District News

A Mini-Handbell Conversion Project (originally written March 2021)

Having decided to take early retirement back in September 2020, and with lockdown preventing many other activities, I needed a small project to use as a reason to avoid doing the housework. A while back I had been intrigued by Richard Johnston's conversion of a toy handbell set, and had noted it as a project to try at some point. Simon Gay had also published an account of his own experiences of applying Richard's instructions.

The indicated cost, albeit reasonable for a of handbells, was a bit more than I [as a parsimonious ringer] was willing to spend on of frippery – especially as I already had a set Whitechapel handbells. But I did keep an out in case a set of toy handbells came up discounted – which they did early in 2021. Game-On!

I managed to get the bells for a shade under from Amazon Warehouse (presumably some returns), and started looking around the other needed items. Unfortunately many the links in Richard and Simon's articles were out of date!



This led to me spending a bit of time searching online for alternative sources [*no Lesley, I was not just loafing around*]. The two key items to find were leather for the handles and caps, and the Robart hinges – other items, such as the washers, screws, and tubing I got from either Amazon, Screwfix [an excuse to go and find the newly opened branch in Faversham], or B&Q.


The leather was a $2\frac{3}{4}$ " x 50" strip of 9-10 oz (3.5mm) vegetable tanned bull hide leather from Sepici on Amazon US. Although this was coming from the US it was below the import duty threshold so no additional tax or duty was charged.

I found the Robart F-RB309 $^{3}/_{16}$ " hinges at Elite Models Online based in Sittingbourne. In normal times I would have avoided the £5 postage and paid them a visit and enjoyed a browse of their other wares. Another time perhaps.

I thought the lettering stencils were a bit too much of an extravagance and was looking to use some Letraset. I was sure I had some left over from 1970-something [see Lesley – the things I hoard do have a use]. Unfortunately I couldn't find it so ended up buying some Avery Zweckform 3780 stick on vinyl lettering – though at £9 I thought this seemed a bit pricey for what you get.

In total my purchased materials were a few pennies under £65 (though it would have been a little bit more if I had not already had a jar of Pavers Dubbin to treat the leather) – not bad!

I decided to start the project by cutting the handles and caps from the leather. This required a little bit of planning to get all the pieces from the leather. I wanted 270mm x 20mm strips for the handles, and 50mm



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diameter caps. Using the layout shown below gave me all the pieces I needed and a couple of offcuts useful for experimenting on and checking fits – it also left me with a usefully sized remnant for another project. To help make the handles feel a bit more comfortable in the hand I used sandpaper to bevel the edges. After applying the lettering to each handle I was a bit concerned that the slightly raised vinyl might be prone to rubbing-off – so I wanted to try and recess them a bit. I tried using an improvised circular die (cut from an old bank card) and a hefty whack from a hammer (onto a piece of wood shielding the leather). It sort of worked – but could be better. I might go back and try and form a better die and apply a more even force using a clamp.




Dismantling the bells was a bit of a mixed affair. The existing handle and clapper assembly came apart from the bell with some moderate application of force - twisting and pulling; separating the retaining plug, spring, and clapper ball of the clapper assembly was more challenging. Often the spring was too strongly embedded and broke off - leaving a remnant in the retaining plug/clapper ball. This was not too much of an issue for the retaining plug as the other end of the plug provided a good guide for drilling out the centre - forcing past any spring For the clapper ball it was more remnant. challenging as any spring remnant tended to throw the drilling off course. When it came to drilling the clapper balls I came up with a couple of tricks to help. I found that a $\frac{5}{16}$ socket (from my $\frac{1}{2}$ set) made a good chuck to hold the ball securely (but make sure the socket has an open back so that you can push the ball back out), the 10mm socket (from my 1/4" set) also worked well (with a 6.5mm drill poked through it) for marking the centre of the clapper shank. I also found that colouring the clapper ball with a sharpie made it much easier to spot markings.



