District Ringing – Jan-Mar 2025

Before recapping on our ringing for the past quarter can we make a **small appeal**. Whilst ringing at District Meetings are a turn up and enjoy type event, for District Practices we have a particular focus in mind with a view to helping people progress in their ringing. This means that we strive hard to make sure we have a good balance of novices and helpers. Sometimes this means we have to chase up some extra support when we have had few volunteers; and we are very grateful to those who re-arrange their day to enable them to make up numbers for a District Practice. It can be a tad frustrating if we then have extra helpers turning up on the day which would have avoided the need for people to change their plans. Of course the help is very welcomed, but it would make things considerably easier, and spare others re-arranging their day, if we had advance notice. So, **pretty please** – if you are thinking of **coming to a District Practice** (either as a novice or a helper) do **drop the District Ringing Masters an email** to let them know. Even if it is a tentative "*possibly*" that is helpful as it gives us some names to follow up with if numbers are looking low.

It is also useful to have registered in case we need to cancel the practice (because too few have registered as coming) – we can make sure we have let all those coming know.

January – Quarterly Meeting: (Wingham) We had over 16 visiting the ringing room to try the challenging 8 – and some did struggle a bit. Whilst we mostly kept with 8-bell ringing we did include some Plain Hunt on 5 during the afternoon. We started with a course of Grandsire Triples, which limped home, but then started to get to grips with the bells. We had another loss a bit later when trying a touch of Plain Bob Major, but otherwise did well – including a half course of Cambridge Surprise Major to finish the afternoon ringing. It was good to see several returning for the evening ringing which saw a good variety of methods rung.

(Rounds+CC 8, Plain H 5, Plain H 7, Grandsire 7 [incl touch], Stedman 7, Plain Bob 8 [touch came to grief], Little Bob 8 [touch], Splice Plain + Little Bob 8 [touch], Cambridge S 8 [½ course])

January – S Major Practice: (Hernhill) A bumper 20 ringers at turned out for this quarter's Surprise Major practice with ½ courses of Cambridge, Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, Superlative and Pudsey being rung as well as 3 leads of Bristol and a ½ course of four spliced. Our only loss of the evening was one of the attempts at Superlative.

(Cambridge, Yorkshire, Lincolnshire, Superlative, Pudsey, Bristol [3 leads], 4-spliced CYNS)

February – Bye Meeting: (St Alphege, Whitstable & Graveney) It was difficult to keep track of numbers as we needed to let people leave the tower before others could come up – but it seemed quite busy. St Alphege always gives some trepidation, but aside from a few caught off-guard we got through the afternoon without losing a stay. We kept all 8 bells ringing during the afternoon and whilst some stuck with rounds we did ring a good range of methods up to Cambridge Surprise Major. For the evening we adjourned to the 3 at Graveney, with quite a few availing themselves of the opportunity to ring at this tower.

(Rounds+CC 8, Plain Hunt 7, Plain Bob 7 [touch], Grandsire 7, Little Bob 8 [touch], Cambridge 8 [½ course]

Rounds 3, Plain H 3, St Remigius Place 3, Stedman 3, Erin 3, Double Dracula 3.)

February – Call Changes Practice: (Chartham) There was a very good level of interest in this District Practice with 7 signing up and about the same helping. The focus was on good striking and listening skills. All the novices had been given homework using online tools to practice their listening skills. Some reported that it was challenging to use the main tool used on a phone due to the small amount of screen space, but it seems to have done the job of getting people ready for the day. The call-changes were relatively straight-forward, but there was intense attention to the striking – this also allowed those sitting out to practice their listening skills and comparing their assessment with the instructions being given. All managed to achieve very good results.

March – Call Change Competition: (Teynham) This is reported separately.

March – Basic Doubles Practice: (Petham) 4 signed up for this practice, but unfortunately 2 had to subsequently withdraw. Having got helpers arranged it was decided to proceed with the practice which meant lots of rope time for the 2 remaining novices – and the focus was kept on Plain Bob. From the feedback both got a lot out of the day and look forward to putting the experience gained to good use.

As always do feel free to give feedback and suggestions to the District Ringing Masters, and thank you again to all those who have supported District Ringing this quarter. A good start to the year.

