Ringing Master's News

District Ringing – October-December 2023

It has been a positive end to the year, albeit with a few hiccups along the way. At the ADM there was no change of Ringing Masters – so you have us for another year. A couple of our events did not go off as intended but we were **fortunate to have a good list of who was planning to attend** so were able to send out urgent notices to those affected. This does emphasise the importance of letting the Ringing Masters know if you are planning to attend a practice (or if you are unable to) – if there look to be too few attending the practice may be cancelled, or if there are last minute changes we can let people know.

The ringing at meetings has covered a broad range and we have usually been able to ring something for everyone – but do let us know if there is something you would like to ring. We would encourage ringers at all stages to join in the ringing at meetings as it is an excellent opportunity to gain experience, and the Ringing Masters are happy to find you some support if you think you need it.

October – Annual District Meeting: (St Dunstan's, Canterbury) We had 12 attend the afternoon ringing and 8 at the evening session. During the afternoon we rang from Call Changes through to Cambridge, whilst the evening ringing gave us some more method ringing.

Grandsire 5 * 1 touch, Stedman 5 * 1 + 1 touch, Plain Bob 6 * 1 touch, Kent TB 6 * 1, Cambridge S 6 * 1)

October – S Major Practice: (Throwley) Unfortunately we could not get enough to make this practice viable and we had to cancel. The feedback we got encouraged us to schedule a replacement practice in November).

November – Meeting: (Thanington) Falling on Remembrance Day we had the opportunity to ring half-muffled with 11 attending in the afternoon and 7 or 8 in the evening. We were delighted to welcome a new face from the local band. A full range of ringing was covered and it was pleasing to be able to ring touches of quite a few methods. Unfortunately, a course of St Clements did not come round during the afternoon ringing, but was the only loss of the day – and we managed several courses in the evening.

Rounds+CC * 1, Stedman 5 * 1 touch, St Clement's 6 * 3, Cambridge S 6 * 1 touch)

November – Plain Triples Practice: (Lyminge) The Ringing Master due to run the practice was not having a particularly good start to the day as he had got it into his head that the practice was starting at 10:30 rather than 10:00 – fortunately the Chairman stepped in and got things started. When I finally arrived we had a healthy 14 present and focussed our ringing on Single Oxford, St Simon's, and St Clement's Triples (there were no takers for the more oddball methods). We managed two touches of Single Oxford – a third attempt came to grief.

(Grandsire 7 * 1 touch, Single Oxford 7 * 3 + 2 touches, St Simon's 7 * 3, St Clement's 7 * 2).

November – S Major Practice: (Throwley Ospringe) The cancellation of the October Surprise Major practice was a disappointment to many and we were asked whether it was possible to arrange another. We managed to get Throwley again and were all set to go when we heard, the day before, that the tower door lock had jammed. We were fortunate that Ospringe were able to host us at very short notice – and again the **benefit of having a list of attendees** was proven. We just reached a viable number (9) attending and had some very successful ringing. Unfortunately, I forgot to make a record of exactly what we rang but recollect:

(plain courses Cambridge S, Yorkshire S, Superlative S; bob courses Cambridge; half course spliced Cambridge S + Yorkshire S).

December – Christmas Social: (Herne) A good crowd turned out (I think it peaked around 14) and it was good to see two new faces from SPiT – we hope they enjoyed themselves and we will see more of them in the coming year. We rang quite a bit of Rounds & Call Changes and Plain Hunt on 5, but also managed a touch of Grandsire Triples and a half-course of Cambridge Minor to finish.

(Rounds+CC 6 * 1, Rounds+CC 8 * 4, Plain Hunt 5 * 3, Grandsire 5 * 1 touch, Cambridge S 6 * 1 half-course, Plain Bob 7 * 1, Grandsire 7 * 1 touch.

