Ringing Master's News

District Ringing – January-March 2024

The year started in grand style with The Cathedral hosting the January District Meeting, then another good turnout for the Surprise Major practice at Sheldwich. February saw us continuing with ringing on the higher stages at Ash, then exploring the world of Doubles variations at Ash. March brought the quarter to a close with the Call Change competition at Sandwich and a Surprise Minor practice at Monkton.

January – Quarterly Meeting: (Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Christ, Canterbury) This was a big start to the year with over 70 people notifying their intention to attend, including some visitors from outside our area. Not everyone came up the tower, but very many did and it was a very busy afternoon session – the tower's Visitors Book looked to have around 40 entries, and then there were the Cathedral regulars helping out. The logistics of getting people up the tower meant there was some queuing downstairs, and we thank you for your patience. There were a lot of Rounds and Call Changes on 12 to give everyone a chance to experience ringing on the 12, but also some method ringing focussing on those methods that could be brought round relatively quickly. The evening session was quieter (we could get everyone upstairs) but still a good turnout. We all hope that you enjoyed your opportunity to ring at the Cathedral.

(Rounds+CC 8, Rounds+CC 12, Plain B 8, Grandsire 9, Little B 10, Grandsire 11, 3 Spliced S 8 [CYN])

NOTE: I am adopting a briefer summary of what was rung.

January – S Major Practice: (Sheldwich) There were 17 present for the evening, including 1 making their first attempt at Surprise Major. Half courses of Cambridge, Yorkshire, and Superlative were completed as were a full course of Rutland and a bob course of Yorkshire. The challenge set for the practice was Cornwall and it was good to see enough people had learnt the method. Our first attempt at a half course (4 leads + 1 of Plain Bob) broke down around the 3rd lead, but the second attempt was successful. Though there were a few trips this was a good start to extending the methods we are able to ring - so we shall continue with Cornwall as a "featured" method.

(Cambridge, Rutland, Superlative, Yorkshire, Cornwall)

February – Bye Meeting: (Ash) Another strong turnout saw 31 in the tower during the afternoon and 15 coming up after the meeting. It was good to see some recently elected members coming out again and we hope they will continue to join us at meetings. A selection of methods, mostly Caters and Royal, were slotted in between Rounds and Call Changes on 10 during the afternoon – though unfortunately the service course of Stedman Caters broke down. The evening ringing was dominated by more method ringing but Rounds and Call Change was also rung. Although the Grandsire Caters had to be stood up we scored a touch of Stedman Triples.

(Rounds+CC 10, Rev Canterbury 5 [touch], Grandsire 5, Stedman 7 [touch], Plain B 8 [touch], Plain Hunt 9, Grandsire 9, Stedman 9, Little B 10)

February – Doubles Variations Practice: (Littlebourne) There was solid interest in this practice with 13 turning out, including 1 new to District events and several of the regular Birchington Quarter Peal band. We started with several courses of April Day (Plain Bob+Grandsire single), then whilst people were looking at the Wallflower single we rang a course of Kennington (Plain Bob+Rev Canterbury bob) [it should have been Southrepps, but the District Ringing Master got his Plain Bob and Reverse Canterbury muddled up]. The more experienced then rang Windrush (Plain Bob+Rev Canterbury bob+Wallflower single) before we then rang some courses of Seighford (Plain Bob+Wallflower single) for those who had been learning and watching the Wallflower singles. Having got his methods and bobs sorted out the District Ringing Master got the Southrepps (Rev Canterbury+Plain Bob bob) right. All too soon our time was up and as a final touch we rang Barnevelder (St Simon's+Grandsire single+Wallflower single+Antelope single). It was only afterwards that it was realized we had missed a trick – if we had chosen a different base method

(Eynesbury – I think) we could have rung an unnamed method and named it. Hopefully the practice has given people more confidence and we could see more use of variations to liven up the ringing at meetings

(April Day, Kennington, Windrush, Seighford, Southrepps, Barnevelder)

March - Call Change Competition: (Sandwich) This is reported separately.

March – Surprise Minor Practice: (Monkton) It was a dry and sunny, but slightly chilly, morning start with 14 attending, and bringing a good mix of experience. Touches of Cambridge were the mainstay of the practice but we also got a course of Norwich in and finally got a course of London round at the end of our time. With people pushing their boundaries there were a few lost attempts along the way, but everyone seemed to find the practice very useful. Let's hope we can put some of it to use at our next meeting.

(Cambridge [touches], Norwich, London)

Thank you to all those who have supported District Ringing so far and we hope you will continue to find something of interest to you at these events – do let us know if there is something you would like to ring. It was also good to see several of the newer members continuing to attend District events.