But all good things have to end, and when we pulled the final handstroke, it felt so good, as I knew that all our hard work had paid off.

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After we had rung at Otford, we went and rung at Kemsing. The ringing was good there too, and it was all very enjoyable. Soon we headed back to Otford for some food. The selection was very good, but the anticipation was high! Then entered the grand judge – Adam Moore – to give us the results. The 'Jim' Luck District Call Change Cup

Well done to all the teams that entered this year's District Call Change Competition at Teynham, and congratulations to St Stephen's, Canterbury on winning and receiving the "Jim Luck Trophy".



K.C.A.C.R. CALL CHANGE COMPETITION In memory of MILDRED "JIM" LUCK 1908 - 1981

For those that recall my article about Frank Knight this is something similar to give some background to our Call Change Competition trophy. Just as with Frank, "Jim" Luck is passing from living memory, but unlike Frank, "Jim" was not a ringer – though she did learn to handle a bell at one point – so there is not a ringing record to report on.

So who was "Jim"? Her actual name was Mildred and she was married to Bert Luck who was a notable Canterbury ringer, popular District Secretary, and KCACR Vice-President. How she came by the nickname "Jim" is lost in the mists of time, it undoubtedly came from Bert and it was widely used by those in the ringing community who knew her. But let's go back to the beginning.

Jim was born Mildred Florence Fullbrook on 1-Jun-1908 to William and Florence Fullbrook and baptised at St Nicholas, Thanington that year. The Fullbrook family looks to have come from the Lamberhurst area but was settled in Canterbury by the time Jim and her siblings William, Annie, Nellie, and Leo were born. The 1911

and 1921 censuses have them living at 35 Claremont Place in Canterbury. Jim later went to work in Tenterden but it was when she returned to Canterbury that she met Bert. Bert was born and raised in Lamberhurst and his early peal ringing record has him strongly connected with the area up until 1933 when there is a shift to Canterbury. The Lamberhurst connection must have given the young Bert a good opportunity to strike up a rapport with Jim, and so started a life together.

Jim and Bert married in Canterbury on 9-Dec-1933 with the occasion marked by a peal rung by the band at Lamberhurst. Bert took on the role of Canterbury District Secretary in 1936 with the early Ringing Worlds of the year showed their address as 25d New Dover Road in Canterbury. But in September they moved into 20 Beaconsfield Road where they were to stay. Richard Offen recounts a story told by Bert that at first they were renting the property but in the early 1950's their landlord told him that he was planning to sell the property but would offer them the opportunity to buy before it went on the

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market. Bert went to see the landlord to find out how much he wanted for the property. After the meeting he went home to Jim and reported that the asking price was £500, "I told him where he could stuff his house at that price" he said to Jim, to which she replied "Well I hope he leaves the chimney out so we can have a fire!". In the end they bought the house for slightly less than the original demand.

Jim and Bert did not have a family of their own, but there were nephews and nieces. Liz Barnes recalls that after posting a picture of a St Stephen's paper collection fun-raiser on a "Remembering Canterbury" Facebook page a comment asking about Bert came in from Sally Holmes. She is Leo's daughter and recalled visits to Jim and Bert when she was little. These were much loved and "Aunty Mildred" was a very sweet person. In 1958 Jim and Bert celebrated their Silver Wedding anniversary which was marked by a peal at

Canterbury Cathedral where Bert was also a longer serving member.

With Bert's strong involvement with ringing Jim did not entirely escape from learning to ring. This she did just before WWII, but other commitments meant it was not something she persisted with. However, she remained a part of the Canterbury ringing scene as an Associate Member and could be found organizing the sandwich making factory line that ensured there was a good tea awaiting ringing friends at Canterbury meetings. She also took particular interest in learners and ensured they received a friendly and warm welcome. Through a combination of having learnt to ring, living with Bert, and often having ringers visit home, she was quite knowledgeable about a wide range of ringing matters and could hold her own in any conversation.

She was last persuaded to take hold of a bell rope in 1979 when she rang on Walter Dobbie's mini-ring. This brought her tower total to six, something she was proud of and a good showing for a non-ringer. Of course, it will be for her warm and cheery welcome and efforts in ringer's teas that most will have known her; and this is a timely reminder that a great strength of ringing is the community of friendship that it forms and the social occasions we enjoy when we meet.

