

Our judges this year were Frank and Cathy Lewis, from the Tonbridge District, well known to many of the district, as they have been over and judged a number of Lewisham's competitions in the past.

Having each rung our test piece the teams retired to the hall where, whilst being amply supplied with teas, coffees, cakes and such like we awaited the results.

Frank and Cathy commented that overall the ringing had been of a high standard, and clearly we had made their adjudication task far from straight forward.

The final scores were as follows:

#### Introduction

Back in early February, James Hardy called for Stedman Triples - a rare event in Beckenham. Expecting a rush for inside ropes, I headed for the Tenor heaving a mental sigh of relief that I had "got away with it".

"Ah Jeremy - I think you're needed inside"

David Hollis very kindly wrote the following notes which I have found useful, and I hope fellow strugglers will also appreciate.

A word of advice - you may need a pencil and paper, a quiet room and damp towel to ensure your brain doesn't overheat!

#### The Mysteries Revealed

Ringers often have trouble in touches of Stedman Triples coping with bobs and (even more so) with singles. These comments may prove helpful

There are only three bells affected at a bob, the one dodging 4:5 out, and the pair dodging in 6:7. The one dodging 4:5 out need present no problem, since it in effect rings Stedman Doubles, by making 5ths, double dodging 4:5 down and going in the opposite way to which it came out.

People seem to get bewildered when in 6:7. We are all famil-

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iar with the effect of a bob in Plain Bob when about to make 2nds place or when about to dodge 3:4 down - you simply insert an extra bit of work (a lead of plain hunting), and prepare to do at the next lead what you were going to do at the previous one. Similarly in Stedman Triples, if you are dodging either way in 6:7 the effect of a bob is to make you insert an extra bit of work, and then carry on where you left off. The extra bit occupies six changes, because this is the basic unit of Stedman, and consists of three extra dodges, the same way round as the ones you have just done.

I find a good way to count the dodges, both regular ones and the extras caused by a bob. is to watch the bell in 4:5, over which you strike three times, because counting up to three is not too taxing if you have other things to think about as well.

The next difficulty is knowing whether you are a Quick or Slow bell when you finally get down to the front work again. The basic rule of Stedman is that you go in the opposite way to which you came out. An even number of bobs when you are in 6:7 makes no difference, but an odd number reverses the rule, so that if you came out Quick you go in Quick, or if you came out Slow you go in Slow. It matters not if the bobs come all at once, or if some are while you are dodging out and some while you are dodging in, it is the total which counts. However, bobs often come one after another, and there is plenty of time to forget which way you came out, or lose count of the number, so it is a good idea to have a fall-back technique. Fortunately there are several, but they require careful observation.

If you are dodging 6:7 out the question of which way to go in is not immediate, so you can merely note who you are dodging with, because if no bobs are called when you are in 6:7 down, this bell will precede you onto the front (in effect is a "course-bell") and you will have a chance when you are dodging 4:5 down to see which way it goes in. If on your first blow in 4ths you find you are striking after this bell, then clearly it is making 3rds place and has gone in Slow, and you will be Quick. If it is not in 3rds place, it is a Quick bell and you will go in Slow.

If you miss this. you can still see where this bell is when you finish the 4:5 dodging and are about to go in. If it passes you as you go in. obviously it was a Quick bell and you must be a Slow bell. If it is still ahead of you as you enter the front work, it was Slow and you must be Quick.

If you are caught by a bob when dodging 6:7 down, you will acquire a new "course-bell" for each bob. This is the bell making the bob i.e. making 5ths, and is easy to identify. I advised counting the number of times you strike after the bell in 4:5 as a means of counting the dodges. This bell becomes your new "course-bell", after a bob when you are 6:7 down, and can be followed down as previously described. Each bob

will give you a new "course-bell", the one you have just been striking after before the bob was called.

