were two sessions of tolling - on the treble for 1030am and on the second for 1130am - as the church was open for private prayer and the tolling was also for the reading of names being remembered as part of All Souls Commemoration this week.

Sunday, 1 November 2020
Tolling - The third and fifth bells tolled before the Service of Commemoration for All Souls. Remembering those we love but see no longer.

Thursday, 29 October 2020
77 Tolling - Rung before Holy Eucharist, in loving memory of Thomas Milner Barlow (29th October 1943 to 15th October 2020), mentor and a great friend to many, on what would have been his 77th birthday today.

When things return to some sort of normality, the aim is to try and continue to ring for a service about once a month, some quarter peals and some occasional general ringing practices. Unfortunately, as there is currently an interregnum there are no Sunday Evening services which we have often rung for. There is also a possibility of organising a Tower Open Day sometime to demonstrate the bells and hopefully to get some of the local community to take up ringing and get a regular band ringing at Hayes again.

MERIDIAN RINGERS

It is almost a year since our last report in the Newsletter.

Our normal ringing pattern:

Beginners' session 715pm to 8pm – Wednesdays at Greenwich
Sunday morning Choral Eucharist Service at Greenwich [depends on availability] – 915am to 10am
Choral Evensong at Greenwich – last Sunday of the month, 540pm to 630pm
Sunday Evening Worship at St. John's, Deptford once a month [but not at the moment as there are no Evening services due to the interregnum].
We also ring at Hayes occasionally, usually for a Sunday Evening service once a month [but not at the moment as there are no Evening services due to the interregnum]. See separate item for Hayes elsewhere in the newsletter.

We don't ring at Woolwich much these days as access is quite difficult at times due to The Deeper Meaning Life Church using the balcony for their services and meetings. There was a pigeon infestation, although the birds are no longer there but some major professional cleaning is needed.

We have some good attendances at practice nights, sometimes ringing all 10 bells, some triples, minor and some additional doubles methods and some work on Treble Hunting Minor.

We plan to arrange some more of our two-hour Ringing School Workshops in due course, with some intense work on Doubles work, plain hunt on 6 and 7, and Bob Minor.

Obviously, the most significant happening in the past year was the passing of our dear friend, Alan Munden,

whose obituary is included in this newsletter.

Last autumn ringing was restricted once again due to the pandemic, but the following special ringing, which includes some Eighths (which I wrote about in the Ringing World) took place at Greenwich, starting with the most recent (more details are on Bellboard):

Friday, 27 August 2021
480 Plain Bob Doubles – before wedding.

Friday, 27 August 2021
640 Plain Bob Doubles - An eighth rung after wedding. Also, rung in memory of Ted Dexter (15.5.1935 to 24.8.2021), former England and Sussex cricketer.

Wednesday, 21 July 2021
100 Plain Hunt Doubles - On practice night, to mark The Inauguration of The Hundred Cricket Competitions, not far from here, at The Oval, Kennington.

Friday, 16 July 2021
640 Plain Bob Doubles – An Eighth rung as birthday compliments to Bill, Hazel, Graham and Shelagh (who all rang in the eighth). Also, remembering our dear friend, Revd Canon John Ardley (2.7.39 to 2.2.2004). Rung before Marriage Service. Also, congratulations to Chris Lawrance (Bromley Common) and Ann Lawrance on the date of their 44th wedding anniversary - 16th July 1977 at St. Mary The Virgin, Hayes, Kent.

Wednesday, 23 June 2021
360 Plain Bob Doubles, 240 Plain Bob Minimus, 150 Grandsire Doubles – Three separate touches, rung in natural daylight in memory of Richard Bing. We have aimed to ring on the nearest practice night to Midsummer's Day for many years without any electric lights - this was originally Richard's idea, and we continue to do this every year.

Monday, 31 May 2021
440 Plain Bob Doubles, Rounds, Call Changes and Plain Bob Minimus (rung by an all ladies band), 640 Plain Bob Doubles, - Three separate touches, the last one being an Eighth, for 'New Year's Day' Ringing. We have a tradition of meeting up to ring at 12 noon on 1st January every year and have pictures from previous years displayed in the ringing room. Obviously, we were not able to do this at the start of 2021 - so we decided to transfer the day to the May Bank Holiday. Remembering past ringers who took part in New Year's Day Ringing in previous years - Freda Cannon, Ken Deller, John Ardley and, especially, Alan Munden who passed away 22nd January 2021.

Wednesday, 26 May 2021
274 Minimus and Doubles (2m) - 74th birthday compliments to John Bonney (27.5.1947), who rang the tenor.

Sunday, 2 May 2021
400 Plain Bob Doubles - Rung by request and with the

authorisation from the Clergy and Churchwardens for the Revd Caroline Risdon's final service at St Alfege. Revd Caroline is to be the new Vicar of St John's, Eltham from June 2021. (We also nominated Revd Caroline to be an Associate Member of KCACR).