Jim passed away on 16-Feb-1981 after a year or two of poor health, her funeral was held at Barham Crematorium with many ringing friends in attendance and the service led by Rev Stanley Evans.

As we compete in the Call Change Competition we can be reminded of Jim's interest in ringing and recognize that everyone, whatever their degree of experience, contributes to our ringing society and aim to give new learners a warm welcome.

District Call Change Competition Review

Saturday 8th March 2025 – St Mary's Teynham

The picturesque churchyard of St Mary's, Teynham was gloriously arrayed in swathes of snowdrops and early daffodils as members gathered on a sunny spring afternoon to compete for the Call Change trophy.

Our esteemed judges, Rochester District Ringing Master, Cathy Hall, and Ian Mills from the Lewisham District, were comfortably settled on the north side of the churchyard in the sunshine where the sound of the bells rang out clear and bright, as the draw took place and the first team headed up the steps and across to the first-floor ringing chamber. There to greet each team and make sure all procedures were correctly followed was Tower Steward Maureen, none other than our 120 Club supremo in a rather different role. But true-to-form, her friendly comments and fun approach were much appreciated by the more nervous ringers. Meanwhile, the kettle was kept on the boil in the transept and delicious goodies were dispensed by Nigel and his crew as the competition got underway. It was pleasing to find the bells generally easy-going and the only real challenge was the proximity of the wooden clock case to the tenor-ringer's elbow. In their downtime, team members were able to appreciate the charming natural setting and the features of the medieval church, as well as the impressive 20th century stained glass at the east end. The ringing was followed by a service led by Mark Harlow, a local lay minister who was most enthusiastic about the sound of the bells, and some brief items of business, before we came to the all-important results.

Here are the teams in order of ringing, with ringers pictured left to right from treble to tenor, followed by the judges' comments.

The Sound of Bells

From the ages of 6 - 8, my brother and I used to walk home from Sunday School at St Macartan's Cathedral, which is in the small village of Clogher, in Northern Ireland, to the sound of the bells being chimed for Matins by the Verger. It was a sound I loved, and sparked off a desire to learn to ring later in life.

I expect you are wondering why there was a cathedral in such a small village, and who was St Macartan? To answer that, we need to go back to the 5th century, when St Patrick and his followers brought Christianity to Ireland. St Macartan was the strong man of the group, with the task of carrying St Patrick across rivers and up hills when necessary. As time went on, St Patrick would offer locations to his followers to build a church, until eventually St Macartan asked for his spot, and he was offered the top of a small hill in Clogher. Various buildings later, and you will find the current Cathedral at the top of the High Street.

However, at the age of 11, we moved to England, to St Mildred's in Addiscombe, Croydon, but it had no bells. It wasn't until 2002, when I went on one of the Village Tours at St Peter in Thanet, and mentioned my dream of learning how to ring bells, that I was invited to come along on a Monday evening, to learn with Reg Foreman and Sonia Stockwell. Most Saturdays a group of us would drive over to Dover in Sarat and Ian White's car, nicknamed the 'SPIT bus', and Peter Dale would give us lots of extra practice at bell handling, Rounds and Call Changes and Plain Hunt, until we were ready to be inducted into KCACR in 2003.

Why I still love bell ringing

As a child, I learned how to play the piano, which is quite a solitary instrument except when playing a duet or trio. So ringing bells in groups of 6, 8 or even 10, gives me such a buzz: trying to ring in time; being helped when I panic and forget the blue line; the sense of comradery; going on bell ringing holidays with Coots; and ultimately when I have mastered a method and managed to ring it in a quarter peal. As most who know me, it takes me an inordinate amount of time, sometimes months, but often years, before I grasp a new method, so I am always grateful to fellow ringers for their incredible patience and encouragement to help me achieve the latest goal! I find going to the Ringing Schools, such as Essex, Hereford or Bradfield, really helps with total immersion into a method over a few days of theory, shadowing and practice.

Payback time?