Another observation is to notice who you are dodging with in 4:5 down. If this bell was in 4:5 a few changes previously while you were in 6:7, obviously it has not had time to be a Slow bell and must have been Quick and you must therefore go in Quick (in Stedman you always go in the same way as the bell you are dodging with came out).

If you miss all of these signposts, there is still one last chance to avoid a trip. When you get down onto the front work there are two bells in front of you, and you will first follow one and then the other. According to whether this makes you strike two blows in 3rds place, or one in 3rds and one in 2nds, you will know whether to be Slow or Quick. This fails if there is already a mix-up on the front, so it is only a last resort.

The prospect of a single induces despair, but there is no need for this. The bell in 4.5 out does the same as at a bob. The bell doing two dodges 6:7 out does exactly as at a plain six, i.e. it lies behind at the six-end and then does two dodges 6:7 down. The usual mistake is to go on dodging as though it were a bob. It is the ringer of the bell dodging 6:7 down who usually causes mayhem by not making 6ths place and then dodging the other way round with the same bell. In effect, this means that the bell which has just completed its dodging 6:7 up & down simply has to make 6ths and then do it all over again. Often at a single there is a mutiny on the back and one finds the bells acting as if it had been a bob and coming down in the wrong order, so a good conductor should be on the look-out for this and nip it in the bud.

One way for a ringer to avoid some of the traps in Stedman Triples is to conduct it, because then you know what is coming next.

# Family Firsts in Chelsfield <u>Quarter</u>

The quarter-peal at Chelsfield on Sunday 22nd December 1996 contained ringers from just two families and included two young ringers, one from each family, making their first attempts.

James Osborn from Eltham rang the third to Plain Bob Doubles while mum, Angie, rang the second and dad, Graham, rang the fourth. Melanie Wilkins from Chelsfield rang the treble while dad, Nick, conducted from the fifth and Melanie's aunt, Angela, (Nick's sister), covered on the tenor. James Osborn is fifteen years old and was elected a member of the Kent County Association in October 1996. Melanie is ten and was elected on 11th January 1997.

The "senior" members of the band have returned to ringing after gaps of various lengths and for various reasons the most common being for "family reasons." For example, prior to ringing a quarter at Chelsfield in November 1996 the last of Angela Wilkins 20+ quarter-peals at Chelsfield was in 1974!

Similarly, Nick, although having rung the occasional peal in the last fifteen or so years was conducting his first quarter since, according to his records as he had totally forgotten about it, April 1979(Cambridge S. Major at Spitalfields)!

# Memories of Pat Braund

While responding to Jeremy's request for articles for the newsletter and having produced the article above I thought it only appropriate while I am coming to grips with our new family computer "toy" to type an article on my memories of Pat Braund.

My parents and grandparents lived in St. Mary Cray for much of their lives and Pat knew them even before I knew him! My mother still has a photograph of me taken at the St. Mary Cray garden party, probably in about 1959/60, with Pat in the background throwing something at one of the side-shows! That was when the vicarage was at the bottom of Blacksmiths Lane before the tower blocks were built on its site; it is understood that the John Hodson bell foundry previously stood on this land.

When my sister and I started ringing in 1970, albeit at Chelsfield, it wasn't long before we came into contact with Pat when the towers often helped each other out for ringers.

Although I took a break from ringing I would from time to time bump into Pat in the Orpington area and I was particularly pleased when, by pure chance, my wife and I ended sitting next to Pat at a Harvest Supper 15 months ago and he and his "Ringers on the Green" were providing the entertainment. It was an excellent opportunity to catch up on many years news and he excitedly told me about his planned trip to New Zealand.

Obviously Pat played a large part in the successful Kent County Assn. AGM at Sidcup in 1996 and I was delighted to be asked by Pat to ring in a quarter of Bob Doubles at Sidcup on 23rd March - my first quarter since 1980.

I was shocked and greatly saddened to learn of his death just before Christmas and thought it appropriate to dedicate a quarter-peal of 1260 Bob Doubles that we rang at Sundridge on 28th December 1996 to Pat's memory. The details are;-

Both of the compositions I have produced are taken partly from Mark Liebenrood's peal composition.

