

I Taught the County Chairman to Ring...

.... Well almost! This comment was overheard during the teabreak at the Tower Captains' course held at Leeds on December 3rd 1988.

Despite the freezing cold and driving rain 20 students arrived at Leeds Parish Church to learn the finer points of becoming a Tower Captain. Several "experts" had given their Saturday afternoon up to come along to teach us and help us.

The first lesson of the day was how to tie a bell. At this point it was discovered that all the pieces of rope to be used to tie the clappers had been cut too short.

Once this minor problem had been overcome, Colin Wilde from the Lewisham District began to teach us how to teach ringing. The first lesson was what to do if a learner loses control of a bell or drops the tail end - this made for a rather spectacular demonstration. Then came the moment the students had been dreading; it was our turn. Colin was pleased with our attempts and so we moved on to the next stage - ringing one handed.

Colin then demonstrated the basic teaching programme he uses. He took great care here to emphasise that there are several ways to teach, and that everyone

adopts the method which they find most comfortable.

Again the students were given a chance to "have a go". Here the experts came into their own, inventing handling faults and misinterpreting the students instructions. This proved very useful and made us all think about what we said when explaining the finer points of bell handling.

A message ascended to the ringing chamber at this juncture to let us know tea was ready. The learning process did not stop during the break as Colin was bombarded with questions, not only from students but also from some of the experts.

After tea we returned to the ringing chamber to assess ringing style. Several people were brave enough to admit handling faults and Colin came up with some very useful suggestions. The confidence of the students was boosted at this point by several of the experts confessing their handling faults.

Richard Offen then took over to talk about running a practice and relations with the Church and the Public. He offered useful advice and gave us all a great deal to think about. The afternoon ended with a lively discussion.

Several ringers adjourned to the local hostelry for a meal and to carry on chatting about what they had learnt.

I am sure all the other students would like to join with me in thanking the experts for their advice. Thanks also go to Phil and Ian Young for looking after the catering arrangements.

# THE KENT COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF CHANGE RINGERS

For those of you who have recently been elected members of the Association, which is known as the K.C.A.C.R. for short, the following brief notes are intended to provide an insight into how the Association is constituted and governed.

The K.C.A.C.R. has over a thousand members and embraces the whole of Kent and that part of London which was formerly in Kent (parts of the Lewisham District). The county is divided into six districts, namely Ashford, Canterbury, Lewisham, Maidstone, Rochester and Tonbridge.

At County level the K.C.A.C.R. is headed by a non-executive President, a number of senior clergy as Vice-Presidents and five former members elected Vice-Presidents in recognition of their services to the Association. The affairs of the County are administered by an elected Chairman, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer and other officers. A full list of all the officers both at County and District level can be found in the Handbook which the K.C.A.C.R. produces each year.

The County holds an Annual General Meeting usually on Easter Monday. All members are encouraged to attend and vote for the election of the County officers and any other matters which are put to the vote. The venue of the A.G.M. is located in each of the six districts in turn. The Lewisham District will be the hosts in 1990.

At District level each District is administered by its own elected Chairman, Secretary, two District Representatives and other officers. Each District is required to hold business meetings each year at quarterly intervals with the last meeting of the year being an Annual General Meeting at which the officers are elected.

The affairs of the K.C.A.C.R. are governed by a General Committee which meets twice yearly in May and November. The Committee is presided over by the County Chairman and consists of the elected Vice-Presidents, the County officers, the District Secretaries, the Central Council Representatives, and two District Representatives from each district, the latter providing a direct link between the district membership and the General Committee and vice-versa.

The General Committee also administers the Bell Restoration Fund (which has charitable status) and considers and approves where appropriate applications for grants from the fund.

The K.C.A.C.R. Handbook refered to earlier is made available to the District Secretaries at the time of the County A.G.M. for distribution to the towers in their respective districts. Each paid up member is entitled to a free copy. The Handbook includes a report and accounts for the previous year, details of each ringing tower in the County and much other useful and interesting information.

Subscriptions for 1989 will remain at \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for senior citizens and junior members and are due on 1st January.

After chatting to some of the members of the Association, I thought it would be a good idea to interview some of the more senior members of the district, and find out what ringing used to be like in this area.

The first person chosen was Cyril Brett-Smith of Erith and below are extracts of an interview with Cyril which was recorded at his home in December.