Thank you to all those who have supported District Ringing through the year. It was good to see some new faces come along and we hope to see more of you next year. Whilst we have been able to ring a broad range of methods at pretty much all meetings we are very much dependent on who comes up the tower – so please do join us and help the District be a positive contributor to ringing in our area. As always do feel free to give feedback and suggestions to the District Ringing Masters or just generally chat about ringing matters of interest to you.

District Ringing – Looking Forward (January – April 2024)

We start the year in style with a Quarterly Meeting at **Canterbury Cathedral** – ringing should be starting at 15:30. The need to fit in with the other activities going on at the Cathedral means arrangements are slightly different from normal. As the Cathedral will be bustling with many other visitors, or those attending the 17:30 Evensong, access to the tower will be policed – so it is strongly advised that you **let the District Committee know names of those attending ahead of time**. The door to the tower is inside the cathedral to the left of the shop stall by the South Door entrance. The tower is quite a climb (over 70 steps) so come prepared. We are also likely to be running the ringing slightly more formally – in particular we be placing bands with more care and will only be allowing more experienced ringers to ring the front and back bells. That aside, we will be catering for all levels and we should have plenty of experienced ringers on hand to give helpful advice. We will be handing things over to the Cathedral ringers around 17:00, so there will be time to get back down and seated for Evensong. After our meeting the bells are available until 21:00 – but we shall check at the meeting how many are interested in ringing again. **Please check notices from the District Secretary for other details about attending this meeting.**

Later in **January** we will be holding a **Surprise Major** practice at **Sheldwich**. It would be good if we could try to ring something a bit different as well our regular methods. Our suggestion is **Cornwall Surprise Major** but we do need enough to commit to learning the method – so please do let the District Ringing Masters know if this is of interest to you.

In **February** we are meeting at **Ash** so a chance to ring more things on 10. We are holding a practice on **Doubles Variations** at **Littlebourne** later in the month. We would be interested in hearing from people about **what they would like to see covered** – introductory things, like April Day, built on simple base methods and common calls, or more adventurous base methods and calls (or something in between) – **let us know**.

The District Call Change Competition planned for **March** is being held at **Sandwich** And the District Practice at **Monkton** this month will be focussing on **Surprise Minor**. This could include those making first steps (Cambridge) or those looking to move on from Cambridge. If you have an interest in this area do get in touch with us ASAP and **let us know what you would like** to see included.

Looking a little further ahead we have the **April** Quarterly Meeting at **Hernhill** and a **Surprise Major** practice a little later (but have not yet formalised where and when).

We are in the process of **filling in the plan for future** District Practices out to March 2025 – so **now** is a good time to let the District Ringing Masters know about **anything you would like to see included**. A summary of the forthcoming District Practices is below, and the District Meetings/Competitions can be found at the end of this Newsletter.

District News

The Ash Dash (and friends) – 2023

“Let’s go to the Romney Marsh” is what was suggested at our AGM for our “dash” this year and the organiser was appointed. Well, by the end of August, I hadn’t seen any plans, so I decided to take the task on myself. Looking at the Marsh and the potential towers, I turned the map around and decided we would go abroad to the Isle of Sheppey instead - Eastchurch, Minster, Queenborough, returning to main land Kent for lunch at Iwade, followed by Bobbing and Teynham for afternoon ringing.

Very quickly, I had got confirmation that we could ring at 4 of the towers but Eastchurch failed to communicate with me so as it turned out we didn’t have such an early start to our day. We haven’t that many ringers at Ash, and experience has shown that outings can be very tiring if you need to keep ringing all the time. I therefore began to put out feelers for a few more people to join with us and the “Dash” very quickly became “Ash Dash and friends”. We were delighted to be joined Alison Gerrish and Malwyn Williams from Milton Regis, Anne and Andy from Chartham (this being their very first experience of a tower outing), Tony from Thanington, Len, Jane, John and Jake.

The morning was a bit damp when we set off from home but on reaching our first tower the rain had gone.

Minster

Our first ring of the day was a challenge for some. Overall they are a very nice sounding six, even if the rope circle is pretty huge!



