

# Suggested Additions/Amendments to Rules

The District Officers have been discussing the Call Change Competition and Striking Competition Rules. Set out below are some recommended additions/amendments. The existing Rules for the Call Change Competition can be found in the October 1995 Newsletter, and those for the Striking Competition will be available at the Meeting at Christ Church, Erith. This matter will be on the Agenda at the next Quarterly Meeting.

# Call Change Competition

#### Rule 4. Add

but no ringer may ring for more than one band. If a ringer rings for Sunday Service at more than one tower then the home tower takes

precedence.

# Rule 12. Add

Neither late nor telephone entries will be accepted.

#### New Rule 15

If a tower enters and subsequently has to withdraw their entry fee will not be refunded.

#### New Rule 16

The names of those taking part (up to nine in all) must be given on the entry form.

## **Striking Competition**

#### Rule 1. Add

the words "paid up" before members on line one. The revised rule would then read:

All competitors must be regular members of the Sunday Service Band for which they are ringing and be paid up members of the K.C.A.C.R. Members who wish to ring for a tower other than the one shown on the receipt for their current annual subscription must obtain the approval of the District Officers at least one week before the competition.

# Lewisham District Call Change Competition 1995

Description of the second of t

This years competition was held for the first time at Bickley, the back six of the eight bells (regarded by Andrew Young as

"quite demanding"), and was therefore a welcome opportunity for many to sample the Districts newest complete ring of bells for perhaps the first time. On a rather grey, but otherwise fine afternoon on 11th November, nine teams assembled at St. George's to do battle to find the Districts finest strikers.

With 'kick off 'delayed slightly, ringing commenced at a little before three o'clock, and progressed steadily until about four thirty. The standard of ringing was consistently high, and it was good to see a fair number of teams entering, nine in total. The judging fell to Andy Young, as previous arrangements for outside, independent judges (as per rules) could not attend on the day. Nonetheless, I am sure that all who took part would agree that an impartial result was delivered (and in any event Erith did not field a team!).

In fact the final verdict showed how close the result was, and just to demonstrate how closely Andy was listening, he even gave out how long each band took to ring their allotted 120 changes. In time honoured fashion, the results were given in reverse order, and these are as transcribed from my team captains notebook:-

Congratulations, therefore, to the Eynsford team who retain the trophy they won last year.

For the record, Andy revealed that his marking system was based on half a fault for a trip or clip, one for a 'crunch', two for a clash of two bells, and three faults for a complete disaster! On that basis, 120 changes could theoretically produce up to 360 faults, which goes to show how good all the teams who took part were.

Thanks, again, to our hosts for the afternoon, the ringers of St. George's, Bickley, and to Andy Young for stepping into the breach and judging for us in a most admirable fashion - even if the ringing had lacked precision or rhythm, he let it be known in such a nice way.

(Point for debate that arose subsequently during general discussion - perhaps the competition would be more objective if each band were asked to perform a specific set of changes, to include each bell (less the tenor) going to lead for a time. By that means, like would be judged against like, and no band would be able to 'hide' a weaker member from leading, which is where proportionately more criticism comes from judges. The down side is that who decides what changes are rung - and in any event it would make the whole competition rather boring for judges, ringers and the local populace who have to listen (?endure) the whole thing from beginning to end. Would it mean the set changes only being released to teams say a month or so beforehand, so that practise would be limited? Who knows?!



#### **Brecon Bells**

Andrew's fourth autumn ringing holiday returned to the same venue as last year, a converted set of farm buildings in the Brecon Beacons. Twenty one of us all met up in the Castle at Caldicot, just over the border into Wales, for lunch on Saturday, (two others arrived later in the day) then with ringing at Caldicot and Chepstow on the way, we headed for the cottage near Brecon. Sunday was free until meeting up for a quarter attempt for evensong on the sonorous and awkward octave of St. Mary's Brecon. Unfortunately, due to mechanical problems, the quarter was a non-starter, but repairs were effected in time to allow a long touch of Stedman.

Although based on a ringing holiday, there was plenty of time top enjoy the pother attractions of the area: the wonderful walking, several castles, Brecon Mountain Railway, Big Pit ( mining museum, including a tour through the mine workings 90 metres underground), the town of Brecon (including it's distillery!!) and even a ten-pin bowling tournament. In all we rang at twenty towers with successful quarters at four. The best were the majestic ten at Abergavenny and the glorious eight at Usk, surely both amongst the best rings in the country, the sixes at Llantarnam, Clodock, Bronllys, Grosmont and Llantillio Pertholey (only recently completed). Others worth a visit are the modern Taylor eights at Kingstone and Bedwellty; the pleasant eights at Blaenavon (where we decided not to ring the treble, as it felt as if it was loose on the headstock!), Llangybi, the six at Cefn Coed and the five at Llanbedr. Less impressive were the disappointing Gillett eight at Trevethin and the six at Allensmore. And the five at Michaelchurch Escley, and the light eight at Llanfrechfa - well the less said about them the better

All in all a thoroughly enjoyable week in the magnificent Brecon Beacons -good bells, good ringing, good food and drink (and plenty

#### 1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Mr. Colin Jeal and Mrs. Mary Jeal from Bexley, Mrs. Monica Sanderson and Mrs. Valerie Cruickshank from Bickley, Mrs. Maralyn Evans from Chislehurst, Mr. Len Morley from Eltham, Mr. David Hilling from Eynsford/Farningham, Mr. Roger Cass and Mrs. Jan Cass, Mrs. Margaret Macey and Miss Ros Farmer from Foots Cray, Miss Freda Cannon from Greenwich, Mr. Patrick Braund from Sidcup and Mr. Richard Bing from Woolwich.