Sarat White, the Tower Captain at St Peter in Thanet, was shouldering all the responsibility of teaching new comers, so I decided to do the ART course and help out with new ringers. It was another steep learning curve, and I am very grateful to my 'first learner' for her patience. The course gave me a structure to follow and common goals with Sarat and Freda Parker when we meet up for our learners' sessions on Monday evenings from 6.30, and Saturday mornings from 10 – 11.30. Joining the committee as a third member this year hopefully is another aspect of paying back KCACR for the hours of pleasure and enjoyment in ringing with such an amazing band of ringers.

Ringers worldwide

I have two daughters, Clare and Anna, and when I visit them, tend to ring the bells nearby. Anna now lives in Wivenhoe, Essex, and the tower is always welcoming when I turn up. The same goes for visits to Clare in Sydney, Australia, as I usually spend some time there, and can join in the practice evenings. Sundays are particularly enjoyable, as I walk to St Lawrence, and ring there, before getting the tram to St Philips and ring. Then we drive to St Mary's Cathedral and ring, and in the past I used to walk to St James, for my fourth ring of the morning before catching the bus back to Waterloo, where Clare lives. The same thing happened when Anna lived in New Zealand. Bell ringers are welcomed worldwide.

Dreams for the future: To master a few more methods; to ring at all the towers in Kent; and to welcome more and more people to the ringing world.

10. Report from County meetings

Malcolm updated us on news from the latest county committee meeting, as follows:

Belfry Repair Fund - The Charity Commissioners have unexpectedly rejected the latest version of the BRF's objects (which were agreed at the Quex EGM). Peter Joyce has discussed this with them, with a view to finding a wording which will be acceptable. Two other ringing organisations (Lincoln Diocesan Guild and The Mobile Belfries Trust) have recently had their objects approved by the Commissioners, and Peter is using their wording as a basis to resolve this issue. The Charity Commissioners are being co-operative, and Peter hopes to have a final version available shortly.

Safeguarding - I now have a definitive answer on the points raised at our last District meeting, as follows : The issue in the past has been that Canterbury uses the online portal to book and record what safeguarding training has been undertaken in the Diocese, but Rochester does not. With no online record for courses done in Rochester, the portal has therefore previously rejected any attempts to book Leadership courses in Canterbury which are based on certificates issued by Rochester. A manual 'work around' has now been agreed between the two Dioceses, meaning that qualifications are transferrable between the two Dioceses, and we can now confidently undertake training in either Diocese.

Safeguarding Policy - this has now been updated, and published on the KCACR website.

Social Media Policy - In consultation with the Central Council, a draft template of a Social Media Policy has been drawn up, and which will initially be implemented for General Committee Members, followed by a roll-out to the Districts. This will give guidelines for the use of any Social Media accounts/groups set up in the name of the KCACR.

Ringing 2030 – this project is to ensure that ringing continues into the future, and is particularly aimed at encouraging young ringers. Lesson materials have been prepared for schools. To make this project viable and administrator will need to be employed, to fund this the CCCBR levy is being increased from 20p per member to 40p per member and later £1. The association treasurer has confirmed that our subs will not need to go up as a result.

Choral Evensong at Canterbury Cathedral - this was very well received by all concerned. Particular mention was made of the quality of the refreshments, and the efficient and welcoming way the ringing was organised. Well done to all.

Membership Certificates - these are now available from Doug Davis. Alternatively, Doug can supply a file for these to be printed locally.

Rule Changes - Following feedback from the ADM's, some minor amendments (mostly concerned with language and clarity) are being made to the proposed new rules, and the final version will be put to the membership at next year's AGM.

Display Boards - new display material is in the process of being designed and produced.

KCACR Canterbury District Striking Competition Rules

(Adopted at the ADM in October 1990, amended at the ADM in October 1999 and further amended in October 2006).