The church at Minster is quite an impressive building and, as the name suggests, it was founded in the Anglo-Saxon times as an abbey dedicated to St Mary and St Sexburga. The establishment was closed during the Reformation. However impressive remains still survive in the form of the gatehouse (which is now a museum) and also parts of the Abbey church which still includes some Saxon archways in the nave! The tower is a curious looking structure as it was clearly never finished. It has a wooden pyramidal roof to it, which holds the bells. There are six bells, tenor weighing 10-2-0cwt (533kg) and ringing out the note of G. They were cast by four different founders,

ranging in date from 1663 (third, fifth and tenor) by William Hatch of Ulcombe, 1883 (second) by Gillett and Bland of Croydon, and finally 1929 (treble and third) by Mears and Stainbank of Whitechapel.

Queenborough

Jackie from Eastry met with us here. Her journey had been quite a challenge for her, so she didn’t join in the ringing, but was looking forward to her lunch! This is a nice little six, which everyone enjoyed.

A small town on the Isle of Sheppey, Queenborough is situated two miles south of Sheerness. Like Sheerness, it also has a port and according to local history it is where Admiral Lord Nelson picked up many of his seafaring skills. Also, as a bit of a juxtaposition, in Saxon times Queenborough was known as "Cyningburh" which meant "King's Town". Bit strange considering it now has "Queen" in it! The Church of

the Holy Trinity is the only medieval building left in Queenborough and from the outside it looks like it'll just be a run of the mill church. It's quite small but the interior does not let it down. The nave contains a 17th century wooden ceiling with beautiful painted motifs across it which was the work of a Dutch painter. Sadly, it was damaged in a fire in the 1930s and is now faded and darkened. The tower is thought to date from either the 12th or 14th century, though more likely the 14th century given the Decorated and early Perpendicular Gothic motifs within it. The tower holds a 5-2-22cwt (289kg) ring of six bells, tenor in B. The treble was cast in 1911 by Mears and Stainbank of London, the middle four were cast in 1667 by Anthony Bartlet and the tenor was recast in 1934 by Mears and Stainbank. They were last overhauled in 1984 by the Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Overall they are a very bright and melodious despite the hotchpotch of founders.

Having checked out this pub a couple of weeks before our trip, this was our venue for lunch. 19 of us sat down to eat and we were very well served by Alli and her team.



This was a pleasant stop off at a very nice pub. Everyone had a good rest, a good chinwag and enjoyed a drink with some excellent fresh food.

This was a good opportunity to take a few photographs of everyone enjoying their lunch and drinks. The small church in Iwade was of interest to me as it has two bells dating from 1199! Unfortunately, I was not able to chime them, but I'd have loved to have done.

Bobbing

Our third tower, another very nice little ring of six. We were greeted by the churchwarden who kindly offered us tea, coffee and biscuits from the kitchen while we rang. We had a most enjoyable visit.



The little Church of St Bartholomew at Bobbing sits right next to the main road and has a squat little tower. Despite that, it's a very attractive building. These were a ground floor ring of six bells, tenor weighing 8-2-21cwt (441kg) ringing out the note of Ab (though it sounds more like A). The front five date from 1804 and were cast by Thomas Mears of Whitechapel in London, and the tenor was recast in 1935 by Mears and Stainbank, also of Whitechapel! The fifth bell is apparently cracked according to Dove's Guide, but you wouldn't have thought so upon hearing the bell in person. They were a particularly nice ring of six, with the tenor crowning the ring beautifully with its mellow harmonic sound. Definitely recommend these to any

visiting band, they're easy to ring, easy to hear (except when the ringers waiting for a turn are being noisy!), and sound fantastic.

Teynham

Our final tower of the day has a unusual route to the ringing chamber- it's a bit scary! But the bells are nice.