The first composition begins by having 'rollercoasters' (321654987) followed by one course of 'Tittums'. There is only one course of 'Whittingtons' which leads into the section containing 'Queens'. These can be difficult courses for the conductor to cope with, therefore, counting the leads is necessary.

An unusual sequence for the back-bells to be in is the '9876' position. I have no idea why more of this position is not seen, as it produces a fair amount of music. Included in this composition is the change '23459876'. The fifth is then moved into thirds place to ensure the '65879's to finish the composition off.

# Just a suggestion.....

I've got an idea. Nothing shattering, just a suggestion that I've been thinking about for a while that might make things a little easier all round. Our district currently holds its AGM in October, and all its officers stand for the "year" October to October.

Now, how about, instead of making the District's "year" run from October to October, we make it run January to December?

So, why? Well, try to picture the scene, at an AGM. The officers are all elected, and the calendar for next year is constructed. The new master then has to put together a programme of ringing to run to the next October.

I would suggest that we continue to elect the officers in October, at the AGM, but make their 'term of office' run from January to December of the following year. This will give the new master(s) a chance to plan their programme for the whole of the next year. Although elected in October, the new officers will not take over until January.

Also, if a list of events is published at the AGM in October, then the venues could be finalised at the *January* meeting. Again, I have a number of reasons. Most importantly, people and towers do not tend to have their next years diary up and running in October. By January, they will have their new *Ringing World* diary, and will know far better what they are doing during the year

The January meeting also tends to be the best attended. It is completely out of the wedding season, and it is quite possible that towers will have a good idea of their wedding schedule by January.

I thought that I would air my views in an article in the *Newsletter*, rather than bringing them up "cold" at a quarterly meeting. If anyone has any views on why all this may or may not be a good idea, then maybe we can discuss this at one of the quarterly meetings in April or July.

Maybe this idea will help to alleviate the "dead" period between October and Christmas every year, and allow the ringing masters to provide a full programme of ringing throughout the year to cater for everyone.

Have a think about it.

### Peppermint Cream Bells

1 lb. icing sugar

1 teasp. lemon juice

1 egg white

a few drops peppermint flavouring colouring - green &/or red (few drops only)

Put ¾ lb. icing sugar in a bowl, make a hole in the centre & drop in egg white, lemon juice, flavouring & colouring. Mix all together until blended. Add more icing sugar until the mixture is the right consistency (dry enough not to stick to rolling pin in huge lumps but wet enough that it won't crack when rolling out). Then turn out onto a board dusted with icing sugar & roll out to required thickness. 

#### Minutes of the Quarterly Meeting held at Bickley on Saturday, 11th January 1997

The Chairman, who welcomed everyone to the meeting, asked members to stand in memory of Mr. Patrick G. Braund, who had died on 23rd December.

#### Mr. P. G. Braund

The Secretary said that she would be sending an in memoriam to The Ringing World regarding Mr. Braund together with the details that she had been given of quarter peals rung in his memory.

#### 1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Miss A. Wilkins and Mr. & Mrs. R. Pruden of Chelsfield, Mr. M. Murray of St. Nicholas, Chislehurst, and Mrs. D. Young of Christ Church, Erith.

#### 2. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

The Secretary asked members to add on page 3, item 6, Election of Officers, after Representatives:

Press Representative Miss J. Vale P. Miss F. Cannon S. Mrs. C. Eastaugh

This amendment had already been made to the file copy of the minutes, which were then confirmed and signed.

#### 3. MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

There were no matters arising.

#### 4. CORRESPONDENCE

The Secretary had received some correspondence from Mr. W. Lanyon about covenants. Mr. Lanyon explained that he had, with the agreement of the Association's Treasurer, drawn up the necessary forms. He urged all members who were paying the standard rate of income tax to consider paying their subscription in this way, which, at no expense to the individual, would provide (at the current rate) an additional £2.21 for the Association in reclaimed tax. There were two different forms, one for four years and another which covered the duration of a member's membership and took account of increases in subscription. In response to a question from Dr. A. M. J. Young, Mr. Lanyon said that he would prefer payment by cheque.