To give the bells a softer sound Richard's instructions call for an O ring to be fitted over the clapper. To cut the retaining groove in the clapper ball I decided to go for the "improvised lathe" approach – but I needed to use my bigger (mains driven) electric drill as the clapper shank was too large for my battery drill. Marking the cutting point with a sharpie again helped with getting the cut in the right place. Things seemed to be going well – so this was time for the next problem to present itself. The O rings were too large for the clapper balls! Oh spiffing! (I may have used the old Anglo-Saxon pronunciation). Naturally I was too tight concerned with the ecological waste of discarding the O rings I had, so cut a small piece (about 4mm) from each ring and super-glued the ends back together to form a slightly smaller O ring. The fix was quite strong and the O ring is glued onto the clapper ball – so it should be robust enough (just need to orientate the clapper so that it does not strike on the joint).

For the amount of fiddling about the clapper balls seem more trouble than they are worth, I think it would be easier to replace them by either a $\frac{1}{2}$ " or $\frac{3}{4}$ " washer (it would avoid the problems of removing the spring, drilling out, and fitting O rings).

The Robart hinges felt a little stiff – but Simon's suggestion of using pliers and a knife to ease the metal pin did not appeal. I found that resting the hinge pin over a small hole and tapping the other side of the pin (conveniently recessed) with a hammer and nail did a splendid job.



The next awkward bit was cutting the tubing that goes on the arms of the hinge to hold the washers in place and set the striking impact weight. According to Richard's instructions this requires a bit of experimentation – and I also found it tricky to get a good square cut on the tubing (my best idea came towards the end – using a drill guide, I put the tubing through the 8mm hole, protruding the desired distance, then cutting along the face of the drill guide). Even using hot melt glue – which allowed me to do test assemblies that I could pull apart if necessary – I got fed up with the approach after doing four bells, particularly as there was no means of adjustment

after assembly. Playing with the various components I came up with a revised design that used a couple of screws driven through the upper washer to set the striking. Although I kept the tubing, its sizing was less critical – and I think it is probably unnecessary if a strong glue is used. I will wait to see how the different fittings work out when the bells are used before going back and replacing the first four.

Final assembly of the handles, caps, bells, and new clapper mechanisms was quite straight-forward, which was a nice finish for the project. I found a case that I already had (ROC Flight Case 460mmx340mmx115mm) made a nice home for them. The price new on Amazon is just under £24 – but I am having a think about what would be needed to make a wooden case of that size.

At the end I am really pleased with the look and sound of the bells. The O rings make them much softer than the clanging noise given by the original clappers. They might not win any prizes – but I am sure I have rung on worse. I remain a bit worried about the lettering peeling off – so will be keeping an eye on that. They are now waiting** until we resume Ospringe handbell practices so I can see how they work as a full set – and to see what the rest of the band think.

It has been a fun project which I would recommend to anyone who enjoys practical construction (and I would be happy to share further details if anybody is interested). Aside from building a case for them, I am looking out for other similar bells, going very cheap, to experiment on -I want to see if spray painting them affects their tuning.



** [Update Jun-2022] As no Newsletters were published during lockdown this article has been much delayed. The bells have been rung a few times since and their novelty value gives some amusement. The lack of adjustment on some bells is frustrating as some find them hard to strike – the redesigned clapper I developed gives much better control. Their sound has very little hum so they lack any great character, but the basic notes are OK; not sure how one might feel after some extended ringing. SCP.

It's Coming Home

For those not keeping up to date with Association announcements the County 8-Bell Striking Competition was held on 18-Jun-2022 at S^t Mary the Virgin, Goudhurst – a 23cwt eight with a reputation for being "*a bit awkward*". The method was Stedman Triples (a method with a reputation of being "*a bit awkward*") and the initially proposed

composition was a rather exciting piece – however after some mutterings of disquiet across the county a more straight-forward touch of 252 changes (S SL L) was set.