The Church of St Mary in Teynham lies absolutely MILES outside of the village, in the middle of a number of orchards, which makes for a really striking and picturesque setting. The church is unusually large and ornate for such a remote area and it is apparently where an Archbishop's palace once stood, which would explain the size and detailing of the building. It reminded me somewhat of St Mary of Charity in Faversham, albeit not anywhere near as modified and rebuilt as the church in Faversham. The tower access was unusual as well, as you have to go into a vestry at the bottom right of the tower, climb an almost vertical wooden ladder and then scuttle along an

equally challenging wooden walkway to a door in the wall of the tower. And then you're in the ringing chamber!

The church holds a 10-3-7cwt (549kg) ring of six bells, tenor in Ab. The treble, third, fourth and tenor were cast in 1743 by Robert Catlin of Holborn, London, and then the second and fifth were cast in 1924 and 1899 respectively by Mears and Stainbank of Whitechapel, London. Overall, these were very enjoyable - they were a nice ring.

Final words

This report has been a joint effort - I asked Jake to do a report for me, which he kindly did and provided photos. I have included his work here. Also some of the photos are Judi's. Thanks to both of you.

Thanks also to our experienced ringers for helping and stepping in when it was needed, and for those who ran the towers for me.

Lastly, thank you all for coming on the "Dash" I hope you all enjoyed the day. Where to next year?

All Saints' Whitstable and Friends Bellringing Outing **Berkshire, Oxford. 30th October to 3rd November 2023**

Following previous great ringing trips, Maureen Cook, All Saints and Jane Huxley, St Stephens instigated a ringing trip over a year ago. Maureen's cousin Janette and husband Philip Roberts organised the ringing as knowledgeable of the area. Jane organised the hotel and payments.

On a rather wet Monday, 22 intrepid bellringers and 8 guests arrived at 'Littlecote House' Hungerford, Berkshire. A beautiful historic Tudor manor set in acres of amazing countryside and gardens. Fully decorated for Christmas!!!! At the 6pm evening meal set in an allotted area we exchanged greetings, tales of travel, parking and rooms set in the four floored modern wing. We had all downloaded a detailed booklet produced by Philip of the next three-day event.

Day 1.

Day 2.

St Michael & All Angels, Highclere (8) 11-0-27. Beautiful church and the local Bell Captain very informative.

St Nicholas, Newbury (10) 21-2-1. A LOCKOUT, poor Len was unable to captain the heaviest tower due to a misunderstanding of where to meet the key person.

After coffee most travelled to Hungerford for a long lunch break and worshipping the sun by the canal or went back to the hotel.

St Lawrence, Hungerford (8) 12-1-8, beautiful setting by the canal. We disturbed a swarm of ladybirds, crawling and swooping over us through ringing.

St Mary, Chilton Foliat (5) 9-1-12. A steep ladder to the chamber with a latch door. Bells rather heavy set. We left in the dark again.

Day 3.

St Michael & All Saints, Lambourne (8) 20-2-0, race horse country.

St Mary the virgin, Childrey, (8) 12-0-4. A small ground floor chamber from a direct outside entrance.

The afternoon was spent at Philip's tower, St Matthew, Harwell (8) 16-1-26 and Janette's tower, All Saints, Chilton, (6) 7-2-3, light bells.

The last two days we had good ringing of Rounds and Call Changes, Grandsire and Stedman Triples, Plain Bob Triples, Plain Bob on 7, Grandsire Doubles, Stedman and Cambridge.



We enjoyed good food, fun moments, laughs and singing. There was entertainment or quiet chats in the evening. Brian won an evening quiz, congratulations. Some non-ringing guests enjoyed the hotel steam train outing or the many hotel activities/facilities.

New KCACR Lapel Pin Badges

Recently some of the new members at Ospringe and Faversham expressed interest in the KCACR Lapel Pin Badge I was sporting after a District event, so I said I would find out if they were still available.

