

CENTENARY PROJECT

At the January quarterly meeting it was decided that the District would pursue the centenary project recommended by the committee, namely to undertake the rehanging and possible augmentation of a ring of 3 or 4 within the District (see the minutes of the meeting in this issue). This is an amibtious project, which will require a joint effort from all members of the District ... but one in which I think we can succeed. In addition to major fund raising events (any ideas welcome!), it would be nice to think that every member of the District could do their bit. There are around 200 full (adult) members of the District. If each one of us could personally undertake to raise £10 over the year (20p per week), that would raise £2000 - a good base for further money raising. For example, I shall donate 10p to the fund for every pint of beer I drink between now and next July. Others might like to join me in this, or perhaps other activities may be more suitable - 5p per bar of chocolate, 10p for every service you ring for but do not attend, 1p per hour you spend watching T.V., the possibilities are endless! I hope that we will have the support of the whole District in carrying through this project. If you think you can help in any way (e.g. organising a fund-raising event, assisting in the workat the tower, helping to teach a new band, etc.), please contact a member of the committee. I hope that we cansoon report more details of the proposed project, including the cost!

Congratulations to Jean Luffman [14] and Caroline Withers [42], who scored their first quarters, to S. Britain [10] who rang his first quarter inside, to David Macey [6] and Jane Paterson [9] who conducted their first quarters, and to everyone else who scored firsts or reached personal milestones.

CRAYFORD TOWER CAPTAIN RETIRES.

At the end of 1990, Mr Bill Bond retired as Tower Captain of the ringers at St.Paulinus Crayford, having held that post for 13 years between 1977 and 1990. For very many years Crayford had the benefit of the organisational skills of the Barnett family, but when Olive and Teddy (Edwin A.) retired to live at Zeals in Wiltshire Mr Bond took on the tower arrangements — no mean feat considering the amount of weddings that they have to ring for!

Mr Bond learned to ring at Crayford at about the same time as Teddy Barnett (for 14 years Secretary to the Central Council and later Vice-President and President and a Vice President of the K.C.A.C.R.) in the late 1920's. They joined the Association in 1928, and soon after became members of the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths — one of the prestigious and ancient ringing societies still flourishing today and based in London.

Since that time, Mr Bond has been a of the Crayford band, helping to start off many people in their ringing careers and coaxing and giving advice to others. Whether they be Crayford ringers or visitors, they would all be treated equally warmly. For that very reason many people hold Mr Bond in very high regard, and the Crayford ringers wanted to mark his retirement as Captain in a very special way. A peal of Bob Major was arranged and an appropriate band assembled for Saturday 5th January 1991. The first that Mr Bond was to know about it was to be when he heard the bells ringing from his nearby home. To quote Philip Corby (the conductor of the peal) from "The Ringing World" of 8/2/91:- "Then the Rector upset the applecart. He asked Billy to meet him at the church at 10 o'clock the time for the peal. A dilemma for Mrs Bond.... so she had better tell him. As he arrived at the churchyard gate Phil Corby \dots was just getting out of his car \dots Not letting on that he now knew the reason, Billy said:- 'What are you doing here?'" The peal was duly scored in 2 hours 47 minutes, and afterwards the band were entertained by Mr and Mrs Bond at their home along with their daughter and her husband.

Not wishing to rest there, the Crayford ringers wanted to hold a celebratory dinner for Mr Bond. This was duly organised by one of the local band, Peter Dear, and his wife Lucy, on Saturday 19th January 1991 at Dartford Golf Club, and was attended by about twenty five Crayford ringers and friends. A delightful four course meal was enjoyed, and although there was a karaoke night in full swing next door, they willingly stopped for the speeches.

Michael Gentry, the new Tower Captain at Crayford, paid tribute to the many years of dedicated service Mr Bond had given to ringing at St Paulinus, and on behalf of the band gave him a suitably inscribed presentation bell cast by the Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Mr Bond in turn thanked the many ringers who had

supported him over his period as Captain.

After the speeches, we were able to use the full facilities of the Club, and one of the young learners of the band, Amy, won a prize for the most impressive performance in the karaoke! We all then gradually departed, safe in the knowledge that the tribute to Mr Bond had been suitably made, and that Mr and Mrs Bond had a thoroughly enjoyable evening.

And so an era has come to an end as a new chapter in Crayford's history book begins. Who is to know what will be written on the next page? Only time can tell. There are solid foundations which Mr Bond has played no mean part in building, and which Michael, in his new role, can build on. Mr Bond will, of course, still regularly ring at Crayford as he has always done, but to quote again the words of Phil Corby, I am in no doubt that Mr Bond feels "gratified that the torch will continue to be carried".