As always do feel free to give feedback and suggestions to the District Ringing Masters or just generally chat about ringing matters of interest to you.

District Ringing – Looking Forward (April-July 2024)

Our **April** District Meeting will be held at **Selling**, a very nice light ring of eight, so it would be great to see many members coming along to that meeting, especially if they haven't rung at Selling previously.

Later in the month we will be holding a **Surprise Major** practice at Birchington. Following on from our last Surprise Major practice in January, we are keen to continue working on **Cornwall Surprise Major**. Cambridge, Yorkshire and Superlative have been frequently rung at previous practices, which we will be looking to continue, as well as offering the opportunity to ring other Standard Eight methods as requested.

The **District Striking Competition** is being held at **Lynsted** in **May** – there was an excellent turnout of eight teams for the Call Change Competition in March, so we hope to see similar enthusiasm for this competition! The focus of our May District Practice at **Bekesbourne** will be **Plain Hunt on 5 and 6**. Trying to learn from our previous experiences with heavily subscribed District Practices, we have decided to limit the number of "learners" for this practice to eight, first come first served, so that the ringers attending will have the opportunity to ring for extended periods, rather than competing for time on the end of a rope with many others. Obviously there may be some towers which have multiple learners working at a similar level – we think that it will probably be more worthwhile for us to organise a special practice at a tower where several learners are currently focusing on something like Plain Hunt, so if you think your tower would benefit from such a visit, please do get in touch!

Westgate is hosting the June District Meeting, so there will perhaps be a chance to ring some of the Doubles Variations that members enjoyed ringing at the District Practice held at Littlebourne earlier in the year. A District 10-bell Practice will also be held in June at Faversham, which will aim to focus on Grandsire Caters, Plain Bob Caters/Royal and Little Bob Royal. Similarly to the District Practice in May, there will be a limit on the number of "learners" for this practice, in order to make best use of the bells in the time available.

Looking a little further ahead, in **July** we have a District Meeting at **Eastry** and another **Surprise Major** practice which will be held at **Herne**.

The forthcoming District Practices are detailed below, along with a provisional schedule of future District Practices up to March 2025 – this list is only provisional, so if you have any ideas for **what you would like to see included**, please contact the Ringing Masters.

District Practices – summaries for Forthcoming Events

Surprise Major Practice - Saturday 20th April 7:30-9:00pm at Birchington, All Saints

Open to experienced Surprise Major ringers and to ringers confident at ringing plain Major methods/Surprise Minor and wish to gain experience with Surprise Major.

The focus will be on Cambridge, Yorkshire, Superlative and Cornwall, along with other methods in the Standard Eight as requested. If you wish to take part, please contact the Ringing Masters by Wednesday 17th April.

Plain Hunt on 5 and 6 Practice - Saturday 18th May 10:00-11:30am at Bekesbourne

Aimed at ringers who are currently focusing on ringing Plain Hunt on five or six bells.

There will be a maximum of eight learners for this practice, first come first served, with a limit of two from any one tower. Any extra learners from an individual tower will go on to a reserve list, in the event that spaces remain available. Teachers are encouraged to accompany their learners to lend their support. If you wish to take part, please contact the Ringing Masters by Wednesday 15th May.

10-bell Practice - Saturday 29th June 7:00-9:00pm at Faversham

The focus of this practice will be Grandsire Caters, Plain Bob Caters/Royal and Little Bob Royal. It is aimed at ringers who are confident at ringing Plain Hunt on 9/10 and wish to gain experience ringing inside.

There will be a maximum of eight inexperienced Caters/Royal ringers for this practice, first come first served, who will be supported by a number of ringers experienced in ringing on higher numbers. A limit of two ringers may come from any one tower – any extra ringers from an individual tower will go on a reserve list, in the event that spaces remain available. If you wish to take part, please contact the Ringing Masters by Wednesday 26th June.

As my beloved bell ringer warbled in my ear last week. I vaguely know the rhyme but try not to think of the Old Bailey bit as it brings memories. Perhaps I can recount these in another article after the appeal.

So enthused by the opportunity of some free culture the old chap packed his supporters kit – a book of Suguru (easier than Sudoku), boiled sweets and ear defenders – and travelled with other enthusiasts in a golden lion limo to the 6-bell ringing competition at Sandwich. Held at St. Clements church of course. It is difficult to describe the impending excitement and to an extent the apprehension during the journey. We had been warned that parking was difficult but we found a place near the Cattle market. No livestock today – no doubt they had things other than change ringing on their agendas.