#### 2. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

The minutes of the last meeting, which had been circulated, were confirmed and signed on the proposition of Mr. Percy Hicks, seconded by Mr. Alan Hall.

#### 3. MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

#### Karoake Evening (Page 1)

Dr. Andrew Young objected to the minute concerning the Karaoke Evening, which he thought was misleading. It was, however, pointed out that the minutes could only contain details of what had happened at the business meeting.

#### Newsletter (Page 2)

The Chairman pointed out that Mr. Patrick Braund was now editing the Newsletter.

#### 4. CORRESPONDENCE

From Mr. David Hilling ... Reading from Mr.Hilling's letter to the Secretary, the Chairman informed the meeting of the arrangements for the Carol Service, which was to be held at Farningham at 4 p.m. on Saturday, 9th December. This information had also been mentioned in the Secretary's Report. The Chairman also informed the meeting that a quarter peal had been rung at Eynsford in support of the Quarter Peal Week.

## 4. CORRESPONDENCE (CONTINUED)

From St. John Ambulance ... A letter, originally sent to the Bromley Ringers, had been given to the Secretary regarding the 100th anniversary, in 1996, of the formation of the Bromley Division of St. John Ambulance and asking for ringing to mark this occasion, which was to be celebrated with a carnival/fete in Norman Park toward the end of July. More information would be available in due course from Mrs. Audrey Lodder on 0181-857 7493. The Secretary undertook to ask Mrs. Lodder to give details to Mr. Braund for the Newsletter.

From Mr. Tim Wraight ... Mr. Wraight had written to say that County Sweatshirt/"T" Shirt Sales Representative wished to give up this position. A volunteer to take over this job was urgently required.

#### 5. REPORTS

#### a. Ringing Master

The Ringing Master's report had been circulated. In addition to the matters covered in this, it was pointed out that the District had rung a quarter of Stedman Cinques at Canterbury Cathedral. This was the first at Canterbury in that method for the District. In addition to the one at Eynsford, quarter peals to mark the District's Quarter Peal Week had been rung at Erith and West Wickham. The Beckenham band had won the County 6-bell Striking Competition, which had been held at Kemsing. This was the first time in 21 years that a band from the District had won this Competition. The Ringing Master's report was accepted on the proposition of Dr. Young, seconded by Mr. Jim Rooke.

#### b. Secretary

The Secretary, whose report had been circulated, asked members to delete Penge from the list of towers where there were no paid-up members. She also pointed out that since she had still not had back from the County Treasurer the receipt book and paying-in books which she had sent him for the preparation of the accounts for the Association's Annual General Meeting on Easter Monday, she had not been able to double-check the membership details as she would have liked. Her report was accepted on the proposition of Mrs. Mary Hill, seconded by Mr. Don Pointer.

#### 6. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

#### Chairman:

Mr. Jim Rooke was proposed by Miss Mary Andrews, seconded by Dr. Andrew Young and elected.

#### Ringing Master:

Dr. Andrew Young was proposed by Mrs. Mary Hill, seconded by Mrs. Carol Eastaugh, and elected.

# 6. ELECTION OF OFFICERS (CONTINUED)

Dr. Young, who felt that attendance at District events during the last year had been disappointing, said that he wanted support and that if he did not get it he would resign and would not be prepared to accept nomination for any other position in the District.

Mr. James Hardy was proposed by Dr. Andrew Young, seconded by Miss Mary Andrews, and elected.

### **District Representatives:**

The District Representatives, Mrs. Mary Hill and Mr. Bill Lanyon, were re-elected on the proposition of Dr. Andrew Young, seconded by Mrs. Carol Eastaugh.

## Press Representative:

Miss Jessica Vale was proposed by Miss Margaret Bellinger, seconded by Miss Cathleen Knowles, and elected.

#### Secretary

Miss Mary Andrews was re-elected on the proposition of Mr. Niger Pointer, seconded by Mr. James Hardy.

#### 7. ELECTION OF NEW MEMBERS

No new members were elected.

# 8. COUNTY ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 1996

The Chairman said that volunteers were required to help with both the ringing arrangements (looking after towers) and the catering for the Annual General Meeting on Easter Monday 1996. He hoped that the towers that he did contact would reply promptly to his letter.

In connection with the Karaoki Evening, there had been support for this at the St. Mary Cray meeting. In the event there had been very good support from the Beckenham band, who had put on a splendid spread of food, and from Sidcup; also from church members at Christ Church, Erith. Publicity had been good. The complete lack of interest from the remainder of the District had resulted in the event making a loss of £28. If the event had been cancelled, the organizers would have incurred an even greater loss. There was some discussion about how this loss could be covered.