- 1. The competition shall be held annually within the District at a location and on a date to be decided by the District Committee and shall be subject to the following rules.
- 2. The Competition shall be organised by the Assistant District Secretary in consultation with the District Committee.
- 3. The object of the competition is to improve the standard of striking through friendly competition between bands representing towers in the District in union with the Kent County Association of Change Ringers.
- 4. All members taking part shall be members of the Kent County Association of Change Ringers and regular Sunday service ringers at the tower they represent.
- 5. Bands shall be named on the entry form provided by the Assistant District Secretary, although not necessarily in the order of ringing in the test piece.
- 6. No ringer may ring more than once or represent more than one tower in the same competition.
- 7. A draw for the order of the bands competing shall be made by the leaders of each band before the competition, bands to be known by numbers only not by name. No two bands shall be in the ringing chamber at the same time. A steward shall be in the tower for the better observance of these rules and shall see that the bells are raised and rung beforehand.
- 8. Each band shall be allowed one continuous period of two minutes for a trial round of changes at the end of which the bells shall be set. A whole pull is to be rung on the treble to indicate to the judge(s) that the band is ready and the test piece will then commence and continue to its end without break.
- 9. Subject to any alteration arising from the application of rule 10 the test piece shall consist of either 240 changes of doubles on five or six bells or 240 changes of minor or, if the band entered is incapable of ringing changes (to a reasonable standard to be determined by the District Committee), the equivalent length of call changes, in which case there must be at least 24 different changes at regular intervals with at least five working bells.

- 10. The competition organiser may halve the length of the test piece stated in rule 9 if a) More than 8 teams have entered the competition or b) The competition is unduly delayed. In event that the test piece length is altered due to a delay after the competition has started then the bands that have rung the full length shall only be judged on the first 120 changes of their test piece and any marked rounds. Any band ringing call changes shall only be required to have 12 different changes at regular intervals with at least five working bells.
- 11. The first 10 whole pulls of rounds in the test piece shall not be marked. All faults in subsequent rounds and changes shall be penalised and the competition judged on the total number of faults recorded subject to any adjustment allowed under rule 10.
- 12. Any band failing to complete the test piece shall be disqualified.
- 13. There shall be one or two judges, preferably independent of the District, who shall know only the numbers of the bands competing. Their decision shall be final, subject to the observance of these rules, and the judge(s) shall give the results and comments at the meeting following the competition.
- 14. The Frank Knight Cup will be awarded, with a certificate, to the winning tower, who will be responsible for its safe keeping. It shall be returned in a clean condition to the Honorary District Secretary before the next competition or after a period of one year if no competition is held within that period.
- 15. The decision of the District Committee as to the interpretation and observance of these rules shall be final and binding on all parties. Such decisions shall be by a simple majority of the Committee present and voting.

Safeguarding Summary

Summary of current Church of England requirements for Safeguarding Training, Safer Recruitment and DBS Checks



At the last meeting of the District Committee, it was felt that a summary of the current requirements for Safeguarding Training and DBS Checks for bell ringers in the Diocese of Canterbury would be helpful (since with the exception of Quex

Park, all of the towers in the KCACR Canterbury District are Diocese of Canterbury churches). None of this could be described as "new" information, as the Church of England's current safeguarding framework has been in force since January 2022, but hopefully anyone who is unsure of what the current requirements actually are will find the answers here.

Safeguarding Training

At a national level, the Church of England **mandatorily** requires all adult ringers to complete the lowest level of training – **"Basic Awareness"**. In the Diocese of Canterbury's guidance, the phrase "established ringers" is used, so a Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO) will require that all adult ringers who ring at their church on a frequent basis have completed Basic Awareness.

Again at a national level, anyone involved with the training of under-18s and/or vulnerable adults is additionally **mandatorily** required to complete the next level of training – **"Foundations"**.

Both "Basic Awareness" and "Foundations" are online courses which take approximately an hour to complete and are accessed through the Church of England Safeguarding Training Portal, found here: <u>https://safeguardingtraining.cofeportal.org/</u> This site is free to use – new users will need to create a new account, after which they will be able to log on to their individual profile whenever they wish. When a safeguarding course has been completed, the certificate of completion will be available to download at any time from the site.

So much for national requirements – any additional training requirements depend on the safeguarding policy of individual dioceses, so what is further required varies from place to place. In common with some other dioceses (including the neighbouring Diocese of Rochester), the Diocese of Canterbury requires all Tower Captains/Ringing Masters to further complete the next stage of training – **"Leadership"**. "Leadership" training is run over two sessions of 90 minutes each, one or two weeks apart, customarily delivered using Zoom, and there is also some written work to be submitted before and after the course. The Church of England Safeguarding Training Portal is used to book "Leadership" training.