An interesting well-maintained church in a pleasant surrounding; indeed, a part of the town. The tower which dates back to the 12th century Is an impressive and far from usual structure, well worth a visit. A fitting pier-a-terre for St. Clement who may have been baptized by St. Peter. But enough of history – what about the bell ringing.

Eight teams entered and the writer was 'supporting' Ospringe SS Peter & Paul (are two saints better than one?). There were some very experienced and capable bands entered and Ospringe knew they were in for a 'dog fight', actually with Faversham (St Mary of Charity) – but could they let escape 8th place. By now you would have read the results and noted that Ospringe were 7th, Their best result of 2024. Faversham reached the dizzy heights of 6th place and will celebrate by providing free cake for all visitors until the end of the month.

Listening to the bells whilst looking at the tower was a treat. One did note a solitary gull perched on the tower who seemed unconcerned at a couple pf hours ringing. A fellow spectator said to listen for clips, clashes and gaps as that is how the judges grade the bands. One could incorporate into the famous rhyme "Watch out for clips clashes and gaps. Say the bells of St Agape" "I certainly will. Say the bells of St. Bill (William)"

Forty years ago, almost to the day, 'the artist formerly known as Prince' recorded his seminal piece of pop music *purple rain*. The spectator noted that this had inspired a number of the ringers. These were clad in wonderful purple polo shirts. A dash of colour that further brightened a good day. And can we end without mentioning the World's favorite food?

Of course not! Here in the ancient town of Sandwich the band of ringers provided a magnificent ringers tea. In addition to the pork pies, sausage rolls, crisps, healthy living stuff and brownies (yum, yum") there was a range of the eponymous foodstuff. Robert B Powell-Williams (Bob)

Bob learnt to ring in 1962 at St. Mary the Virgin in Calne, Wiltshire, and moved to Kent in 1970 to take up the post of Immigration Officer. He became a member of the choir at St. Mary's, Dover, and joined the Dover Choral Society. As ringer he was well-known and respected in the Canterbury District. The mainstay of the Dover band for over 50 years, he served as steeple-keeper and clock winder.

Bob had a major rôle in the bell restoration of 2002. Following its completion he was instrumental in setting up a system of sensors for the simulator and closed-circuit television for the Cinque Ports Ringing Centre. He assisted in the installation of a "dumb" bell in the roof of the anteroom to the gallery, primarily for very young children to experience ringing.

He rang four peals, all for the Kent County Association and all at St Mary's, Dover. The first, in 1979, was for the installation of HM The Queen Mother as Lord Warden of The Cinque Ports and is recorded on a peal board on the ringing gallery. Another peal board in the church porch bears his name, celebrating the Golden Jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II. Whilst Bob's peal record is modest, his forte was quarter peals and he rang hundreds of them, including Caters and Surprise Major. Many were at Dover with the midweek band.



Another of his interests was walking the byways of Kent and Sussex; he had completed the entire coastal trail. It was while taking a walk from Kingsdown to Deal on Monday 15th January that he suddenly collapsed, near Walmer Castle. Tragically he couldn't be resuscitated. Only the previous morning he rang for the service and was to have been in the band for a quarter peal on the Wednesday. News of his death stunned everyone; the quarter went ahead, but not as planned of course. Half-muffled Grandsire Triples was rung as a tribute to Bob's life and service.

Bob and Lindsay married at St. Mary's on 31st May 2004 after a long engagement. His passing leaves an enormous gap in her life, and indeed in the whole community. So many wishes of support for Lindsay have come flooding in that Bob would never have imagined how highly he was regarded and respected. Never uttering an unkind word about anyone, he had an engaging sense of fun and was great company in the pub. He is sorely missed.

Ash-next-Sandwich

Our ringing at Ash this Quarter has seen in January the start of our extra ringing practices on Monday evenings for the sole benefit of our four learners. This is to get them confident and stable enough to ring rounds on their own more quickly.

In February Andrew and Cathryn Hills came to give our bells a service inspection before we hosted the District Bye meeting. The meeting was a great success and so nice to have all of our ten bells ringing out. Previously, whilst attending to a couple of stay problems we had been aware that a part of the floor directly under the bells was a bit spongy and Andrew Hills confirmed this in his inspection. We also had noticed some overhead cracks in the ringing room ceiling. Reporting this to our church wardens, on her inspection, she immediately called in a builder to repair said ceiling. This resulted in suspension of ringing as very quickly a scaffold tower and buckets and ladders appeared in the belfry. All ringing had to cease. To the rescue came Eastry.



