Training

BELL RINGING TRAINING IN THE TONBRIDGE DISTRICT

I was elected as Tonbridge District Training Coordinator at the 2022 ADM. At that time many new people had come forward to learn to Ring for the King. I set up monthly training sessions on 3rd Saturdays to help with bell handling. Thanks to the support from many experienced ringers, the training sessions have become very popular. Many of our new ringers have now joined the KCACR, become very valuable Sunday Service ringers, and attend District Practices and other towers' practices to progress their learning. Most of our new ringers have now moved on to call changes, hunting, and some on to method ringing. There is less of a need to teach bell handling, and a greater need to support the transition towards method ringing. Although monthly training sessions could no doubt help with that, it is my view that the most effective way to progress in method ringing is through regular, weekly practice. That may mean joining practices at other towers that have suitable numbers and experience.

We are lucky to have many good ringers in our District who are also very competent at teaching ringing. I hope that one of you will consider taking up the training baton when I stand down at this year's ADM, and develop your own strategy for how best to help with the development of ringing in our District. There are many different views on the best way to teach ringing, and there is no imperative to continue with the programme that I have established. I consider the Training Coordinator role to involve the following.

- 1. Identify specific training opportunities for towers/individual ringers, using information from tower captains, ringing master(s) and tower stewards
- 2. Make arrangements for District training sessions, including booking towers and finding session leaders and helpers
- 3. Liaise with the county training officer

I hope that someone will volunteer to continue this important role, and I would like to thank all of the students and helpers that have participated in training under my watch for making it such an enjoyable and rewarding experience.

TRAINING DAY 20TH JULY 2024

The session at Hadlow was an introduction to plain bob doubles. It began with an explanation of the construction of plain bob doubles and how it relates directly to plain hunt. Students then took the 2 to practice leading and making seconds, and then took the 3 to practice dodging up with the 4, and took the 4 to practice dodging down with the 3. The three students each rang one and a half courses of plain bob from the 3 before the end of the session. They made great progress in understanding unfamiliar aspects of ringing thanks to excellent input from the helpers. It can be a long time between training sessions and easy to forget what was learned. It is so important to practice as much as possible if you want to progress, so attend practice nights at other towers if you can.

SKINNERS' DAY AT TONBRIDGE

For very many years, the ringers at Tonbridge have been paid by The Worshipful Company of Skinners to ring in order to wake up the Governors of Tonbridge School to mark the celebrations for the start of the Summer Holidays for the boys.

On 6th July the Beadle, Phillip Ludgrove, joined the 8 ringers who ensured enough noise was made for this purpose, then he left us to join the processions and the celebrations.

Considerable rebuilding work has been undertaken at Skinners' Hall (near Cannon Street) and, the original estimate for these works was in the region of £20m. As a result of new discoveries once digging commenced they found new staircases, hidden rooms and old bones. The works are now in their fourth year and the new estimate is closer to £40m. Fortunately, these costs have been covered by a former Livery Man at Skinners who died in 1967 without issue. He owned considerable lands in Hampshire and, through careful investment by the Skinners' Company, he paid for the lot.

The Beadle hopes to move back into their halls and offices very soon.

FROM THE CROOKED SPIRE OF COWDEN TO THE GREAT BELLS OF BOW! LOUISE NIGHTINGALE

A few years ago when I was involved in the Central council I was asked to support some Bellringing promotional activities at St Mary le Bow Church which featured in the London landmarks half marathon. Carl, Andy Wickenden and Robin Rouse kindly volunteered their services to come along and help in return for having a little ring on the "great bells of Bow".

Carl loves the challenge of ringing a big bell and since then has said a bucket list goal for him would be to ring tenor to a QP at St Mary le Bow. Earlier this year I mentioned it to the ringing master, and he found a date to make this happen - 17th June to open a week of musical events at the church.

As the big day got closer Carl started to get a little nervous about the QP - his first tenoring to 12 which on the 41cwt Bow tenor was probably a little ambitious, but I knew he was more than capable of it. It didn't help when the band was announced, and Carl saw it included some St Paul's and Westminster Abbey ringers! Steve Newlands came along to listen and we all met up on the train up to London. To try and help ease Carls nerves Steve told Carl to look on it as the equivalent of being asked to play cricket at Lord's. I'm no cricketer but think this added to the nerves!

We arrived about an hour before the meeting time and Carl's nerves were made even worse when we saw a sign in the church yard advertising the performance by the "expert band of ringers". No pressure!

Carl seemed to take a leaf out of Robin's book and loitered in the church yard until he heard the bells being rung up. He claims it was to avoid extra damage to his already blistered hands following the Edenbridge peal two days earlier. I'm not convinced!

Steve and I found a good spot in the churchyard to listen to the QP. There was an initial blast of rounds before the bells were stood (Carl having a few extra blows on the very lightly set tenor!) and we wondered what conversations were going on in the ringing chamber. After a few more minutes the bells started up again and then went into what was described as an "adventurous" composition of Stedman Cinques, composed, and conducted by Lucinda Woodward who we've been lucky enough to see in action on the bells at St Paul's Cathedral. After 53 minutes of some very beautiful ringing we heard the bells come in to rounds and felt so pleased that Carl had achieved his ringing goal!

Needless to say, a celebratory beer was needed and we found a nearby pub for a well-deserved drink and debrief on the QP with some of the band!
