## KCACR Chairman's notes

We find ourselves well into 2023 and I have been invited to write a few words for the Lewisham District newsletter. Ringing, both within the KCACR and nationwide, has moved into a different era both historically with the passing last year of
 Queen Elizabeth II and also in the way our lives have changed in this post-Covid age. We have seen ringing return to a new normal, some towers still exercising caution as a result of the pandemic, some towers having to change the frequency of their ringing because more and more churches are joining together to form benefices resulting in service times altering from week to week and some towers now struggling to ring as some members decided not to return to ringing. However, the decrease in the number of ringers cannot be attributed solely to Covid. It has been something that has been happening slowly for a number of years as the demographic of ringers gradually gets older and it is something which we do need to try to address.


After the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II last year, ringing gained a great deal of publicity in the media as many towers marked the late Queen's passing in a variety of ways. This year I am hoping that we will gain similar publicity for the coronation of HM King Charles III. This is certainly an occasion which I hope that every tower will be able to take part in in some form. Not only does it provide us with a major national event to ring for but also an opportunity to make sure that members of the church congregation are aware of this participation.

The Coronation has provided us with a great chance to recruit ringers with the 'Ring for the King' initiative but we need to be mindful that, with the current state of ringing nationwide, we need to find at least another 10000 or so ringers, that other avenues need to be explored. New recruits can come from many sources. For example, last year in the Tonbridge District a very successful link was established with a school and its neighbouring church which resulted in a band of young ringers becoming established. There are also a group of young ringers from a church youth group learning at a tower in the Canterbury District and in the Ashford District there is a project offering to teach ringing to students who are embarking on their Duke of Edinburgh Award. Perhaps there are initiatives like these that can be explored for your tower?

Later this year, the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers will unveil its plans for Ringing 2030, a major project to ensure the sustainability of ringing for the future. Hopefully, here in the KCACR, we can do our best to spearhead some projects that will help to contribute towards this and ensure that ringing within the Association remains healthy for many years to come.

## SIDCUP

6 bells: 8-3-24, A


The ringing at St Johns for both practices and Sunday services has taken a downturn in the last couple of months. Three potential trainees either dropped out, found ring-
 ing wasn't for them or couldn't commit. Recent recruitment efforts including leaflets, facebook posts and tower tours have had little effect on encouraging outsiders though we are working with the vicar and congregation to try and resurrect some promoting. However, this has proved difficult when the ringing has dropped to a very low point.
 Two of our long standing locals have since moved on to another tower too. Currently, we have a core of three Runtings, our committed 'on tour' local, plus two rounds and call change ringers (one who is mastering rounds). Our focus during practices has turned to our trainees as a result, supporting them with rounds and call changes and consolidating the basics. Generally, 6 of us at best attend practices and 3 on occasions for Sunday morning. Due to PCC meetings on occasional Wednesdays our practice has been held at St Mary Cray with many thanks and kind permission from Nigel.

Tower Tours haven't brought the numbers they did a while back, though we were fortunate to be visited by the Mayor and MP of Bexley, who each had a go at chiming. Recently, Alexander has helped organise quarters and
 peals and anticipates arranging more throughout 2023, potentially turning Sidcup into a ringing hub; Alison rang her first quarter on 7th January and an excellent peal was rung on $31^{\text {st }}$ December. These were appreciated by locals, the surrounding neighbourhood and vicar. Other occasions have been HM Queen Elizabeth II's funeral and Remembrance Sunday - we had up to 6 ringers for these, with occasional support. We have a well posted Facebook page, a recently resurrected Instagram page and a few videos of the bells on YouTube. The clappers were refurbished in March 2020 and we have a maintenance contract with TLB Services. The bells are being serviced on 14th February.

## Training: finding resources to help!

Over the 400 or so years that change ringing has been taking place in Britain, bellringers have devoted thousands of words and hours to training and education. From the 1668 publication of Fabien Stedman's Tintinnalogia to the recent work of the Association of Ringing Teachers, the energy and effort which has gone into producing training materials is remarkable. Harnessing those materials and training opportunities for your own ringing can make a huge difference - and yet at times it can feel hard to know where to go to find information about ringing education. Help is at hand! This article gives a quick run through of the main sources for ringing education materials, so - whether you are looking for information about recruitment and retention, call changes, Plain Bob, raising and lowering, conducting or even composing, look no further!

## Hereford

## North-West

## December update snippet (Nigel Pointer)

## Tower Survey

Thank you to all those who have taken the time to give us such detailed responses to the tower survey - in fact there are only two towers in the District who we have$n ' t$ heard from, which is really encouraging so once again many thanks.

Excluding the non-respondents, there are 16 District towers - exactly half - who are ringing "regularly", with a practice and / or Sunday Service ringing more or less every week. They're at varying levels of numbers and expertise, and sometimes they have to cancel due to low numbers, but they have a band and their bells are heard. Even more encouragingly, there are only 3 towers who are not ringing at all, mostly due to the condition of the bells or tower.

But that leaves at least a third of our towers who are in a more precarious position. Their bells are ringable, there is a local "person-in-charge" who keeps the bells available and has a good working relationship with the local incumbent and the Parish Office. They are delighted to welcome visiting bands for outings, quarters or peals, and they arrange ringing for special local or national events which is much appreciated by the clergy and congregation. But they don't have a local band and their bells are rung only occasionally. Their congregation is probably ageing and shrinking, and they may well be about to share an incumbent with other local churches, if they aren't already. Their chances of recruiting, training and retaining a new sustainable band of ringers are slim.

In order to keep these churches ringing, and the others who will inevitably join them the whole ringing community is going to have a huge job on its hands. It will not be possible in the future for more than a handful of towers to survive alone. Tower Clusters and combined bands will become the norm. That means that you are going to have to be prepared to travel to help others out in return for people coming to you. At local level, if you do still have a band, please don't ignore this. Even if you
 are ringing today, it probably won't take much for you to move from the "ringing regularly" column to the "ringing occasionally" one.

Recruitment and retention need to be Item One on the agenda at your tower AGM in January - and every other meeting after that. Please do let us know of any recruitment initiatives you're undertaking, it would be great to share them with the other towers.
