## DISCOVERING BELLS AND BELLRINGING by JOHN CAMP

4th edition 1997, Shire Publications, £3.95 ISBN 0 7478 0326 9

On receiving this new edition from the publisher, I got out my own 1977 second edition copy for comparison. The new edition is more attractive with full colour front


cover illustration, and more photographs within the text. It also has ten more pages, mainly because the print is larger (no bad thing, actually!), but keeps the same informative concise style. At the back it has a list of more books on bells and bellringing to encourage further reading. This book should certainly help newcomers to the belfry to get to understand the techniques and history of campanology. It is a shame that the picture on the front cover hardly makes a good recruiting poster! By the way, the price of the 1977 edition was just 50 pence.

## STANDARD 70 compiled by JOHN N LONGRIDGE first published 1982. 4th reprint 1993 no ISBN, £3.50

Running to nearly 70 pages, this book contains lots of ringing methods, from Plain Bob Doubles up to Bristol Surprise Maximus. A single line of the whole method is written out in one column, which may make for easier learning. But this is no alternative to 'Diagrams'. The main aim of the book is to provide conductors with a wide range of touches, and compositions for quarter peals and peals. Overall the book does look baffling (it must have been a headache for the proof-readers), one for the conductor and more ambitious ringer.





# Ringing, & the Internet

Almost every day there's a story to about the Internet in the papers. Most television programmes have a web site reference something along the lines of "http://www.doc" which if you feel so inclined you can look up to discover more information.

So what's available for ringers.

For those with access to E-mail there are a couple of ringing discussion lists available to subscribe to. The "Ringers List", is a discussion forum for ringing related matters. Current subject matter includes requests for advice on

teaching blind ringers, requests for information about towers, methods, compositions etc. The alternative list, the "Ringers Chat list" has subject matter more suited to after ringing, down the pub type conversations. I did subscribe to this for a short time, however found it so tedious that I "unsubscribed" fairly quickly.

Those with web access (that's those who can access sites with http://www.doc type codes) have a number of sites to choose from on ringing matters

The Ringing World has a site giving out useful information, some articles, contacts for the Central Council and associations. This can be found at "http://www.luna.co.uk/~ringingw/"

Just to prove that the K.C.A.C.R are with it and up to date they now have a site at "http://our-world.compuserve.com/homepages/fwcml/homepage.htm". Frank Lewis administers this and will be pleased to accept contributions for the site.

At present there's an interesting range of information available on the KCACR - the training sub-committee have some information on training learners, there are details of E-mail addresses for members of the county who wish to have their E-mail addresses published, details of practice nights and reviews of bellringing and related happenings.

Finally another excellent source of ringing related information and ringers web sites is maintained by Roger Bailey on his homepage at "http://www.doc.ic.ac.uk/~rb/ringing.html" This contains details of a great many association, individual ringers and tower web sites - a wealth of information should you want to find anything.

Hope those with Internet access have fun, those without, remember, all you need is a computer with a modem, an Internet Service Provider account and then simply sit back, surf the net and wait for the huge telephone bill to drop on the doormat.

# Record broken in Cathedral peal

LOCAL BAND MEMBER Matthew Hilling set a new record on Saturday 29 November, by becoming the youngest ringer to ring a single-handed peal on Exeter Cathedral tenor.

The plan had been to ring Stedman Cinques for this year's local band peal, but unfortunately, one of the band had to drop out at the last minute due to poor health, and Cathe-

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dral assistant ringing master James Grant offered to step down, to allow a ten bell peal to be attempted. The traditional step ladder was placed next to the tenor box, with glucose tablets and Lucozade to provide energy and refreshment. The bells were raised and Michael Mears said, "Go, Grandsire Caters", and a steady pace was set. The peal was completed in 4 hours 16 minutes. Matthew Hilling is 20.

# ....And Finally

I would like to ask all tower captains and ringers involved in teaching children to ring to read the guidelines set out below. I would urge you all to consider that these are for the adults concerned protection as well as for any children who are learning to ring.

#### <u>Guidelines on Child Protection in the</u> context of bellringing

These guidelines have been prepared to provide a working document for Tower captains and those teaching children to ring. They are **not** intended to be exhaustive and should

be read in the context of the Church of England House of Bishops' Policy on Child Abuse and equivalent documents from other churches as well as the Government publication *Safe from Harm*, and the guidance issued by your diocese and parish church.

#### Introduction

Most dioceses have their own policy on child protection which tower captains should follow. Churches should also have an appointed person to whom any suspected cases of child abuse must be immediately reported. Tower Captains should find out who this person is. Some churches have a procedure for carrying out police or other checks and taking up references on anyone likely to be responsible for looking after children in the tower.

#### Suggested guidelines:

- Always have two adults present when children are being taught
- Invite parents of any trainees to come and watch a training session before allowing
  their child to start to learn. Require a parent to attend
  the first training session and
  ensure that the parent fully understands what is involved in learning to ring.
- Make sure a parent is responsible for delivering the child to and collecting the child from the tower.
- Ask parents to sign a "permission to learn to ring" form
- · Keep an attendance register
- Be aware of the insurance position for children
- Never allow children up amongst the bells apart from an initial demonstration visit if it is safe to have one.
- For tower outings get parents to sign a detailed permission form. Organisers should be aware of Health and Safety and other issues: for example, it is inadvisable for a child to travel alone in a car with an adult.

#### Points to check:

- Church insurance does the policy have a lower age limit? In some churches this is 12 years of age
- Is it possible to prevent inquisitive children from wandering up amongst "up" bells?
- Is there a tower Health & Safety Policy? Is it reviewed regularly? Is there an accident log book? Is there a first aid kit for minor accidents?
- Are you aware of any medical conditions affecting, the children being taught? For example, epilepsy, diabetes
- Is there an attendance register
- Find out the name of the church's appointed person and the procedure to be followed in the event of a child making a disclosure about possible abuse. Always follow up such allegations, avoid detailed questioning of the child and never promise confidentiality.

#### 9. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

#### **Training Sub-Committee**

Mrs. Hill explained that, since Dr. Young had moved away from the area, the District was no longer represented on the Training Sub-Committee. Mr. Byers was prepared to take on this commitment in a year or two but in the meantime a volunteer was sought. Miss Wilkins made some enquiries of Mrs. Hill about what was involved and Mrs. Hill offered to talk to her about the matter after the meeting.

#### Weekday Weddings

Mrs. S. Hardy said she was compiling a list of people who were available to ring for weekday weddings and asked anyone who wished their name put down to contact her after the meeting.

#### 9. ANY OTHER BUSINESS (CONTINUED)

#### Welcome Pack for New Members

Mrs. Hardy reminded members that at the July 1996 meeting she had mentioned the Surrey Association Welcome Pack that was given to new members. This contained a Handbook, list of District practices, Association events etc. It was agreed that this should be raised at the General Committee Meeting.

#### Ringing Master's Report