Cyril is one of thirteen children - 7 boys and 6 girls. His parents married at Stanstead on Christmas day in 1894. They had two children while living here and then moved up to Kent at the turn of the century. Cyril thinks his father, Robert Brett-Smith, was a member of the Chislehurst band from 1901. There are peal boards in many of our local churches including Sidcup and Eynsford which Cyril's father rang in. These date from 1901. His father used to walk from Chislehurst to Eynsford to ring in peals and used to get up at 3 o'clock each morning for the same journey to work.

While living in Chislehurst, Cyril and nine other people formed the Labour Party there and at the age of 18, he was acting as parlimentary election agent to a parlimentary candidate.

In November 1914, just after his 8th birthday, Cyril's father introduced him and 4 of his brothers to bellringing. He got out a wooden box which had been delivered by carrier, opened it and inside were eight handbells. He gave them one each, showed them how to strike it and then explained rounds to them. They used to practise for 20 or 30 minutes at a time, twice the first week and then weekly. They then went on to learn Plain Bob minor and Oxford treble bob. After his father had taught them to call bobs and to ring two in hand they progressed on to ring major methods and finally on to tune ringing. They would now practise change ringing on a Tuesday and tune ringing on a Thursday, but his father would only let them practise for half an hour at a time.

At Christmas time they used to go out and ring the handbells outside the "gentlemens" houses in Chislehurst and collect money to buy presents or even a new pair of boots.

In 1920 two of his brothers were already members of the St Nicholas band and half way through the year Cyril himself was taught to ring here. At this time there were no rope guides so there was 60 feet of unguided rope. Later on he became in charge of the tune handbell ringing which they also used to practise at St Nicholas'.

He got married in 1930 and stayed with the St Nicholas band until he moved to Beckenham in 1934 and became a member of the St Georges band. He was at Beckenham when they added the two trebles. At times during the depression Cyril and his wife were homeless and slept wherever they could find shelter - even under haystacks.

After he and his wife had settled down Cyril became a member of the Crayford and Erith bands where he still rings today. He is now coming up to 75 years of ringing.

#### GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETING

The General Committee of the Association met on Saturday 26th November 1988 in the tower room at Leeds.

After the usual formalities of apologies and minutes, the members received reports from three sub-committees, viz;

Publicity - the sub-committee had had a preliminary meeting in October, at which every district was represented.

Different forms of publicity were discussed - the display stands are being well used all over the county, and signs of wear are beginning to show. It is proposed that the stands should be overhauled and updated at the next subcommittee meeting in April.

The meeting decided that, as the media is a very specialised field, help from any Association member with expertise in the field would be desirable, and they would be pleased to hear from any such member.

Newsletters are now being published in four of the six districts, and it is to be hoped that all the county will soon be covered, as internal communictions are also important.

Training - Effort had centred around the tower captains course to be held at Leeds on 3rd December, with plans being made for further courses.

Bell Restoration - Wormshill now has a ring of four (3-1-15 in E) in a six bell frame. The bells are tuned as 1,2,3 and 6 of the eventual six, and suitable bells to complete the ring are being actively sought.

The spire at Minster in Thanet, destroyed by the storm in October 1987, is to be rebuilt, and the bells will then be ringable once more.

Ringing has stopped at New Romney, due to concern about the state of the tower, and the frame at Smarden has been found to be in poor condition during the quinquennial survey. The bell foundry has judged the two trebles at Borden to be cracked, as is the mediaeval third at Newington next Sittingbourne.

Rehanging is imminent at Teynham and Hoo, and ringing gallery projects at Appledore, Lenham and Wingham are likely to be completed in 1989.

The treasurer reported that the scheme for covenanting subscriptions had had little response from members, and urged that every member should think about this. He pointed out that for every three covenants, the Association received the equivalent of four ordinary subscriptions.

With the agreement of the Rector of Beckenham, an invitation had been extended by Mr. Baker to hold the Association's Annual General Meeting at Beckenham on Easter Monday 1990 and this was gladly accepted.

The Ringing Master said that he proposed to arrange practices in the months in which there were not quarterly meetings, but did not intended to continue with workshops. There was some discussion about, and interest in, the possibility of arranging another 12-bell practice. It was generally agreed that Croydon was the most suitable tower. Dr. Young agreed to try and make the necessary arrangements.

9. SPONSORING MEMBERS OF THE DISTRICT WHO WISH TO ATTEND THE CENTRAL COUNCIL RINGING SCHOOL.

In the discussion about this matter Mrs. Grover asked if it could be raised again if any Tower Captains felt they would like the District to consider the possibility of sponsoring one of their ringers. The Chairman suggested that if any names were put forward at the January Quarterly Meeting, a collection should be made at the April meeting. This was agreed and mention of this would be put in the next Newsletter.