Having checked with our local purveyor of ringing goods (Claire) and a few other likely sources it became apparent that nobody had seen any of these for sale in a long time. Speaking with Val Cooper, who runs the Association “merchandising” (<https://kcacr.org.uk/association/clothing/>), she thought these might be something of wider interest and said she would look into getting some new ones made.

Interestingly the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers (CCCBR) has a catalogue of metal bell ringing badges, originally started by Chris Ridley in 2002. This takes a little bit of finding as it requires some scrolling through drop down menus to get to it:

There are notes on a wide range of badges from numerous societies, including the KCACR. There are some quite differing styles and some, unlike the KCACR badge, have undergone significant changes over time.

The KCACR badge was first conceived in 1950, becoming available to the membership during 1951 for the princely sum of 3/- (15p for those too young to remember – and about £3.90 in today’s money). Up to now there have been five versions of the badge each following the general design of the 1950 version; the most notable deviation being an experiment in blue in the early 1970s which was not well received by the membership.

Val used GSJJ (<https://www.gs-jj.com/>) to set up the new design and produce a batch of 50 badges which are now available to today’s membership. The price for orders of 1-3 badges is £3.50 each including p&p, for orders of 4 or more it is £2.50 for each badge and p&p at cost. Whilst you can order direct from Val (see the KCACR website for details), also check whether Claire has any available to buy directly from her stall.

This sixth version is similar in shape and colouring to Version C, but with some differences in the details. The badge is secured in place using a locking back stud which took me a short while to figure out how to get off. I subsequently discovered a YouTube video explaining how to do it – but I found it easier to squeeze the gap between the top and bottom ledges of the stud between my thumb and forefinger so that they force the two bits apart then twist and jiggle the stud off.

It is good to see the badges available again and relatively inexpensive – check whether Claire has any on her stall. With GSJJ as supplier it looks as though it will not be difficult to get further supplies quite quickly if there is the demand.

Canterbury Colleges Society of Change Ringers and Friends Outing November 2023

Members of the Canterbury Colleges Society of Change Ringers, along with several invited friends, gathered at Sheldwich on a bright but chilly morning in late November, in eager anticipation of ringing at the first venue of the forthcoming day's outing. The Canterbury Colleges Society of Change Ringers is a ringing association for the students, staff and alumni of the four major higher education institutions in Canterbury: the University of Kent, Canterbury Christ Church University, the University for the Creative Arts (Canterbury campus) and Canterbury College. Currently, the Society consists of a small but dedicated group of active students, reinforced by a few supportive alumni, and is looking to attract both existing ringers and new learners to build on the existing foundations. A ringing outing had been proposed in order that the Society's existing members, who are not all able to meet regularly together at the same towers, could spend time consolidating friendships while enjoying ringing a diverse range of bells. After much arranging and emailing on my part as organiser, the schedule for the day had been finally confirmed a couple of days beforehand, a sufficient number of participants to make the outing practical had been secured, and Sheldwich had been settled upon as a suitable starting point, as it is not too far from the residences of all the participants and therefore getting up very early on a Saturday morning to embark on a long journey to the first tower would not be necessary!

The substantial parish church of Sheldwich, a rather fragmented village about three miles south of Faversham, is dedicated to St James and dates in part from the eleventh century. The tower contains a pleasant 7cwt eight, easy to ring and much in demand for peals and quarters by visiting bands. The bells were cast as a complete ring in 1998 by Whitechapel, supported by lottery funding as a Millenium Project, in order to replace an older ring of six which had been unringable since 1906. Our intrepid band made its way up to the open gallery and, after a few brief introductions detailing names, connections (or not!) with higher education in Canterbury and ringing experience, given that not everybody present had previously met, embarked upon the day's ringing, under

Adam's experienced guidance. Apart from one abortive plain course of Cambridge Surprise Minor, which unexpectedly for some participants morphed into a plain course of Ebor Surprise Minor* shortly after commencing, the ringing was confident and included a touch of Plain Bob Doubles, a plain course of Plain Bob Triples, and a long touch of Plain Bob Major which was brought round with what Andrew termed a "magic bob" at the end! After ringing the bells down, we returned the church's impressive key and journeyed south across the rolling North Downs towards our next destination of Little Chart, some four miles northwest of Ashford.

