St. George's, Bickley

Until 1861 Bickley was part of the parish of SS. Peter & Paul, Bromley. In that year, however, the substantial residence of Bickley Park was sold and the new owner, a Mr George Wythes, set about an extensive scheme of development, including the building of a new church. So it was that St. George's church was begun in 1863 and opened for worship in 1864. The church was built of Caen stone in Victorian Gothic style, with a tower and spire measuring 175 feet at the west end. By 1906 deterioration of the stonework necessitated the rebuilding (and slight shortening) of the spire to its present height.

Enemy action during the early years of the second war caused repeated minor damage to the church which was patched up without the need for major structural repair. However, on 18th June, 1944 a flying bomb fell in the adjacent road, destroying the windows and most of the roof, and putting the church out of commission until 1946. At this time the tower contained five bells hung for chiming, the heaviest being about 14cwt. The story of the new ring of bells really starts with the tragic events of 6th April, 1989, when an electrical fault in the base of the tower caused a fire which destroyed the lower part of the tower interior (including the organ) and the nave roof and caused extensive damage to the rest of the church.

The plans to rebuild the church began immediately and the reconstruction commenced in July 1990. During the discussions about the restoration of the church, it was suggested that the old clock chime should be replaced with a new ring of bells of about the same weight, hung for full circle ringing. So it was that in the autumn of 1989 the K.C.A.C.R. bell restoration subcommittee were called in to give advice, and subsequently, in December, 1990 an order was placed with the Whitechapel Bellfoundry for a ring of six bells, with an option on another two as and when funds became available, to be hung in a new eight-bell frame. The old bells and fittings were lowered from the tower by K.C.A.C.R. members under the watchful eye of Peter Romney, the convenor of the County Bell Restoration Sub-committee.

The new bells were cast in July, 1991, attended by several members of the congregation who had travelled up to Whitechapel for the day, and were transported to the church in August. During a brief stay on the tower floor a service of hallowing was held, at which the bells were blessed and named in honour of six English saints. The next day the job of raising the bells into the tower began, and we soon received the news that they were in the tower and ready to be rung. However, the try out had to be delayed for several weeks, as the continuing building work on the tower made access to the ringing chamber impossible.

In the meantime a massive restoration project was under way in the rest of the church. The nave roof was completely rebuilt in its original style, with hammerbeam vaulting, a new concrete floor was laid, the whole building was rewired and replastered, a new organ and choir were installed in the south transept, and statues and artifacts rescued from the fire were The tower, the area of the worst damage, has been carefully cleaned and restored. completely refitted, and now contains two levels of balcony, the second of which forms the ringing chamber. Throughout the restoration the phoenix has been adopted as the symbol of the work. This mythical bird burnt itself to ashes after living for 500 years, then came to life again from the ashes with renewed youth. So it was with St. George's, Bickley that, to quote the words of the Bishop of Rochester in his address at the rededication service, "through the initial tears came the determination to rebuild a church of greater glory". Perhaps the most potent symbol of the restoration is the magnificent west window, high in the wall of the tower. It is an abstract representation of the phoenix by Alisoun Howie, a stained glass artist from north London, and forms an impressive backdrop to the ringing gallery when viewed from the body of the church.

During this period of rebuilding, members of the Lewisham District were hard at work training a band of ringers for the bells. At first teaching was done at the nearby church of The Annunciation, Chislehurst, to whom we are very grateful, but we have now moved to the bells at Bickley itself. We are also very grateful to the ringers of St. Peter & Paul, Bromley, who have made their bells available to us for additional practices, and to David Kingston for his assistance.

The culmination of the whole rebuilding and restoration project came on Saturday 21st December with the festival service of rededication, conducted by the Bishop of Rochester, the Rt. Rev. Michael Turnbull. In his address the Bishop praised the magnificence of the restored church, and gave thanks for the dedication of all those involved in the restoration work, and in particular to Father David Herbert for his spiritual guidance through a very difficult period. After the service a band of ringers representing those who had been involved in the work on the bells rang a touch of Stedman Doubles. Although none of the Bickley ringers are yet able to ringing unaided, most of them did then come up and ring some rounds on their new bells, with varying amounts of help. As the congregation departed to the local school for a celebratory buffet lunch, another band of ringers who had been involved in the project rang a quarter peal of Cambridge Surprise Minor.

Although sound control has been installed, we are very aware that bells are new to this largely residential area, and so ringing will necessarily be restricted. Practices and service ringing is by arrangement with the District officers. At least for the time being, peal attempts will not be allowed and ringing for other visiting bands will be strictly limited. There will, however be an opportunity for everyone to have a ring on the bells at the District quarterly meeting in the summer.

A FEW WORDS ABOUT OUR DISTRICT SECRETARY.

It would not surprise me at all if many people in our District were under the impression that between quarterly meetings not much goes on of an administrative nature, just so long as things "happen". If so, this could not be further from the truth. An immense amount of organising has to go on to ensure the smooth running of the District, apart from the mammoth task undertaken at present by Sonia Irwin (our District Ringing Master) in this falls down to the District's regular monthly practices. Most of this falls down to the District Secretary, Miss Mary Andrews, and we are indeed privileged to have somebody who is very willing to give of her time in doing so.

