#### **District Centenary**

We are still not in a position to give details of the <u>Centenary Project</u>. This is largely because negotiations with one tower recently fell through at a very late stage. It is being held after the County 6-bell striking competition final (at Beckenham 2-00 p.m. draw) and will be followed by tea and competition results. So why not come along and make a day of it - support your District band (Eynsford/Farningham) in the competition, come to the service to celebrate our centenary, and then enjoy a sumptuous tea? Even if you cannot make it for the whole day, please try to attend the service of celebration. BOOK THE DATE NOW!! Tickets for tea are available from Sonia Irwin (£2-00 each) BEFORE 19th September (Cheques payable to "Lewisham District Centenary Fund").

The <u>County Dinner</u> will be held at Holy Trinity School, Dartford on Saturday 31st October. Tickets are on sale now (£15-00) from Alex Britton, and a copy of the menu is also available for inspection. I hope our District will be well represented at the Dinner.

The <u>Raising and Lowering Competition</u> will be held at Bexley on 12th December, before the <u>District Carol Service</u>. We have extended an invitation to the other Districts of the Association to send a band each. The ringing will be organised into two groups, so that bands from towers within the District will compete against each other, and the only top band from the District will be compared with the bands from the other Districts. Details will be sent to each tower in due course.

#### **Book Reviews**

In response to popular demand, I have been spending my brief leisure time recently reviewing some of the ringing books currently available. All the titles reviewed below are available from the District bookstall, which makes an appearance at each quarterly meeting, or can be contacted at home at all sensible hours (Diana Young, 0322 529964).

#### One Per Learner

A very popular book with learners. At 50 pence each it is excellent value for money, and is a must for every learner. It takes the beginner through from very first principles of ringing, to ringing simple methods. I find the content of the book excellent, with clear explanations, in a format which allows you to carry it around with you wherever you go. Some find the informality of the presentation a plus for the book, but personally I find the hand-written format irritating. I think anyone who is doing any teaching would benefit from looking through this book too!

#### The Follow on Book

Written in the same format as the 'One per learner', with the same pluses and minuses. It is a mixture of more advanced topics, including sections on more complicated methods, calling bobs (not completely accurate!), striking, Devon call-changes, rope splicing and understanding the ringers' diary. Although I do not see this book as essential reading, there is something in it for everyone, learners and their teachers, and at only 50 pence each, it is a book that should have a place on all ringers' bookshelves.

#### The Ringers' Excercise Book

An excellent compliment to "One per Learner" and the "Follow on Book". It gives ready made grids etc. to guide the learner through his/her homework.

#### Will You Call a Touch Please Bob?

An excellent introduction to conducting. It emphasises the basics - the conductors main aim is to ring the method correctly and to call the touch accurately. Ensuring that the striking is accurate, correcting other ringers' mistakes, use of coursing orders and transpositions are covered, but only as appendices to the main theme - calling the touch correctly. The book covers in detail the calling of Plain Bob Doubles from first principles, then extends it to Plain Bob on higher numbers. Grandsire Doubles and Triples are covered in detail. In addition to the appendices mentioned above a fourth appendix gives some useful short touches in standard methods. All in all an excellent introduction to conducting. For those who want to go further into coursing orders and what to do with them will not find what they what in this book and would be advised to move on to 'On Conducting' or 'Conducting for Beginners'. I would recommend this book as the best of the three as an introduction to conducting. If you only aspire to being a bob-caller, then you probably need go no further than this book. If your aims are high and you wish to conduct using coursing orders, them you should still start with this book and once you have understood it fully, move on to one of the ones which explains coursing orders.

#### On Conducting

This book first of all introduces "the old way of conducting" by learning the order of the rows at certain points in the composition, then points out the flaws in such a means of correcting mistakes. It then introduces the concept of coursing order, and shows its advantages. Transposition of coursing orders is covered in detail and very clearly, and the relevance to what each bell does at the bob is explained. Having gone through the basics of conducting by coursing order, the book then puts it into the context of calling touches, quarter-peals and peals. It also describes how the same principles can be used to conduct more complex methods. A very good book for learning to understand coursing orders and what to do with them - it is the one I used mostly. However it tends to be a little verbose in places. Also be warned that it does not teach you the basics of calling touches - for that I would recommend 'Will You Call a Touch Please Bob?'.

