HOW ON EARTH DO YOU HELP NEW RINGERS TO COUNT PLACES? Ray Taylor

I attended an ART course at Rochester at the end of August dealing specifically with ways of helping new ringers to count places. Lots of excellent exercises that I hadn't come across to get new ringers understanding places at the call change stage, well before attempting plain hunt. You may have heard of Kaleidoscope exercises? Simple and fun exercises. There are lots of resources on the ART website so you can cherry pick to suit your band and new ringers. ART course costs are reimbursed from the KCACR Training Fund. PENSHURST BELLS

As many of you know the Penshurst bells have a somewhat interesting reputation. They are characters. The treble needs a firm hand, the 2 is bouncy (rather like a friendly labrador, willing to please but uncontrollable at times), the 3 is pleasant, the 4 is tricky, the 5 is dependable, the 6 is just plain naughty, the 7 and 8 are heavy and solid and if handled properly just get on with it.

However this is all about to change next year when the bells will be rehung. Full funding has been achieved and we are now waiting for the final go-ahead from the Diocese. The aim is for the work to be completed by the end of April 2025. This project has been in the making since 2013 when a report by Whites of Appleton identified a number of problems with the bells and their mechanisms. However it was not until 2023 that the project really started to gain impetus, driven by parishioners Charles Fuller-Rowell, Zaria Maltz together with Penshurst's tower captain, Janice Byrne.

In June of this year a presentation in Penshurst Church launched the project, and the fundraising began in earnest. A sponsorship scheme was devised whereby people could sponsor a bell for £1000, a wheel for £500, a headstock for £250, a rope for £100, or give any amount. We also received grants from the Kent County Association of Change Ringers, and from the National Heritage Lottery Fund.

So much hard work went into this and those who ring at Penshurst are very excited. We shall of course miss the old characters but will be welcoming the new ones, which does of course include the ringers.

CHIDDINGSTONE WEDDING

The sun shone down on a lovely wedding at Chiddingstone on a Thursday in September and the 6 ringers (before and after) were joined by Ben from Chevening who was a guest at the wedding.

The instructions from the church requested that we did not start ringing until 12 noon because the school children were taking their 11+ exam, so we started getting the bells up at 12.15.

Two of the six bridesmaids led the procession up the aisle, both leading dogs – presumably belonging to the happy couple. On completion of the service, we rang some nice call changes to accompany "Are You Ready for Love" by Elton John, then off they all went to High Rocks for the reception and the weather remained perfect.