John managed to find seven other people who could not think of excuses quickly enough and a practice at Sittingbourne was arranged for the preceding Wednesday - for which we thank Wendy and Frank Dadson for allowing the use of the bells and opening up for us. The practice showed we could ring the method even when dealing with challenging bells, and after one very minor hesitation in the first touch Cathryn was solid on the calling. After ringing the touch three times we decided not to push our luck any further.

The draw was held promptly at 9:45 am, which was inconvenient as nobody from Canterbury had arrived by then; fortunately Jane arrived just as the draw completed and was able to confirm that our band was on the way – we were given the final ringing slot. The KCACR "Latest News" email had forewarned that Ashford was

unable to raise a band, and it turned out that Maidstone was also unable to take to the field – leaving it a four-way competition. Most of our band adjourned to the churchyard to relax in the warm sunny weather and to discern some hints of what awaited us by listening to the other bands.

Tonbridge started very briskly – perhaps a bit too fast as there seemed to be quite a few trips and the light/heavy bell dodging seemed to be picking up a fair few clips. Disaster struck early in their test piece and they stood up and had a fresh start (though faults from both sets of ringing were counted).

Rochester had a slightly steadier pace, but still [*in the opinion of the churchyard critics*] quite quick – it too leading to some repeated clipping and potentially aggravating some method mistakes.

Lewisham set off at a much more modest pace and this gave us a chance to better hear the light/heavy bell mixes and the challenges they posed. After a good beginning errors started to creep in and upset the evenness of the ringing and unfortunately in the last part of the test piece a calling error obliged them to set the bells up – too late to try a restart. This left us to try and take what we had garnered from listening to our competitors and make something of it.

Our practice piece went well, some odd clips as we tried to figure out how the bells interacted with each other. Final reassurances to calm any jitters were given and Cathryn led us into our test piece. We took a fairly measured pace – unusual for a Canterbury District band (or is that just me) – which made some bell combinations difficult to get right first time, but these were quickly corrected. The clips we incurred did not unsettle the overall rhythm and did not provoke any greater breakdown of the ringing; the band held its nerve and completed the test piece without a method fault (always a good thing, but doubly so with Stedman).

We joined the other bands in the church to await the judges verdict – enjoying tea/coffee and cake provided by the locals. After a nervous wait we were called to order by Neil Jones who thanked Catherine Heathcote and her local helpers and introduced the judges, Julian Ferrar and Julian Hemper of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild. Julian Hemper explained their approach to marking and gave the general comments about the bells (*not forgiving and a tricky mixture of elements of odd-struckness*) and each piece of ringing.

They thought Tonbridge were too fast giving rise to inconsistent and cartwheeling leads. Rochester had a better speed with good leading, and the tenor kept a good pace; method mistakes were sorted out quickly. Lewisham started really well but deteriorated as the piece went on before having to set the bells. Canterbury rang confidently with no method faults, ticking along nicely with good leading. This left Julian Ferrar to give the scores (unfortunately no statistics on equivalent peal speed were given).

So hearty congratulations to our team, with particular thanks to Cathryn for taking on the additional responsibilities of conducting. Commiserations to our fellow competitors, well done for taking part and making the competition possible.

The Oldest Residents of the Village?

We are six residents of Chartham who are older than all other villagers, have rarely moved from our home in over 400 years yet we are still quite mobile – who are we?

It's a poor riddle but you have probably guessed that I am talking about the bells of St Mary's church!

The bells are all dated from their mouldings. Five of the bells were cast in 1605 and the sixth was created in 1728. They vary in size from the 'treble' bell at just over 259kg to the 'tenor' bell at 684kg, comfortably over half a metric tonne. The lighter bells sound a higher note so that when the bells are rung in order from lightest to heaviest, they create a satisfying descending peal of notes which many of us enjoy hearing at weddings, Easter, Christmas and other occasions.