# 5. REPORT ON THE GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETING HELD AT LEEDS ON 23RD NOVEMBER 1996

Mrs. M. Hill had circulated a report on the General Committee Meeting. She said that the level of subscriptions would be discussed at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting and urged members to covenant their subscriptions as Mr. Lanyon had suggested. If a good number of members did not do this, she felt that a substantial subscription increase would be necessary.

With regard to the final paragraph of Mrs. Hill's report, Miss F. Cannon said that there might be a problem ringing all the bells at 12 noon on 1st January 2000 to celebrate the millennium. It was pointed out that Dr. Niblett, the Association Chairman, had divided the number of bells by the number of ringers and found that it was mathematically possible.

#### Gift Aid

Dr. Young assured members that he was still pursuing the matter of Gift Aid with regard to the Centenary Fund and that he would continue to pursue this matter until it reached a satisfactory conclusion. Now that the accounts for 1994 and 1995 had been audited, he hoped that the new Treasurer would be able to resolve the matter.

Mrs. Hill's report was accepted.

#### 6. PROPOSAL FOR A CENTRAL COUNCIL BELL FUND

A letter from The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers regarding the proposal for a Central Council Bell Fund had been printed in the District Newsletter. It was stressed that such a fund would not seek to compete in any way with individual association's bell restoration funds. Dr. Young said that he was in favour of such a fund being set up. A vote was taken and a majority of members were in favour.

#### 7. MEMBERSHIP DATABASE

The Secretary said that a copy of the Database Membership Application Form was available for inspection. Mrs. Hill informed members that she had asked at the General Committee Meeting what would happen if people did not want to complete the application form and had been told that this would not upset the Database.

## 8. ELECTION OF NEWSLETTER EDITOR TO REPLACE THE LATE MR. PATRICK BRAUND

Mr. J. Byers, who had kindly edited the current Newsletter at short notice, was willing to continue as Editor and was elected on the proposition of Mr. N. Pointer, seconded by Dr. A. M. J. Young. Mr. Byers asked that copy for the next Newsletter should be sent to him by 8th March.

#### 10. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

#### **District Striking Competition**

Mr. Hardy proposed the following amendment to Rule 11

- a. In the event that two or three towers who regularly hold joint practices are unable to form individual bands due to insufficient membership numbers, they may form a joint competition band.
- b. In the event of such a team winning the competition, the highest ranking 'single tower' team will represent the district in the county 6-bell competition.

This was seconded by Mrs. S. MacKenzie. After some discussion, Mr. Hardy agreed to prefix his proposal with the words 'At the discretion of the District Officers'. This was seconded by Dr. Young. The proposal was put to the meeting and was accepted.

Millennium Project. Dr. Young urged members to do all they could to obtain new recruits and to encourage lapsed members to take up ringing again. The launch of the Project, for which there would be good publicity, would be in September or October.

#### **District Practices**

With regard to future District practices, Mr. Hardy said that he would be arranging practices at Southwark Cathedral and urged all aspiring 12-bell ringers to attend these. With regard to the programme at the back of the Newsletter, the practice at Downe on 8th March had been confirmed. He hoped the one on 19th April would be at the Annunciation, Chislehurst. The one on 10th May had still to be arranged

Mr. A. J. Britton pointed out that the Bickley ringers had received 24 names for tea and that there were 36 people at the meeting. As a result of this and because he was running the bookstall for Miss J. Vale, who was away on holiday, he had been at the end of the queue for food and there was very little left. He stressed that this was not in any way the fault of the Bickley ringers, but urged all members to give their names for tea in advance for future District events so that the hosts could ensure enough food was provided.


#### Beckenham Practice