Little Chart's original medieval parish church, dedicated to St Mary the Virgin and the Holy Rood, received a direct hit from a V-1 flying bomb in 1944, with only the badly damaged tower and parts of the chancel wall left standing. The villagers removed the bells and stored them by the nearby railway line. Although the fourth bell was stolen, the five remaining bells were removed to Taylor's in 1955 and recast into a new 6cwt ring of six. The replacement brick-built church, dedicated more simply to St Mary the Virgin, along with its new bells, was consecrated the following year by Geoffrey Fisher, the then Archbishop of Canterbury. To this rather unusual building we made our way, where the ringing was presided over jointly by Isabel and Katie. Some Spliced St Simon's and St Martin's was managed amongst other Doubles methods, and we also righted our mishap at Sheldwich by successfully completing a plain course of Cambridge Minor, although our catch after ringing the bells down perhaps left something to be desired! Upon leaving Little Chart, we travelled for ten miles in a westerly direction to reach the next tower on our itinerary.

The Parish Church of St Mary, Frittenden was that next port of call. The medieval church was largely rebuilt in the early Victorian era, and the tower, topped by an impressive spire, contains a fine-sounding 15cwt Gillett and Johnston ring of eight cast in 1928. Andrew took charge of the ringing here, which included Triples of the Plain Bob and Grandsire varieties, along with some more Cambridge Minor. Certain taller ringers forwent ringing the treble at this tower, due to the fact that the rope passes through a boss fixed to the underside of the clock case, not very far above a ringer's head, while others chose to ring this bell sitting down!

After concluding our ringing we posed in the churchyard for a group photo, before saying goodbye to Isabel, Katie and Scott, who had to leave us at this point due to other commitments. The rest of us then headed in the direction of the village pub, The Bell & Jorrock, where we enjoyed an excellent lunch with much conviviality, and took in Jake's final film degree submission, *Chalice*, a spooky ten minute horror.

The final destination on our tour was the village of Headcorn, about eight miles southeast of Maidstone, where the imposing Grade I listed parish church, dedicated to St Peter and St Paul, houses a suitably grand 21cwt ring of eight, comprising bells cast by various founders at different dates. Although we had lost three members of our party prior to lunch, our numbers were bolstered by the arrival of Toby, an alumnus of Kent, who came to join us for this last session of the day which involved an extended stay compared to our other visits, due to the fact that we had arranged to join a practice already scheduled for Kent Young Ringers, the KCACR's youth division. Kent Young Ringers practices are usually well supported, but some late withdrawals meant that the attendance of our outing party enabled the practice on this

occasion to go ahead. More Triples methods were rung, including the first Stedman of the day, interspersed with some call changes, Plain Hunt and cake(!), all under the practiced direction of Jen Thomas, KCACR Youth Officer, before we all headed home after a thoroughly enjoyable day.

We are always happy to hear from anyone who is currently eligible to be a member of the Canterbury Colleges Society of Change Ringers, or will prospectively be coming to Canterbury as a student or staff member. For more information, please contact me via email at benlegg87@hotmail.com

What a year it's been at Ash. Apart from the excitement of the Coronation and the challenges of getting everyone compliant with Safeguarding requirements, we also had to face the consequences of three more of our 'regulars' moving away from the area during the year, leaving us reliant on the faithful few to keep the bells ringing. None of us are in the first flush of youth, and, in common towers, our current numbers are not sufficient to sustain an active band in the medium term.

At our AGM, we therefore came to a decision to hold a 'taster' day in September for potential new recruits – a short presentation in the church, followed by a visit to the tower and an opportunity for everyone to 'have a go' at backstroke. Lessons learned all round, I am pleased to say. Fortunately, Bob was quickly on the case, Nicholsons provided splendid service in getting new stays to us and we were back in action very quickly.

