If you're wondering what I'm talking about let me take you back to the last District meeting when Carol Eastaugh mentioned the possibility of the District running a stall at a Craft Fair at Hall Place Bexley on 26th May.

Andrew Young booked and transported the Jubi-Peal, Carol arranged the table with the organisers, the display boards were rescued from Nigel Pointer's tender care, and I was travelling with half the contents of a belfry.

Arrival on site heralded the unloading of a mass of bits and pieces, most daunting of all was the giant "Meccanno" set. The "Meccanno" or more correctly the Jubi-Peal is a portable ring of bells, originally handbells, which are hung for full circle ringing on a frame about 6ft 6in high.

The instructions consist solely of two items:

- a list of parts that you should have.
- a picture of what the finished item should look like.

No problem - our esteemed ringing master James Hardy, has had some experience of this contraption and took over supervision of its assembly (James - supervisors are supposed to stand around with a cup of tea directing operations - not actually do anything !!!!!)

A false start, putting the legs on upside down was soon rectified and by 10 a.m. the frame was up and bells were being hung in their various pits, pulley boxes fitted and ropes attached to wheels.

In the meantime the display boards had been assembled, various bits of belfry were on display, the bookstall was open for perusal, raffle tickets were being sold and the plant nursery division of the Lewisham District was open

The day then saw a constant flow (I emphasise the word flow - not trickle) of interested visitors either just browsing or the brave ones volunteering a 20p donation to have a go on the Jubi-Peal.

It was a most enjoyable day, there were several demonstrations, of which ringing was one of them. The interest shown by all concerned was very encouraging - clearly bellringers at craft fayres are unusual.

As closing time arrived, the more financially astute started the long and dirty job of counting the cash collected. The aim of the day had been solely to raise overall public awareness and if possible to cover the costs of the day (namely £ 20-00 hire fee for the Jubi-Peal and £ 45-00 fee for the tables) .

Given that the only sources of income were the raffle (£ 1 a strip), proceeds from the sale of donated plants, and 20p a go on the Jubi-Peal you will pleased to hear that we covered all the costs and made a profit of just over £ 100 which has been donated to the Bell Restoration Fund.

Thank you to all those who gave of their time and donated prizes. Unfortunately I can't remember everyone's name to thank them all personally, but I feel Carol Eastaugh deserves special mention for making the initial suggestion

I would commend this type of event to the District and suggest that the District consider repeating the idea, possibly at another fair in the future - it is an excellent way to get out into the community and advertise ringing.

The district entered a team this year for the competition held at Frittenden, Kent on 28th June.


The test piece was Erin Triples, a good selection, as it is closely related to Stedman, but sufficiently different and infrequently rung not to be familiar.

The main costs of each issue are

- Copying Costs these are currently running in the region of 50p an issue (dependant on the number of pages)
- Postage Costs currently about 25p a copy sent by post (assuming no increase in second class post)

The annual cost of producing four copies and posting them out is running at about £ 3-00 per copy, assuming that there are no further cost increases (I trust the new Chancellor will not raise VAT or a special tax on ringing newsletters) in the forthcoming year.

Given the poor state of the "kitty" at the moment I will be proposing an increase in the annual subscription as follows:

First copy to any address/tower £ 4-00 p.a. Second or subsequent copies to the same address/tower £ 3-00 p.a.

I will be putting this resolution forward at the next quarterly district meeting for ratification. Unfortunately I will be unable to attend the next meeting, so if you have any particularly strong views on this matter, please contact me directly and I will be more than happy to discuss any points you may wish to raise.

I trust that you consider the newsletter to be an asset and will support me in my request to increase subscriptions. Finally I am enclosing a form with the newsletter, which I would appreciate it if you could complete and return to me (preferably with a cheque).

Please note the purpose is twofold, first to make sure I get

the subscriptions in, and second to ensure that I've got the right contact names and addresses to send the newsletters out to. So please help me by filling it in and returning it as soon as possible.

The Bell Doctor

Professor Ground Pulley writes.....

Now is a good time to get into the belfry to do some basic checks. Summer temperatures might mean that metal components have expanded and nuts and bolts may need tightening.

Particular attention should be given to clappers, which have a tendency to fall out, if nuts aren't checked for tightness on a periodic basis.

Checking the strike point of the clapper on the bell is also

useful. The strike point is normally a point of bright metal where the clapper hits the bell. If this point is wide it may indicate that the clapper staple is loose in the bell, or that the clapper bearing is worn and may need re-bushing.