The bells hang in a stout wooden frame secured in the belfry, the room inside the church tower just below the tower roof. If you look at the tower from the churchyard the belfry is the room with the slatted wooden vents which allow the sound to escape the tower. Each bell is secured to a large wheel with a rope attached which hangs down into the ringing chamber, the room below the belfry. That, not surprisingly, is where the bell ringers gather to ring the bells, 47 narrow steps up from ground level. Up until the late 16th Century church bells were simply rung by a straight pull on the rope but after they began to be set on wheels, with the addition of other equipment such as slides and stays, the bell ringers were given greater bell control to slow and speed up the bells as necessary. This allowed the introduction of 'change' ringing where a leader can call a change so that two bells change places in the ringing order to produce a new sequence, and 'method' ringing where a series of memorised changes are rung in sequence, sometimes over several hours. There's more to it than meets the eye... What fascinates me about our oldest residents is that they have been rung for over 400 years and always by local people like you who are kind enough to volunteer to learn how to ring and once trained, commit time to ring them as needed. Who doesn't want to hear bells rung at a wedding? Or at a funeral where a single tolling bell, muffled, creates a thoughtful and sombre tone as we say goodbye to a loved one? Or to hear them peal at national celebrations such as the Jubilee?

The bells need volunteers to learn and to continue the 400 year tradition, or else sadly they will rest silently and become an unused relic, visited only by the birds.

As we all know, almost anyone can learn to ring, young or old; you need no musical skill nor qualification to start and the training provided by expert ringers from other villages, is free! But we need your help!

I have been ringing since last October but now our band require extra help to allow us all to proceed in our training (we have been ringing round on four or five). So, please turn up at St Mary's on a Friday evening between 1930 and 1945 and you will be made very welcome and help our small but very keen band to ring on our six bells. After 1945 the doors are secured and the training starts, continuing until 2100, so it's a once a week attendance for 90 minutes.

A Diary of Ringing for the Queens Platinum Jubilee

- Thursday 2 June A visit to Wickhambreaux for their regular practice and afterwards a trip to The Haywain at Bramling for a well earned couple of drinks!
- Friday 3 June Practice at St Dunstan's was the order of the day, and of course the regular visit to The Unicorn afterwards!
- Saturday 4 June Now down to the *Nitty Gritty*, 9.30am meet at St Nicholas, Thanington where a successful quarter peal of 3 Doubles was rung. My first of Quarter Peal of the Jubilee weekend.

Some of us then proceeded to St Dunstan's for 10.30 for a Quarter Peal of Plain Bob Minor which we also scored, my second of the weekend.

Saturday afternoon saw open ringing with tea, cakes and general sing song all taking place at Wickhambreaux Church, so I just *had* to go if only to sample the cakes! We rung a touch of 120 changes, then went downstairs for a song before climbing the stairs back up for another 120 touch. Then back downstairs for another song this time followed by tea, cakes and the final song. Then the final ringing of the day to finish of the enjoyable afternoon.

Sunday 5 June 9am start at St Dunstans for the next Quarter Peal of Doubles (7 methods and variations). This was rung for the 10am service. Yet another success making it my third of the Jubilee.

Sunday Evening saw six of us meet at Holy Cross Goodnestone for the last Quarter Peal of the Jubilee Weekend. As the village was holding a street party outside the pub next door, they turned off their music and listened to the bells instead. We started with Plain Bob Minor, but this fired up after less than 10 minutes, so, we had a re-think and decided to try Plain Bob Doubles and this was a success, so making my fourth of the weekend.

After ringing, some refreshments were in order, so, some of us took use of the pub and joined the village party and listened to the lovely comments from the locals saying how nice the bells sounded.

I know that I have rung with quite a few ringers over the Jubilee, so to you all I say a Big Thank You, and well done to Daniel Appiah on his first inside to Bob Minor.

As a footnote, this is part of a conversation I had on Tuesday 7 June with a local man from Ash who knows I sometimes go to their practice. His name is Richard and lives opposite the church: -

So, I think it is not often that a non-ringer makes such nice comments, so well-done Ash Ringers.