Our four learners are making excellent progress, and Malcolm also took the opportunity to attend the recent ART M1 course at Staplehurst in December. He found it quite intense, but was impressed with the way the course was structured, and the many suggested training exercises which can be used to encourage good bell handling. He would recommend it to anyone looking to refresh their teaching skills or starting to teach for the first time.

We are now moving into a new phase, with a separate weekly practice planned for our learners in the New Year. We hope it will not be too long now before we can bring our new recruits to District meetings, and start to introduce them to the wider world of ringing.

Minutes of Past Meetings

KCACR – Canterbury District – Annual District Meeting **Saturday 14 October 2023 at Canterbury, St Dunstons**

Ringling began at 3pm under the guidance of Stuart Palin. The service at 4.15pm was conducted by Jenny Walpole with Susan Record playing the organ. Tea was served by the St. Dunstons ringers in the church hall.

The Chairman, Mike Little, opened the meeting by welcoming everyone to St. Dunstons. He then asked members to stand for a period of silence in memory of Chris and Janet Godfrey of Chilham who died recently within 13 days of each other.

1. Apologies for Absence were received from Debbie Aris, Hedley Basford, Rev. David Cawley, Andrew Corby, Airlie Fray, Becky Holladay, Tom Hooley, Susan Lillywhite, John Paramor, Freda Parker, Gill Robinson, and Zoe and Malcolm Storey.

2. Minutes of the last meeting were taken as read on a proposal from Sally Bullock seconded by Fiona. The chairman signed the minutes as a true record.

3. Matters Arising. There were no matters arising.

4. Election of New Members. From Herne, Tracey Colley was proposed by Susan Record and seconded by Keith Record. From Sandwich Gillian Lamond, Rowena Pearce and Lesley Pellegrino were proposed by Sally Wall and seconded by Jo Horton. All four were elected members of the Association.

5. The Collection amounted to £26.80 and all of this was given to St Dunstons Church.

6. Chairman's Remarks. The chairman wished to say very little but had been impressed with the numbers attending meetings this year, with their capabilities and also with the pleasant social atmosphere.

He wished to thank the committee without whose efforts nothing would be achieved. He also wished to thank the work of Rev. David Cawley, Len Huckstep and Michael Keeler-Walker who were all standing down this year.

7. Secretary's Report. The secretary also wished to be brief as there were lot of items on the agenda to get through. He went on to say that it had been a difficult year organizing meetings at towers who know nothing about the association and whose members won't visit other towers to improve their ringing. There is an area of the district around Dover and Deal in which this is common. However since January this year there have been 26 new members elected at district meetings.

The secretary wished to thank the incumbents, churchwardens and ringers of the towers visited and also the membership who supported all the events.

8. Treasurer's Report. Cathryn reported that the 120 club had posted a profit of £135 for this year and that Claire's bookstall was bringing in money as well.

9. Ringing Master's Report. This year has seen a return to normal patterns of ringing with a full schedule of District meetings, practices, and competitions – all of which have been well supported by the

membership. A major ringing event during the year was, of course, the coronation of their majesties King Charles and Queen Camilla and many of the towers across the District participated in the event.

The year started with a tentative resumption of evening ringing after last year's ADM and we are pleased to be able to report that this post-meeting ringing continued throughout the year; though it is noticeable that there is a drop off in numbers compared to the afternoon ringing. Meeting ringing has catered for all levels up to Surprise Minor on 6 bells and Stedman Triples/Grandsire Caters on 8-bells and above.

Monthly District Practices have followed a structure of quarterly Surprise Major practices with other practices covering different themes in between. Practices have been well attended with those aimed at Plain Hunt/Plain Bob on 5, Plain Hunt on 9, and Raising and Lowering in Peal being very heavily subscribed. We are currently exploring ways in which we might be able to better address such ringing interest – though it is worth emphasising that District Meetings always ring rounds, call-changes, and basic methods and so are a good opportunity to practice these.