#### Conducting for Beginners

This book introduces the potential conductor to how bobs work, how to call a touch, how to use coursing orders and how to transpose. The main text concerns Plain Bob Doubles, then shows how the same principles can be used to conduct Plain Bob Minor, Grandsire Doubles and Oxford Treble Bob Minor. It gives a good overview of conducting, but does not go into the same detail as either 'Will You Call a Touch Please Bob' or 'On Conducting', and it tends to be rather repetitive. However at 50 pence each it represents very good value.

#### Service Touches

This book contains useful touches in most regularly rung methods, including Plain Bob Doubles to Maximus, Treble Bob Minor to Maximus, DNCBM, Surprise Minor to Maximus (including spliced) Grandsire Doubles to Cinques and Stedman Doubles to Cinques. It is a useful book but not presented very clearly - I would prefer a Ringers' Diary myself!

#### Conducting Stedman

Goes through all the stages of this mysterious subject, from calling a touch to conducting. It is very clearly written and easy to read. I found it very convincing until I tried to put its words into practice - but that is no fault of the book! There is lots of information on calling, but not much on the use of coursing orders.

#### Philip Anthony Corby, 1917 - 1992

The death of Phil Corby on 9 June came as a major shock to all who knew him. His funeral on 19 June at Chiddingstone was attended by well over 300 friends from all areas of his vast interests, but especially from the world of ringing.

The ringing at Chid was all open - Phil thought that bells were there to be rung, not muffled. A celebration of a life, not a dirge for a death. Fittingly amongst the ringing before the service were rounds for the youngsters Phil had been teaching over the past few months. After the burial handbells were rung beside the grave.

There were refreshments in the Village Hall afterwards - as John Lee, Rector of Chiddingstone, had said, an occasion to meet old friends and make new ones just as Phil would have wanted. Meanwhile in the background a band of Past Masters of the College Youths (of which he himself had been Master in 1967) rang a peal of Stedman Triples.

Any attempt to pay due tribute to the man would be futile, but John did his best in his address. Phil often said to John, "One day you'll be doing me, my boy and mind you make a good job of it!" John knew that each time Phil mentioned his own passing it was not entirely in jest. Each attack of asthma with the associated emphysema was more of a strain though he kept it well hidden - he was that sort of man. He had a dread of oxygen bottles and invalidity, so in spite of the shock for Lucile, Andrew and Judith, we know he left us in the way he really wanted to go: "Out with a bang and not a whimper" in his beloved kitchen at Puckden. Exactly as he would have wished and prayed for.

Phil was born near Ely in 1917. In 1931 he learnt to ring at Langdon Hills in Essex, where there was a callchange band, but by visiting other towers learnt to ring Grandsire Triples. He moved to Sydenham in 1935 and rang his first peal at Cudham in 1936. He conducted his first peal at Swanscombe in 1937.

Phil and Lucile, having met in the tower (where else?) at Walthamstow, married on 10 April 1947 and moved to Forest Hill, where another love developed. The whole of one side of the garden was lined with deep litter poultry houses and many a ringing practice ended with eggs and chips at the Corbys, which at a time of severe rationing was regarded as a great treat.

After a time in Melton Mowbray Phil and Lucile moved back to Sevenoaks. He became tower captain and supervised the restoration of the bells. A recast fifth bell was given by John (his brother) and Phil in memory of their mother.

He was a member of the Central Council for 40 years, representing various societies, and was elected a life member. He was President from 1985 to 1987

He was a Vice President of the KCACR, having been the first Peal Secretary in 1947 and subsequently General Secretary and Chairman. In 1975 at Edenbridge Phil rang his 1000th peal. He was a supernumerary at Westminster Abbey.

Professionally he was a Fellow of the Institute of Builders. His real concern in building was for social housing. One result of his charitable activities is a road of housing for the disabled near Margate called Philip Corby Close.

He was on the Rochester Diocesan Advisory Committee and took particular responsibility for anything relating to bells and belfries.

Locally, he had so recently been the driving force behind the tuning and rehanging of Chiddingstone bells. He had been really pleased to have rung the tenor to a peal of Double Norwich (his last peal) only this April.

Phil, we're going to miss you - whatever we said when you were with us.

This is an 8ths place lead-end method, and the sequence of lead-end place bells is the same as in Rutland, Bristol and London. 8th place bell runs straight in to 3:4, while 6th place bell does 5:6 places, like Pudsey. Course bells dodge together in 7:8. All places are made at backstroke, no backward hunting. Bobs are lead-lengthening, as in Bristol, and make 5,6,7 & 8th place bells repeat the work of the previous lead, while 2nd & 3rd place bells are not affected.