In addition to the core training pathway (Step 1 – Basic Awareness, Step 2 – Foundations, Step 3 – Leadership), Tower Captains/Ringing Masters in the Diocese of Canterbury are also required to complete the specific issue-based

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course **"Raising Awareness of Domestic Abuse"**. Similar to "Basic Awareness" and "Foundations", this course takes about an hour to complete and is accessed through the Church of England Safeguarding Training Portal.

Training must be renewed **every three years**. On completing training for the first time, people should first complete "Basic Awareness", and then subsequent courses in order up to the level required by their role, but when training comes up for renewal, they only need to renew their training at the **highest level they have previously completed**. For example, if someone has completed "Basic Awareness", "Foundations" and "Leadership", they only need to renew their "Leadership" training every three years rather than all three levels ("Raising Awareness of Domestic Abuse" sits outside the core pathway and will need to be renewed separately). A useful diagram produced by the Diocese of Canterbury showing who in a church needs to complete what training can be found at the end of this article.

Every ringer should share their course completion certificates with the PSO(s) at every church they ring at regularly. As certificates are available to download from the Church of England Safeguarding Training Portal at any time, the simplest way of keeping your PSO(s) informed is to download and email your certificates to them, after which they should be able to remind you when your training comes up for renewal. As certificates are available to download at any time, there is obviously no need to complete courses multiple times for different churches.

Training customarily takes place online, but **in-person** training sessions have been arranged to cater for people for whom online training is not possible. If any ringers at your tower are in this position, please speak to your local PSO to investigate the possibility of arranging local in-person training. Your local PSO should also be consulted about any other queries relating to safeguarding training, including in relation to possible exemptions from completing training – obviously there may be legitimate reasons for some adult ringers to be exempted from standard requirements – for example, if they are a vulnerable adult as a result of a medical condition. If there are adult members of your band who you feel may qualify for an exemption from completing required safeguarding training, this should be discussed with your PSO, who will in all likelihood need to consult the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor (DSA) regarding the validity of any exemption. The KCACR Safeguarding Officer, currently Emma Jarvis, can also advise on safeguarding matters specifically related to bell ringing (email: <u>safeguarding@kcacr.org.uk</u>)

Safer Recruitment and DBS Checks

Tower Captains/Ringing Masters and those involved with training under-18s and/or vulnerable adults are required to be safely recruited in line with their responsibilities to train under-18s and/or vulnerable adults and/or manage those who do, in accordance with the Church of England **Safer Recruitment Guidance.** Anyone new in such a role must go through the Safer Recruitment process. However, those already in post do not need to go through the process retrospectively. The arrangement of a check on a person's criminal record, any information held on them by police forces and on the Children's and Adults Barred Lists by the **Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS)** is part of Safer Recruitment. The Barred Lists contain details of individuals prohibited from working with children or vulnerable adults due to past offending.

The Diocese of Canterbury requires that anyone involved with training under-18s and/or vulnerable adults holds an up-to-date Enhanced DBS Check with Barred List Check. Tower Captains/Ringing Masters are also required to hold an up-to-date Enhanced DBS Check – if training of under-18s and/or vulnerable adults takes place at their tower this is required to be an Enhanced DBS Check with Barred List Check. Each parish has a Parish Disclosure Officer (PDO) who

arranges DBS checks – they may or may not also be the PSO. As with safeguarding training, checks need to be renewed **every three years**. Anyone with prior experience of DBS checks will know that they are not generally transferable from one setting to another, so a DBS check that a person holds for work purposes will not generally cover another aspect of their activities, such as an activity like bell ringing taking place in a church, so it is likely that in such circumstances a check specific to that would need to be arranged.

Final Thoughts

Depending on the visitor policies of individual local churches, the possibility exists that **you may be asked to confirm your status as regards safeguarding training certificates and DBS checks held** before you visit, so it is as well to be informed what is expected both nationally and locally. I hope that this article may answer any questions that people may have on this subject, but if anyone is unsure about anything they should consult their local PSO, or the KCACR Safeguarding Officer if appropriate. Any concerns anyone may have about the safeguarding of any child or vulnerable adult in a church setting should of course be immediately conveyed to the local PSO, or the police if there is a risk of immediate harm.