In August a District Outing to the Surrey area was organized by Claire Stay and attended by 25 members. We visited 5 towers with a pub lunch at The Woodman, Ashstead. The day was hugely enjoyed by all and our thanks go to Claire for her work in arranging the day particularly the very detailed instructions.

The District performed well in the County 8-Bell Competition at Lympe and the County 6-Bell Striking Competition at Monkton, but was not represented in the new County Call-Change Competition also at Monkton at the same time. A District band repeated last year's success by winning the 8-Bell competition, and the Sturry band won the 6-Bell competition. Jo Horton of Sturry also donated a trophy for presentation to the winners of the County Call Change competition. Thanks are due to those members who represented the District; and to the band at Monkton, and other supporting members, who hosted the county competitions on behalf of the District.

Ringers from across the Canterbury District have participated or helped with many of the Kent Young Ringers and Kent MINI-Ringers events during the past year. The District was able to enter a full band into the KCACR Youth Striking Competition, held at Stansted on 18th February, and came a very creditable 3rd. We would like to encourage any towers with young ringers to get involved with Kent Young Ringers – they can meet and ring with others of a similar age and have opportunities to participate in many different events both locally and nationally.

Throughout the year details of District Ringing are reported in the District Newsletter along with what is planned for the following quarter. Announcements for District Practices are also communicated by email to tower contacts and published on the Canterbury District Facebook page.

In conclusion we should like to thank all those who have supported District Ringing and hope you will continue to do so. We would also encourage those who have not participated in District Ringing to give it some more consideration. District Meetings in particular are an opportunity for members of all abilities to practice, meet others sharing their interest in ringing, and make new friends.

11. Report from the County including competitions and rule change. Malcolm reported that he had attended all general committee meetings bar one when Ben deputised. He had updated the district committee at their meetings. There was a lot of routine items but six main topics were discussed.

1. The new membership database was in place and Doug Davis was migrating information over to it from the old system. A guide to its operation will be produced.
2. Risk assessments have been written and these are on the website.
3. There had been a change to the county competitions. A new county call change competition had been introduced where teams with no affiliation could enter. It had not been well supported with three teams plus an entry from the young ringers who visited Monkton that day.
4. Safeguarding had generated a lot of discussion. Safeguarding officer Emma Jarvis and Chairman Neil Jones wished to make it easier for ringers but the Canterbury Diocese had laid down their own rules. The diocese will carry out an audit later in the year. Two towers have been shut down for not being compliant with the rules.
5. Association rules have to be put to the members at their ADMs but this is a lengthy process. A substantial offer of financial help had been lost because of this. The committee wished to change the rule so decisions could be made quicker by them. They will need to get the views of members on this.
6. A potential change to the membership application process had been suggested. A paper was circulated to committee members with lots of replies but this has not been discussed as yet. People can apply online but need support and to be proposed and seconded.

12. Safeguarding. Bro Austin was perturbed that towers had been closed down and this needs to be resolved. Malcolm said that the Diocese had eased the rules to make it easier for members without computers. People could now do the basic training as a group with the person logged on getting a certificate with the other sanctioned by them. The diocese has been reluctant to co-operate with the association. In the past we have attended training together, particularly tower captains, but the diocese will not do this now. Tower captains have been added to the course for PTOs. There was to be an audit in the autumn but this is not likely to be done just yet but possibly occur next year.

Jake Reid asked why ringers appeared to be singled out. Susan Record suggested that the safeguarding people will not engage with ringers. The chairman suggested that this had all kicked off with the drive for new ringers for the Coronation and he had been told that towers will be shut if they don't comply. If members had any doubts about what to do they should raise the matter with their parish safeguarding officer and vicar. The question was asked about what would happen about ringers visiting a tower which had been closed to the local band.