It's also a good time to spend time checking the strike of bells. Ringing them up on the wheel (rope removed) and letting them ring down is a good way of checking evenness of strike. If the bell clappers evenly all the way down, the bell is evenly struck. Adjustment is by tapered washer between the top of the bell and the staple or alternatively by using adjuster bolts (Twiddle pins) if they are fitted.

A Word of Warning, if you have twiddle pins fitted, don't forget to loosen these off before adjusting the clapper staple, otherwise you could damage the staple or the pins.

Please remember you should always work on bells that are down!!!!!

A Lovely Healthy Weekend

The third weekend in May was approaching too slowly. I wanted to be on the Guild of Medical Ringer's Summer Meeting weekend NOW! At last it came and I found myself on my way to Suffolk straight after work on the Friday evening. Fortunately my cousin kindly said I could kip overnight with her and her family in their cottage in Hollesley, South Suffolk. I caught up with their news then reluctantly but with excited anticipation I left them at the unsociable time of 9.30 am Saturday morning to get to the first tower of the day.

Halesworth was a ground floor ring of eight, not ten as our itinerary had lead us to believe (but we'll forgive the organiser as he is normally very efficient). It was a good tower to start the day off.

Blythburgh used to be a busy fishing, trading and sheep centre which would explain why this now tiny village has such a vast church known as "Cathedral of the Marshes". Historically it is a very interesting church - one of the carved wooden angels in the roof was restored and found to have bullet holes in it from Oliver Cromwell's men's

weapons. Although it is Spartan inside, it brought a welcome coolness from the muggy heat outside the day we visited this ground floor ring of six easy to ring bells.

It was then onto Southwold for a delicious pub lunch followed by a dessert of ringing in the Church. Another huge church, this one was highly decorated with a wonderful medieval painted rood screen. There was plenty of flint flushwork decorating the church, a memorable feature. There were eight bells here, again easy to ring.

Kessingland next stop. This church, with it's thatched nave, was undergoing major works in the pew area where various ancient coins had been excavated. To raise funds they were selling them to those who were interested. Upon taking a proper look one was made to feel old - they were mainly sixpence's and old style 10p and 5p pieces! The tower steps were very narrow with extremely steep treads but the ring we got from these 6 bells was worth the mountainous climb.

Along the coast a little further to Pakefield. Here was an historically fascinating church! Originally it was built as two separate churches side-by-side to enable two different denominations to worship at the same time. Now it has become one. Another ground floor ring each bell was labelled as to its number which was very helpful for us visitors. Upon choosing the one we wanted we pulled off and immediately felt the damp salty sallies. We could tell the church was only 500yards from the sea. The coast in these parts is being eroded pretty rapidly - at a rate of *lmetre a month* - this must be one of the few places where the house prices are falling! Originally the church was 2 miles inland, but with the beach so close our itinerary warned us

All I would say is that it is well worth a grab but make sure you do it within the next decade!

All change at Beccles! Well not before we'd all had a ring in the tower. I say tower and not church because it is totally separate from the church, now maintained by the Town Council. After a quick grab of this ten bell tower I went to find the bed and breakfast accommodation I had booked so I could unpack and change for the evening do. We were booked for a meal in a lovely old-fashioned country hotel on the riverside called Waveney House Hotel.

A brief business meeting followed the meal just to up date members on what was happening in the Guild and then as is customary the handbells came out. We all went our separate ways sufficiently late to make it difficult to get out of bed the following morning but early enough not to make it

RING IN 2000

The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers has now officially taken up the idea of ringing all bells at noon on 1st January 2000, and produced some new leaflets about recruitment, training of new ringers and public relations. A new training video should be circulating soon. Tim Wraight, Hon. Secretary of KCACR is the countywide coordinator for this. The Central Council will launch a national recruiting campaign for new and "resting" ringers this autumn, having already begun to train the trainers.

So what does this all mean for the Lewisham District? Are there any silent or under-subscribed towers in our district (thinking also of those which have combined bands)? Do we need more ringing trainers and tower captains? Central Council are willing at the moment to organise <u>local</u> one-day courses on tower management, so do we take up the offer while it's going? Do we have any volunteers who would

be prepared to make up a band to ring away from their home tower on the day itself? Do we need to identify now any key bell improvement/restoration projects which would make a critical difference to RING IN 2000? Being a newcomer to the District, I would welcome voluntary feedback on all this from ringers and tower captains, rather than send round a dry fact-finding questionnaire.