Mary (who will probably not forgive me for quoting dates!) was first elected to the post in 1959, and apart from a three year break from 1973 to 1976, has kept us on the straight and narrow ever since. Such is her wide experience that on a good number of occasions her 'wise counsel' has been sought by other District Secretaries in Kent having just been elected. Each year she has the thankless tasks of collecting subscriptions from people who have "forgotten", letter writing in the organisation of District Meetings - (not to forget 'thank you' letters to incumbents afterwards), minuting Business meetings, and looking after the District's finances, to name but a few. She is held in very high regard by many people throughout Kent and further afield. Many people will remember the presentation made to Mary at the end of her 25th year as District Secretary, at the 1987 ADM held at Greenwich.

Mary was taught to handle a bell at Bexley by Dennis Hall, brother of Alan Hall. In March this year, Mary celebrated her 40th anniversary of starting to ring. You may think that this is commendable, though not remarkable. That is until you hear that apart from her long devoted period as Lewisham District Secretary, she has for most of her ringing life been both Tower Captain and Secretary at Bexley, along with always being a dedicated member of St.Mary's, serves on Bexley's PCC (of which she is currently Secretary), has in the past held the post of District Ringing Master, in the same time has tended and run her own commercial business, and at this time Mary has taught countless people to ring, has most recently been heavily involved in the training of the new band at Bickley, and has given much encouragement to others in the development of their method ringing.

Consequently, it probably will not come as a surprise that her close ringing friends at Bexley wanted to celebrate this anniversary of Mary's in suitable style. Preparations started well back into 1991 for what was to be a "surprise" peal (i.e. unknown by Mary until the actual day), as close as possible to the actual anniversary, the participants being either Bexley ringers or those who have had close association with Mary through ringing. There were many such people who wanted to take part, but for various reasons were unable to, so many in fact that the band was only finalised about a fortnight beforehand! The ringers eventually taking part were four from Bexley (Margaret Bellinger, Ann Saunders, Ken Medhurst, and Percy Hicks), Alex Britton (who did a great deal of his early ringing at Bexley and benefited much from Mary's teaching), Brenda Davies (who learned to ring at Bexley in the 1950's), and her husband Nicholas Davies (who is at present the KCACR County Chairman). In fact Brenda and Nicholas were married at Bexley, and it was particularly appropriate they rang. It was also Brenda's first peal for about 24 years! The peal was conducted by Association Vice-President Philip Corby, who has been a good friend of Mary's for many years.

Needless to say, Mary is nobody's fool, and realised what was going on, especially when there was a big urge to practise Double Norwich Court Bob Major (the chosen method for the peal, it being one of Mary's favourites) at Bexley on Thursday practice nights!

The peal was duly scored (details of which are given) and was of a high standard throughout. Fortunately, Mary was able to be present to hear the final half hour or so. Afterwards the peal band was entertained by Mary at her house with afternoon refreshments, Mary having already hosted a party on the Friday night for Bexley ringers past and present, and having received a presentation from the Bexley PCC in honour of her long and dedicated devotion to the church. Later on the Sunday evening Mary attended a celebration dinner held by some of the Bexley ringers, and she entered to the sound on tape of "her" peal which had been rung earlier in the day.

And so ended a weekend that Mary will probably not forget in a hurry.

Mary, you have always given much for ringing in Kent, and we are all very appreciative of your efforts. Long may you continue.





THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

Melange des cloches

Ingredients: 28 ringers who want to know more about Plain Bob Doubles.

16-20 ringers who already know all about Plain Bob Doubles.

3 ringers who already know all about Plain Bob Doubles and have loud voices.

1 guest 'big-wig' from another District.

Method: Plain Bob Doubles

[1] Take all the ingredients and divide them into three equal portions and place each portion in a tower with at least six bells (Bexley, Chelsfield and St. Mary Cray work very well)

[2] Allow all the ingredients to mix for about 15 minutes, then cook the learners gently by coaxing them through plain courses of Plain Bob Doubles.

WARNING - Do not allow them to overcook (signified by a blank expression and steam coming out of the ears)

[3] Depending how lumpy the mixture looks (or sounds) after an hour or so, you may like to add a sprinkling of bobs.

[4] After 90 minutes remove from the heat, combine the three portions, transfer them to a warmed Church Hall (e.g. St. Mary Cray), and stuff with coffee and sandwiches.

During this period, more information should be gently infused into the mixture by the guest 'big-wig' (Catherine Lewis from the Tonbridge District).

[6] Follow this by a light grilling from the organiser to ensure that no one is stewing too much, then divide the mixture into three portions again.

[7] Distribute the three portions between three more towers (Eynsford, Farningham and Ash) and continue cooking for a further 2 hours until well glazed (but still alive).

[8] The learners should then be stood to cool for a few minutes in the ringing chamber whilst questions are answered, before being returned to their home towers to see how much has sunk in - the proof of the pudding is in the eating!!