Sunday, 11 April 2021
399 Doubles (2m) - Rung by request and with the authorisation of the Clergy and Churchwardens, before the special Service of Prayer and Thanksgiving for the life of HRH Prince Philip, The Duke of Edinburgh.


Sunday, 4 April 2021
Rounds and Call Changes - To celebrate the Feast of Easter, rung before Choral Eucharist.

Tuesday, 23 March 2021
400 Plain Bob Doubles - Rung for The Induction Service of Revd Simon Winn as Vicar of St Alfege's. (By request and with special permission of the Parish Clergy and Churchwardens; on distanced bells, a well ventilated ringing chamber, masks worn etc, and all the ringers having had their first vaccinations). Also, marking the National Day of Reflection.

Wednesday, 27 January 2021
Tolling 70 - Three separate sessions, rung by Hazel Bing, Jim Odell and Graham Long
Tolling in Memory of Alan Munden (30 January 1950 to 22 January 2021).

(Special permission was authorised by The Parish Priest and The Churchwardens).

Each ringer went up the tower one at a time and rang three separate bells which Alan would have rung



on the most occasions, especially the 6th and the tenor. In recent months, it was the 3rd that he rang mostly.

Each ringer tolled a bell for 76 strokes, in memory of Tom Barlow (1943-2020), on the eve of his funeral at St. Michael's, Maidstone.

Due to Tier 2 restrictions, each ringer went up the tower one at a time to ring their bell. This ringing also marked the end of ringing for a while due to the national lockdown from November 5th.

Alan Munden RIP

Sadly, Alan passed away in Darent Hospital on 22nd January. Over the past few years Alan had fought cancer bravely and was able to resume ringing as much as he could. Unfortunately, in recent months he also suffered from heart problems and was taken into hospital in January this year as he had breathing problems and had caught Covid.

Alan hailed from Northallerton, North Yorkshire and learnt to ring along with his father, Norman, in the late 1950s. He rang his first quarter peal in 1967 but recalled ringing something special for the funeral of Winston Churchill in 1965 (although I have not been able to find any documentation for this).

In the late 1960s Alan came to London to join The Metropolitan Police Service where he met Liz who was also in the police service. They were married at St Botolph-without-Bishopsgate, City of London on 27 October 1973 eventually settling in Bexleyheath. Alan eventually joined the Police Traffic Service, which was his passion.

In the late 1970s Alan's dad, Norman was visiting London and Liz went to the local library and found out that ringing took place at St Mary's, Woolwich. So, Alan and Norman went along the following Wednesday where they were welcomed by Hazel and Richard Bing, who became firm family friends from that day. Alan soon joined the local band and Liz also learnt to ring - when both couples had baby boys, Liz and Hazel used to take turn to attend practices or to babysit.

Due to family and work commitments Alan was not always able to be at ringing so much in the 1980s and 1990s but he tried to support the band, when it was possible, especially for service ringing and ringers' outings when his dad often came down from Yorkshire to join in. Sadly, Alan's dad, Norman, died whilst ringing at St Michael's, Maidstone on one of these outings, October 1988.

When Alan retired from the police after 30 years' service, he did various other jobs, including some coach driving and then became a Traffic Examiner at The Vehicle and Operator Services Agency (VOSA). He really loved anything to do with transport and travel.



When the size of the bands at Greenwich and Woolwich diminished the bands joined forces in the late 1990s and eventually became The Meridian Ringers (Greenwich, Deptford, and Woolwich) with Alan as one of the driving forces. As well as being a ringer, Alan was the tower treasurer, purchaser of the tower chocolate tins, helped organising business matters such as annual dinners, polo shirts and sweatshirts, and tower necessities, especially the beautiful carpet at Greenwich. Most importantly, Alan was an excellent and very understanding teacher of new ringers.

Although he was not an expert in terms of method ringing, he was an excellent tenor cover ringer, a task he really loved, just like his father, Norman. He was particularly forthright on good bell handling technique and good striking and many of his former pupils will attest to that. He was particularly devoted to ringing for Sunday services and weddings and often helped at St Mary's, Bexley, particularly in tolling for funerals. Alan rang about 50 quarter peals, although there may have been more that are not recorded. He was a great team member, in so many respects.

Alan was a most friendly man and if he ever saw people hovering about outside the church would encourage them to experience the surroundings by showing people round and talking about the history of the church and bellringing.

He was an excellent raconteur with a whole collection of anecdotes and experiences which he would recount especially over a couple of beers – even if there was a hint of exaggeration on many occasions!! If there was anything you ever needed help or advice on Alan would be there. Most of all he was a loving and caring family man – husband to Liz, father to Andrew and Ruth, and grandfather to Elliott and Esther.

He will be greatly missed by us all. May he rest in peace – and rise in glory.