For four weeks we all assembled there for our practice on Friday afternoons. Thanks to Jackie Penner for being our host and hoovering up the flies every week before our arrival. Some of the ringers even found that the Fish and Chip shop at the end of the road was a Good Friday evening tea.

The repair was completed but needed 2 weeks to dry, this meant that ringing could not commence until March 20th. the evening of the Installation of our new Rector!

On inspection of the belfry on 9th. March, the scaffold and builders equipment had vacated the room but the gritty dust was still in residence and things were looking rather sad. A planned work party set to work on 18th.March, hoovers, dusters, polish and elbow grease assembled at 10.30am at 11.30 we decided to raise the bells and test the repair in advance of the Installation service. If plaster was going to fall on us better whilst we were cleaning than on the evening of the service.

Up went the bells, a few rounds were rung and it was declared that Ash were once again back ringing. St. Mildred's, Preston and Holy Cross Goodnestone were invited to join us at Ash for the pre service ringing for the installation service for our new Rector. It was lovely to welcome 6 from Preston. For those who are not familiar with the Preston ringers. They only ring call changes, called from A4 sheets of papers hung on a music stand. Brian Covey has several "Melodie's" he brought them to Ash and had compiled a new one especially for the service called Turvey's delight. To mark Reverend Caroline Turvey's installation.

8. Report from the last county committee Meeting.

Malcolm told members that the last meeting had been held in November and a report was in the January newsletter.

Salient points were that the new membership database was up and running.

He asked how many towers had received and completed the safeguarding audit. There was a show of hands. At least two people had been unable to complete the audit as it had been removed from the diocese website before the end of the day on deadline day.

The next county meeting was to be on 28th March. Malcolm always updated the district committee within a week and asked if towers would like a copy.

The chairman brought up the fact that the certificates presented today had not been signed by a vice president as required. District Striking Competition Rules

(Adopted at the ADM in October, 1990, amended at the ADM in October 1999 and further amended in October 2006)

- 1. The competition shall be held annually within the District at a location and on a date to be decided by the District Committee and shall be subject to the following rules.
- 2. The Competition shall be organised by the Assistant District Secretary in consultation with the District committee.
- 3. The object of the competition is to improve the standard of striking through friendly competition between bands representing towers in the District in union with the Kent County Association of Change Ringers.
- 4. All members taking part shall be members of the Kent County Association of Change Ringers and regular Sunday service ringers at the tower they represent.
- 5. Bands shall be named on the entry form provided by the Assistant District Secretary, although not necessarily in the order of ringing in the test piece.
- 6. No ringer may ring more than once or represent more than one tower in the same competition.
- 7. A draw for the order of the bands competing shall be made by the leaders of each band before the competition, bands to be known by numbers only not by name. No two bands shall be in the ringing chamber at the same time. A steward shall be in the tower for the better observance of these rules and shall see that the bells are raised and rung beforehand.
- 8. Each band shall be allowed one continuous period of two minutes for a trial round of changes at the end of which the bells shall be set. A whole pull is to be rung on the treble to indicate to the judge(s) that the band is ready and the test piece will then commence and continue to its end without break.
- 9. Subject to any alteration arising from the application of rule 10 the test piece shall consist of either 240 changes of doubles on five or six bells or 240 changes of minor or, if the band entered is incapable of ringing changes (to a reasonable standard to be determined by the District Committee), the equivalent length of call changes, in which case there must be at least 24 different changes at regular intervals with at least five working bells.
- 10. The competition organiser may halve the length of the test piece stated in rule 9 if a) More than 8 teams have entered the competition or b) The competition is unduly delayed. In event that the test piece length is altered due to a delay after the competition has started then the bands that have rung the full length shall only be judged on the first 120 changes of their test piece and any marked rounds. Any band ringing call changes shall only be required to have 12 different changes at regular intervals with at least five working bells.
- 11. The first 10 whole pulls of rounds in the test piece shall not be marked. All faults in subsequent rounds and changes shall be penalised and the competition judged on the total number of faults recorded subject to any adjustment allowed under rule 10.
- 12. Any band failing to complete the test piece shall be disqualified.
- 13. There shall be one or two judges, preferably independent of the District, who shall know only the numbers of the bands competing. Their decision shall be final, subject to the observance of these rules, and the judge(s) shall give the results and comments at the meeting following the competition.
- 14. The Frank Knight Cup will be awarded, with a certificate, to the winning tower, who will be responsible for its safe keeping. It shall be returned in a clean condition to the Honorary District Secretary before the next competition or after a period of one year if no competition is held within that period.
- 15. The decision of the District Committee as to the interpretation and observance of these rules shall be final and binding on all parties. Such decisions shall be by a simple majority of the Committee present and voting.
